A nominating convention to place the names of Norman Thomas and Darlington Hoopes, socialist party candidates for president and vice president, respectively, on the November ballot, will be held in Portland at Washington high school August 30.

Thomas will be the convention speaker. The doors will open at 7:30 p.m. and the program will begin at 8 o'clock.

Oregon law requires 250 qualified electors to place candidates of minor parties on the ballot. These may be of any political faith but they must be registered in Oregon and their names and addresses must be filed with the state when the names of the candidates are filed.

Reserved seat tickets will be issued to all delegates thus giving them the best seats in the house for the address by Mr. Thomas. For further information and for tickets interested persons should communicate with him at 7314 S.E. 14th Ave., Portland 2, R. D. Snyder said Wednesday.

US Patients In Germany Treated Well

Wounded American prisoners of war in German hospitals are treated in every respect in the same manner as German patients, except that armed guards are posted in prisoners' wards, according to reports received recently by the American Red Cross. Swiss representatives of the international committee of the Red Cross are permitted to talk with each patient individually, so that unbiased statements as to conditions and treatment are possible.

There are now 20 or more military hospitals (lazarets) scattered through Germany, and many in German-occupied countries, where wounded American prisoners of war are hospitalized. Most of these wounded Americans are airmen and those who are captured in occupied countries usually are moved into Germany as soon as they are fit to travel.

In the ordinary course of events the seriously wounded cases are brought to the notice of the mixed medical commission (two German doctors and a neutral doctor) to decide whether they

should be repatriated. Less seriously wounded men as they recover, are moved through an interrogation center and a transit camp to a regular prisoners of war camp for the duration. American Red Cross parcels are sent regularly to the lazarets as well as to the transit and permanent camps.

Girl Starts Cops on Trail Of Robbers

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—(P)—A girl bank teller with a keen memory for numbers started police on the track of two ex-convicts accused of the \$12,000 daylight holdup of the Grand Ronde state bank last August 2.

The two—Elmer Lane, 32, and Maley Stone, 35—were arrested yesterday in Boise, Idaho.

The girl, Miss Margaret Aird, told interviewers she received a \$5 bill bearing the serial number of the stolen money on August 15. She asked the pallid-faced customer to wait a minute.

"What's the matter?" he asked. "Isn't my money any good?"

"It's good," she said, "but it's stolen."

The man explained to bank officials and state police that he must have accepted the stolen bill while collecting money for wood he had delivered. Leaving a false address, he walked out.

The man—whose description as given by Miss Aird tallied with Elmer Lane—"was very pale, but otherwise did not look like a criminal," she said. "But he said that he ran a fuel truck, and I doubted that he was an outdoor man, with such pallor."

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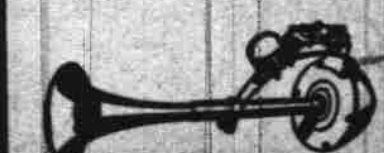
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
