Hop Pickers Not Evenly Placed, Men Say; Bean Over-lap Ahead

While a number of Marion county hop men are reporting more than sufficient pickers, especially around the Silverton district, growers in the Polk county fields, particularly around Independence, apparently still need help.

In the Silverton community growers said that the real lack was yard and hop house men; that a large number, thought to be sufficient, of pickers had already signed up.

"There have always been plenty of pickers for the earlier," Dean Walker of Independence said Friday when questioned on the situation. "But I don't believe we will have too many for the late hops. There seems to be more available labor this year, but there are also more hops and beans to be picked."

Mr. Walker explained that the beginning of hop picking and the peak of bean picking overlapped and that as a rule the bean growers suffered the most at this time from lack of help.

In the Independence district, pickers were no more plentiful than were yardmen, most of the growers reported. Some fear was expressed that pickers might even be a little short when all the big yards swung into harvest around September 1.

500 Acres Near Independence
There has been considerable rumor of mechanical picking machines this year. Investigations revealed only three for the season, the one used in the Horsts' yards for the past couple of years, and the two new ones, of a more modern mechanism, ordered by Thatcher and Williams at Eola, and expected to arrive about August 25. Cooper Mill Changes Hands

INDEPENDENCE, Aug. 18.—The sale of the Cooper sawmill was announced here this week to Barnhart & Kochis.

The mill was established in 1939 by J. F. and E. A. Cooper and has been operating since that time. It is located on Ash creek at 9th and F streets and has a capacity of 35,000 feet a day, employing 21 men. The sale included all the equipment and the lumber on hand.

J. F. Cooper, who has been active in the management of the mill, has not announced future plans. He owns a million feet of timber in the Kings Valley district and may log that off soon.

Barnhart & Kochis operate a mill at Hoskins which they will continue to operate in addition to the Independence mill. The local mill will operate under the name of the Independence Sawmill Co.

3 New Tree Farms Set Up

Three private forest areas in the Lebanon-Sweet Home area, recently dedicated as tree farms by Congressman Harris Ellsworth, bring to over 500,000 acres in Oregon private lands certified for perpetual production of forest crops.

Tree farms are now organized in many western Oregon counties, and the movement is spreading. Tree farmers agree to provide intensive fire protection, practice sound logging methods, and leave adequate seed sources for natural restocking, so that those private lands will produce continuous merchantable crops of forest products.

This program, started here in the west a short three years ago, has now spread nationally, and was described by Congressman Ellsworth as the most important development in forestry in half a century.
