

Natchtigall Rites Tuesday

Native of Russia Dies At Daughter's Home In Midstate

DALLAS, Aug. 24.—Mrs. Marie Abrams Natchtigall, 81, who died at the home of her daughter in Bend last Saturday, August 19, was buried in the Salt Creek cemetery Tuesday afternoon, with the arrangements in charge of Henkle and Bollman of Dallas. The funeral services were held in the Salt Creek Baptist church. Rev. Walter C. Radke of that church officiated.

Mrs. Natchtigall was born in Russia November 7, 1862, and came with her parents to United States at the age of 12. The family settled at Henderson, Nebr. She was married to David Natchtigall Nov. 18, 1879. In 1892 they came to Oregon, to a farm in Polk county. Mr. Natchtigall died in 1943.

At the age of 15 Mrs. Natchtigall became a member of the Mennonite Brethren church, but on coming into the Salt Creek community she joined the Baptist church and was a faithful member until her death.

Surviving are seven children. David, whose address is unknown; John, Toby and Mrs. J. J. Wiebe of Dallas; Mrs. Martin Schiewe and Mrs. Emery Kelley of Portland; Mrs. A. E. Ault of Bend. A daughter died in infancy, a son at the age of seven, and another daughter, Mrs. Lena Buhler Kliever, in 1935, also by two granddaughters and four great grandsons.

DALLAS, Aug. 24.—Harry Volney Crawford, 67, of Falls City, died Saturday, August 19, after an illness of three years. Funeral services were held in the Methodist church at Falls City August 22, with Elder G. T. Dickinson of Salem officiating. Interment was in the Odd Fellows cemetery at Falls City.

Mr. Crawford was born in Madison, Wis., December 22, 1876. He was married to Sarah E. Arrance on April 5, 1900. They came to Oregon in 1905, to Falls City, where they resided since with the exception of four years spent on the coast. Mr. Crawford was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church.

Surviving are the widow, four children, and 14 grandchildren. The children are Mrs. Lucile G. Sullivan of Nehalem, Mrs. Eva May Ferguson of Toledo, Harry Charles Crawford of Dilley, and George Roy Crawford of Taft.

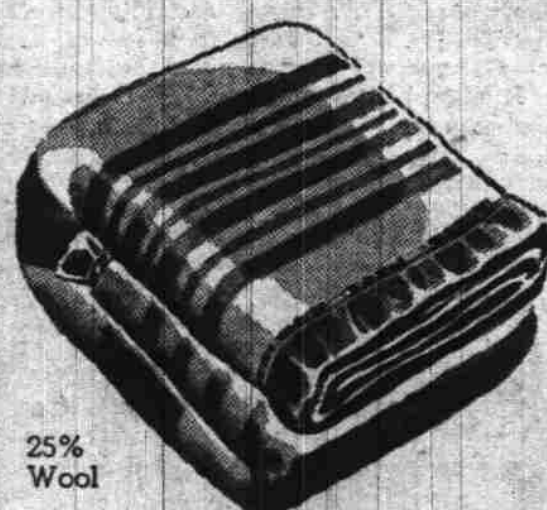

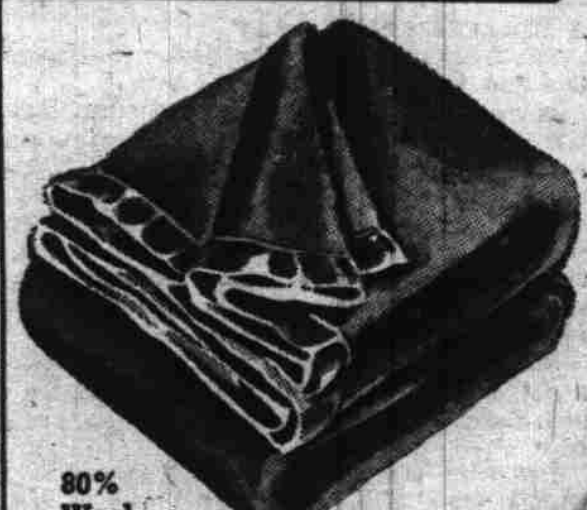

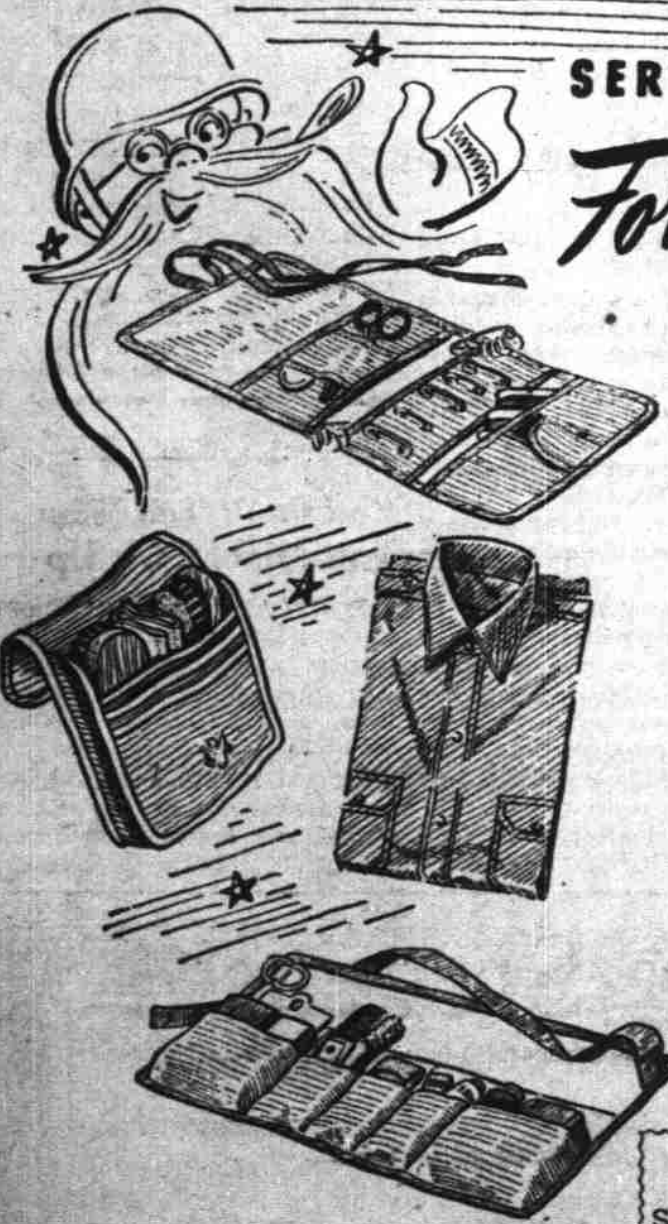
