Hop Pickers Catch Breath At Fuggles End

MT. ANGEL - There was a full in the mad hop picking scramble this week end. The Aman - Walker crew have a twoweek layoff between the fuggles, harvesting of which was completed last week, and the late hops which will not be ready until after Labor day.

The Wellman hop fields, known as the Butte Orchards, discontinued picking Friday and Saturday but will resume work Monday.

The only large yards where picking was underway Saturday are those of the abbey, usually referred to as the college yards. Here they are besieged for work by the pickers from the other yards all of whom have to be turned away since their own crew is larger than needed. All the growers hereabouts

seem to have more pickers than needed. Work is usually shutdown early in the afternoon. As a general rule pickers claim they make less than last year, it seems a common thing to have them announce wages of ten dollars and better in spite of the early closing down.



PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28 -(AP) Wheat was down one to three cents a bushel the past week at Portland, the war food administration reported today.

A slow demand from buyers at coast terminals was said to be responsible for the downward trend in cash wheat. Only high protein hard whites in general was purchased by mills.

Support prices of \$1.45 from the CCC did not maintain values, said the WDA. Since the current bids are now below loan levels, farmers are selling only small amounts of wheat.

Much wheat has been placed under loan, it was reported, Seasonally heavy wheat receipts were accredited to Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals. Portland had 505 carloads out of approximately 1265.
