

### Republicans Schedule Open House Tonight

An informal open house for all republicans with the Multnomah county central committee as hosts at committee offices in the Morgan building will be held tonight as a feature of this week's Portland sessions of the party's state central committee.

Most meetings on the agenda today and Saturday's election will be held at the Portland hotel. Election of officers will take place Saturday afternoon which includes a state chairman, vice chairman, secretary, and treasurer and other officers as may be necessary.

The public mass meeting at the Masonic temple Saturday evening to be addressed by Congressman Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois will conclude the sessions. Gov. Snell will introduce Dirksen.

Each of the 38 counties of the state has two votes for the election of officers and the state committee and state committee-woman from each county will cast the votes for their respective counties. Marion county will be represented by John H. Carkin, attorney and former speaker of the house of representatives, and Florence Wright, both of Salem. Congressional organization meetings for districts 1, 2, 4 are also scheduled and George Manolis and Violet Dick, both of Silverton, represent this district.

### House Backs Up FDR Idea On Property

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The house backed up the administration's idea of how surplus war property should be disposed of today, voting down proposals to replace the proposed disposal director with a seven man board and to restrict his term to coincide with that of President Roosevelt.

The surplus property bill rode through its first major tests unchanged as the house drove toward a final vote which probably will be taken tomorrow. Hopes for a decision today faded rapidly after scores of members

offered amendments. The widespread interest in proposed changes in the measure coincided with another drive to rewrite the surplus property bill's twin—the measure to ease the reconversion to a peacetime economy. A bi-partisan bloc was organized in the house in a fresh effort to provide \$25 a week unemployment compensation for civilians and \$35 for veterans for maximum of 52 weeks over a two-year period.

### Glenn Taylor Learns How To Get Votes

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Voters have divers ways of determining the qualifications of candidates for public office but perhaps none more ingenious than the wartime method of a Payette county farmer.

Glenn Taylor, democratic candidate for the US senate, who visited here today, was nursing a badly blistered hand as a result of the farmer's resourceful idea. When the candidate called on the farmer to talk about election issues, he found the farmer putting up hay.

"Tell you what," invited the farmer. "You take this pitchfork and just follow along and we will talk about politics."

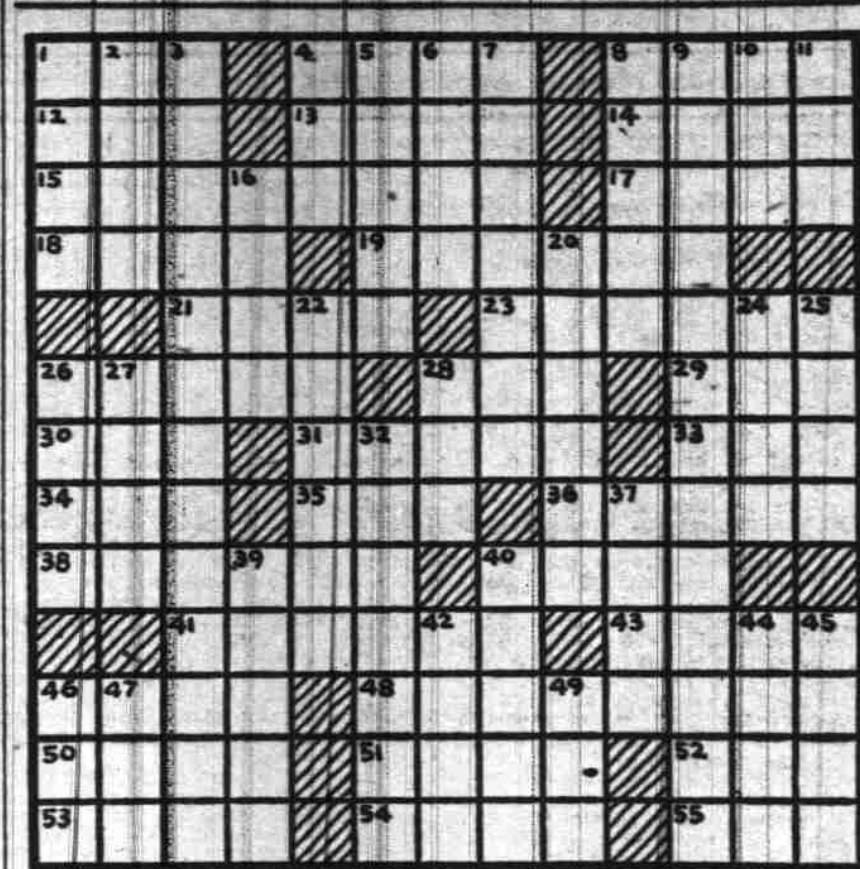
Taylor seized the pitchfork and started pitching, but every time he attempted conversation, the farmer said, "right after the next load is on." They pitched through the afternoon. When the supper gong rang, the farmer shook hands with the perspiring candidate and said: "Thanks for the lift with the harvest work. I just wanted to find out if you've got what it takes—you have. Every senator ought to have a course in haying."

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### Salem Sets Record for Debt Payment

With a bonded indebtedness which will total \$501,500 when the last of the \$20,000 incinerator issue has been paid this fall, the City of Salem has established a record for consistent debt liquidation, the report of City Treasurer Paul H. Hauser filed with the state treasurer Thursday indicates.

A separate debt load, which nevertheless carries the city's seal, water system indebtedness stands at \$1,986,000 on the books, but \$326,709.83 has been accumulated to cut this to \$1,659,290.17. In 1935 and 1936, water system bonds were issued to total \$2,100,000. The

debt is to be liquidated by 1976. Airport improvement bonds, originally totaling \$75,000, now represent a debt to investors of \$62,000. Bridge bonds, issued from September, 1927, through May, 1930, for \$400,000, have been paid with the exception of \$93,000 worth. Drainage bonds represent an indebtedness of \$8000; they originally totaled \$22,000.

The latest new bond issue of \$200,000 for sewerage treatment stands intact save for a \$5000 payment. Sewer construction bonds issued in 1937 and 1938 to a total of \$550,000 have been reduced to \$143,500.

Violent wind storms, heavy rains, and dropping thermometers caused upstate New York and parts of the south and midwest to label the heat wave "definitely broken" while heat-weary residents of New York City and New England waited impatiently for the good news to hit the east coast.

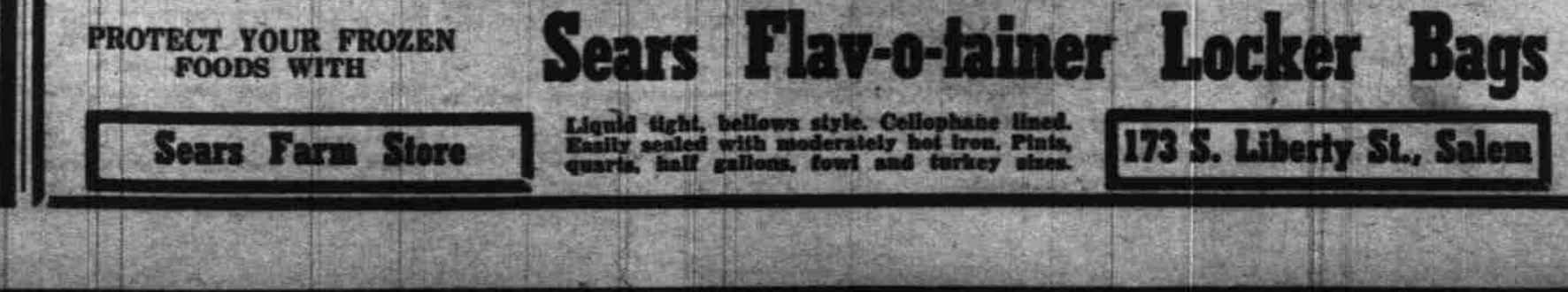
In New York City the mercury registered 83, an all-time August 17 high, as workmen cleared away debris and mopped up subway systems flooded in Wednesday night's storm. Boston reported its seventh day

of "shattering heat"... Connecticut meteorologist officially labeled the past three and a half months the hottest and driest season in 70 years... Firefighters battled with bulldozers near Augusta, Me., to halt a 3000-acre forest blaze that it was believed only rain could extinguish.

In Newark, N.J., the mercury stayed under 97 for the first time in a week.

Heavy showers bringing relief to upstate New York extended to Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky, but reports stated, "more rain is needed to break crop-damaging drought."
