

News Chiefs Urge Measures For Truthful World News

NEW YORK, Aug. 24 (AP)—Determined and vigorous measures to assure truthful news in all countries are urged by Kent Cooper, executive director of the Associated Press, and Christopher Chancellor, general manager of Reuters, in separate articles in the September issue of "Free World" magazine, out tomorrow.

The "elemental, essential step" to a durable peace, says Cooper,

"is the assurance of the free and untrammelled flow of news between nations."

In his article, "Free News — First Step in Peace", Cooper writes:

"It is a shocking revelation to most people when they are informed that the great masses of intelligent thinking people throughout the world have had no adequate means of knowing the truth about each other."

"Nor will they have such means after this war, unless determined, thoughtful and strenuous effort is immediately applied to this long overlooked problem."

He asserts that "systematic and purposeful distortion, perversion and choking of the news channels" had long been a common practice over much of the world, carried out by secret arrangements between foreign news agencies influenced by governments and other interests.

Background Changes
Now, however, Cooper points out, the entire background has changed, referring particularly to the change in the British agency, Reuters, which became a cooperative operated mutually for the newspapers of Great Britain three years ago, and to the disappearance of several other foreign agencies during the war.

"While government control of the flow of news and information must be presented," Cooper continues, "major governments of the United Nations should lend their benediction to the development of independent news agencies responsible only to the publications, radio stations and other outlets they serve, which in turn are responsible to their public."

"They can now well advance the principle that the peace settlements will include guarantees of the right of men to get, send and publish the news."

Rail Official Pessimistic

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24 (AP)—Within the next three months America will face a transportation problem more critical than at any time during the past three years, a Seattle railroad official said today.

F. T. Westmeyer, district manager for the Association of American Railroads, told northwest shippers that freight loadings, already 4 per cent above last year, will be swollen by heavy crop shipments.

Shippers cited manpower shortages as chief obstacle to speeding up freight movements, and mulled a US employment service plan to secure transient labor.

Frank Giddings Dropped Dead

A fellow workman at the First National bank building, where he was employed as a janitor, Thursday morning identified the body of a man who died late Wednesday on the street at Broadway and Gaines as that of Frank Giddings, 465 Columbia.

When Giddings failed to arrive for work at 12:40 a.m., Victor Sedore believed something must be wrong, but not until after Tuesday morning's Statesman was on the street describing the man who had died at the intersection in a residential area of Salem did he think of the possibility that the man might have died.

The widow, Mary Giddings, survives. Funeral arrangements are to be announced later from Clough-Barrick company.

Lumber Industry Short of Workers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt declared today that the lumber, pulpwood and basic timber products industries face a pressing need for more than 50,000 workers.

McNutt also said that lack of essential equipment is becoming so critical that it may supersede manpower as the paramount problem in lumber, pulpwood and timber production.

Employment in the industries during the first five months of this year was the lowest since January, 1942, McNutt reported, with May employment 54,000 below that of May, 1943.

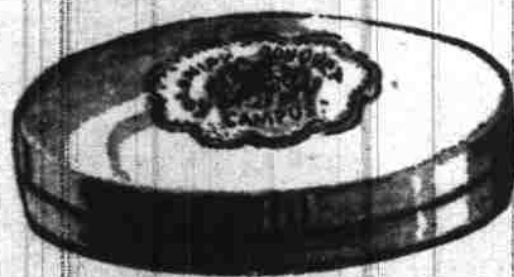
