The "D-Day Kids," as they are known at Silverton and Salem, are at home this weekend and will report back next Wednesday. Mr. and Mrs. Kaufman are asking the entire group to their home Monday night.

The father was 23 years of age when he entered the service in 1918. The son will be 18 on November 18 of this year.

95 Bushel Yield Of Oats Reported

MACLEAY—Wilbur Miller has just demonstrated the falsity of the theory of the early Waldo Hills farmers that summer fallow every other year is necessary to raise a good crop.

Miller has just harvested a 40 acre field of fall sown gray oats which yielded 95 bushels to the acre, much above the average Waldo Hills yield.

Miller has raised hairy vetch on this field for several years to build it up and last year he had crimson clover in that field.

A year ago one crop was raised, the next year the field was plowed and then worked once every week or two, with the dust flying sky high.

Vetch clover and corn were not raised in the Waldo Hills area until recent years.

Socialist Party Can't Address Men Overseas

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 — (AP) — The war department withdrew tonight its previous agreement to give the socialist party an opportunity to broadcast a political address to troops overseas.

The socialist party had contended that President Roosevelt's speech at Bremerton, Wash., Aug. 12 was a political address and has asked equal radio time for a similar broadcast. This morning the war department announced this request would be granted but tonight Acting Secretary of War John J. McCloy said this decision had been overruled.

"It has been called to my attention," McCloy said in a statement, "that a decision was made by an army agency to grant time to the socialist party for an overseas rebroadcast to troops on the basis of that party's contention that the president's report at Bremerton was a political address within the meaning of title V of public law 277."

"I have reconsidered this decision. The war department determines that the president's report was 'not political' and accordingly no time will be granted to the socialist party on such basis."

Public law 277 is the soldier vote law, and title V, recently amended, is the section which governs the dissemination of political news and propaganda to troops under official sponsorship.

Mothers Run From Homes Says Report

PORTLAND, Aug. 25 — (AP) — Latest runaways from home reported by the state public welfare commission are not adventurous school children but their mothers.

The war has accentuated maternal delinquency, Administrator Loa Howard said at a monthly meeting as she pointed to reports of increased child-desertions in five counties.

Mrs. Howard pleaded for more foster homes in Oregon—homes ready to accept small charges on two hours' notice. The 436 certified homes available are not enough, she said. She cited a case in Marion county, where four youngsters were abandoned by a young mother.

During July 19,524 elderly people were aided, of which more than 40 per cent received a \$40 maximum, the commission reported.

Persons receiving old-age assistance may take seasonal or other temporary employment without curtailment of their allotments, the commission said.

Dewey Home To Prepare For Campaign

PAWLING, N. Y., Aug. 25 — (AP) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey arrived at his farm near here tonight for an intensive and extended weekend of "briefing" his case for the presidency.

On his three hour motor trip from the executive mansion at Albany, the republican nominee was accompanied by Elliott V. Bell, state superintendent of banks and one of his chief advisers on speech drafting, and two secretaries. They are expected to help him work at campaign speeches over the weekend and possibly well into next week.

Dewey brought with him statistics compiled by a staff of research experts who have been assigned to cull the facts and figures on which he will base his campaign to head off a fourth term for President Roosevelt.

Earlier, the governor had declined to comment on President Roosevelt's news conference statement that he had been in touch with Wendell L. Willkie concerning a possible meeting of the two.

Likewise he withheld comment on the joint statement of Secretary Hull and John Foster Dulles who have been Dewey's Washington representative on postwar security.

Dulles, who is in line to succeed Hull as state secretary if the republicans win in November, is known to have been in frequent contact with the governor during his talks in the capital.

While the nominee is dictating the basic outlines of the addresses he will make next month on a three week tour of the Pacific coast and back, his campaign organizers are expected to complete their work on a detailed itinerary.
