

Salem Sets Record for Debt Payment

With a bonded indebtedness which will total \$501,500 when the an indebtedness of \$8000; they last of the \$20,000 incinerator issue has been paid this fall, the City of Salem has established a record for consistent debt liquidation, the report of City Treasurer Paul H. Hauser filed with the ctate treasurer Thursday indicates.

A separate debt load, which nevertheless carries the city's seal, water system indebtedness stands at \$1,986,000 on the books, but \$326,709.83 has been accumulated to cut this to \$1,659,290.17. In 1935 and 1936, water system bonds were issued to total \$2,100,000. The

debt is to be liquidated by 1978. Airport improvement bonds, originally totaling \$75,000, now represent a debt to investors of \$62,000. Bridge bonds, issued from September, 1927, through May, 1930, for \$400,000, have been paid with the exception of \$93,000 worth. Drainage bonds represent

originally totaled \$22,000. The latest new bond issue of \$200,000 for sewerage treatment stands intact save for a \$5000 payment. Sewer construction bonds issued in 1937 and 1938 to a total of \$550,000 have been reduced to \$143,500.
