

S. Parzy Rose Receives DFC For Heroism

SILVERTON, Aug. 22—S. Parzy Rose II, aviation radio technician, second class, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for "heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in a real flight as radio technician of a torpedo airplane in a strike group of a torpedo squadron during an attack against a warship of a Japanese fleet at sea off the Mariana Islands, June 24, 1955. During the attack on the enemy warship made in spite of heavy enemy air opposition, and intense and accurate enemy anti-aircraft fire and all calibers including battleship and cruiser main battery fire, he carried out his duties with calmness and courage. He continued to give his pilot valuable target range data during the attack run, enabling the pilot to make a fore accurate torpedo drop." This was signed by M. A. Mitscher, vice admiral, US navy.

Young Rose is a graduate of the Silverton high school and the elder son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Parzy Rose, now of Aurora, but formerly of Silverton.

Two other sons of the Roses, both in service, are P. Wayne Rose, soundman third class, and D. Neil Rose, taking radio under navy program at the University of Idaho.

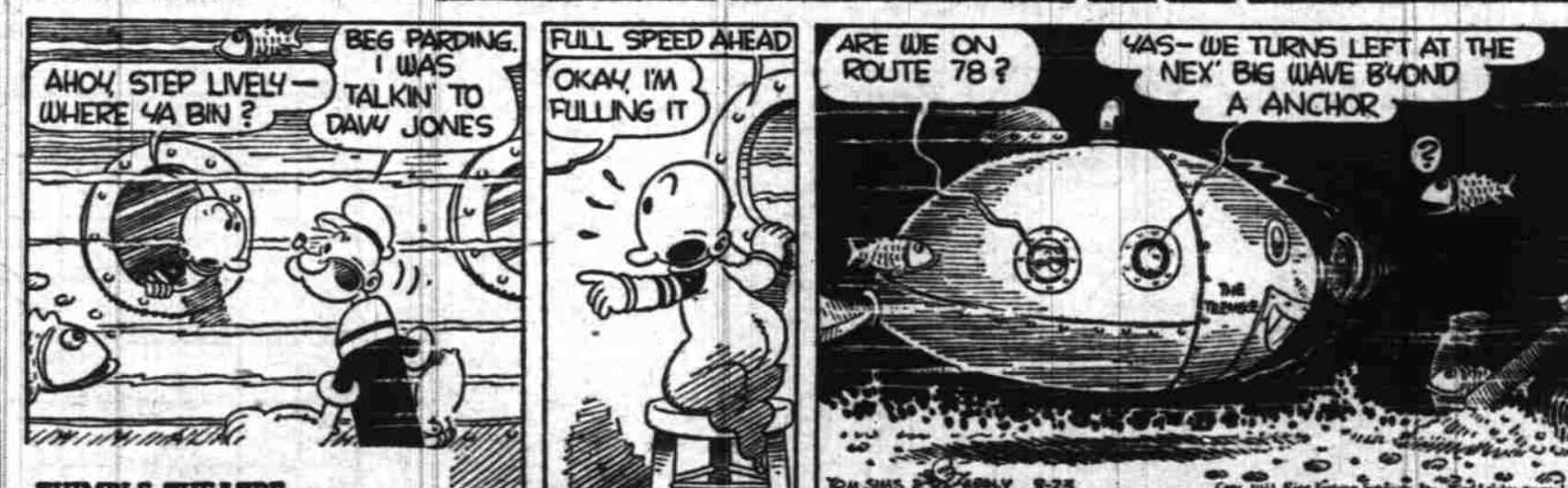
