Recipe Collector Remembers Old Formulas Practical for Today

Collecting recipes is a custom that has been practiced by women for centuries. Good recipes have a way of getting around, and good cooks are generous with theirs, although a few whose culinary reputation is perhaps a little shaky, feel reluctant to pass their best around.

Of course, no one can blame the cook who has a specialty, for not giving her "rule" away so that all the members of her bridge club can serve it to all their bridge clubs.

It's funny how we get some of our best favorites.

Here's one that came from a tearoom in Seattle, where pies were a specialty. The recipe was, perhaps smuggled, out of the kitchen by a young woman who served as assistant cook for a while, and later became an acquaintance of women on the newspaper.

MARLBOROUGH PIE
Line a pie pan with pastry dough. Fill three-quarters full with chopped apples. Cream two egg yolks with 1/4 cup sugar and add 2 tablespoons melted butter. Mix well and add 1 cup milk. Pour over the apples. Put a lattice crust on top and bake in a slow oven about 35 minutes. Make meringue with egg whites, and brown in oven.

Another pie from the same tea room, brought out in the same manner, is this:

LEMON CHIFFON PIE
1/4 cup butter
3 eggs beaten
Juice of one large lemon
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup nuts
Put into baked shell and bake like custard. Make meringue for the top or cover with whipped cream.

Strange as it may seem in these days of sketchy food in the trains and lack of interest in eating places in general, food used to be a big talking point by railroad companies. Several recipes for pie were written to our department by Canadian Pacific railway chefs in the days a long way back.

MOLASSES PIE
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup molasses
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon nutmeg
2 egg yolks
1/2 cup milk

Mix and put in raw pie shell. Bake for 45 minutes at 325 degrees. Put meringue on top.

A notation, also from the railway chef, written for my recipe files by a friend who was traveling and who made friends with the man who did the cooking on the route: "Add grated rind 1/2 or-

Pickle Recipe In Demand

A request for a special pickle recipe, sent the editor of these columns to the old file, where, after perusing the old recipe sections once published by the Statesman, we succeeded in finding the required formula.

Here is the recipe, one which has become popular with Statesman readers, requests for which have been received almost yearly by the department:

Commercial Sweet Pickle

(Joy Turner Moses)

Wash 75 cucumbers three or four inches long, cut into pieces 1/4 inches thick. Makes about 2 gallons. Place in a stone jar, pour 2 cups of salt and one gallon of boiling water over them. Let stand one week. (Skim every day necessary). On the 8th day, drain well and pour over them, one gallon fresh boiling water, one tablespoon powdered alum. Let stand for 24 hours. On the 9th day drain and add 1 gallon boiling water. Let stand 24 hours. On the 10th day, drain and pour over the cucumbers the following mixture, boiling hot: 5 pints strong vinegar, 6 cups sugar.

1 ounce celery seed
1 ounce stick cinnamon
On each succeeding day for three days drain off liquid and re-heat, each time pouring the liquid boiling hot on the pickles. Add 1 cup sugar each time. Seal or leave in open crock. These pickles taste very much like the commercial ones.

2 Salem Men Wind Up Two Years Abroad

5TH AAF IN ITALY — Two years of overseas duty in England Africa and Italy were completed on August 6 by two men from Salem, Ore. M/Sgt. Robert W. Walling, 896 South 14th street, and S/Sgt. Albert M. Friesen, 364 North 12th street, making them part of the real veterans of the war in the European and Mediterranean theaters.

Their Fortress group was activated at Geiger field, Wash., shortly after Pearl Harbor, rushed through training and sent overseas to England on August 6. There they participated in the first all-American air attacks against Germany and German held territory. Move to Africa.

With the African invasion, the group moved south to play a key part in that campaign. Despite the most trying of living conditions and almost constant enemy attacks the men of the unit did outstanding work.

Moving to an Italian base in December of 1943, the unit took part in the first coordinated raids against central Germany from Italy and England.

Receives Citations
Men of the group have twice received distinguished unit citations, presented during a recent ceremony by Maj. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, commanding general of the 15th army air force. One of these was given for a brilliant and daring attack which destroyed an enemy ammunition convoy during the closing stages of the Tunisian campaign; the other for the first coordinated attack of the eighth and 15th air forces against Regensburg, Germany.

With better than 300 missions to its credit, the group is probably best known for leading the first raid on Rome and the sinking of the Italian heavy cruiser, Trieste.
