Verbal Exchange Breaks Out Between Hillman, Rep. Church

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—(P)—A hot exchange broke out today between Rep. Church (R-Ill.) and Sidney Hillman during a house committee hearing at which Hillman reported his CIO political action committee had spent \$371,066, including \$67,320 in primaries and state elections.

Church set off the clash by declaring that the CIO's political plan, directed by Hillman, is "communistic - engineered from the top down" with local unions having no say in it.

"Would you say DuPont's contribution of \$186,000 to the republicans and PEW's of \$108,000 came from the bottom up?" Hillman retorted, adding:

Accuses Church

"You're trying to prejudice the public against us. It's a below the belt campaign. I'll put my record of fighting communism against yours any time. I'm opposed to communism because I'm opposed to all totalitarianism—even in industry."

As Hillman appeared before the house group investigating campaign expenditures, Sen. Bridges (R-NH) told the senate that a magazine article by Hillman entitled "The Truth About the PAC" only covered up the "real truth" that the PAC is an "enormous danger" to labor interests.

Refuses Reply

Bridges said the New Republic, which published the article, had refused to give Sen. Butler (R-Neb.) the same space for a reply. Butler's proposed reply, Hillman's article and an exchange of letters between Butler and Bruce Bliven, New Republic editor, were placed in the Congressional Record by Bridges.

The exchange of correspondence showed that the magazine had declined to print an article of the same length as Hillman's but had offered to publish a communication of about 1200 words. Bliven said in New York today that the magazine had advised Butler it could not print any article which it could not support editorially.

Defends Stand

Hillman told the house investigators that while the CIO backed the Roosevelt-Truman slate, it might support a republican in any

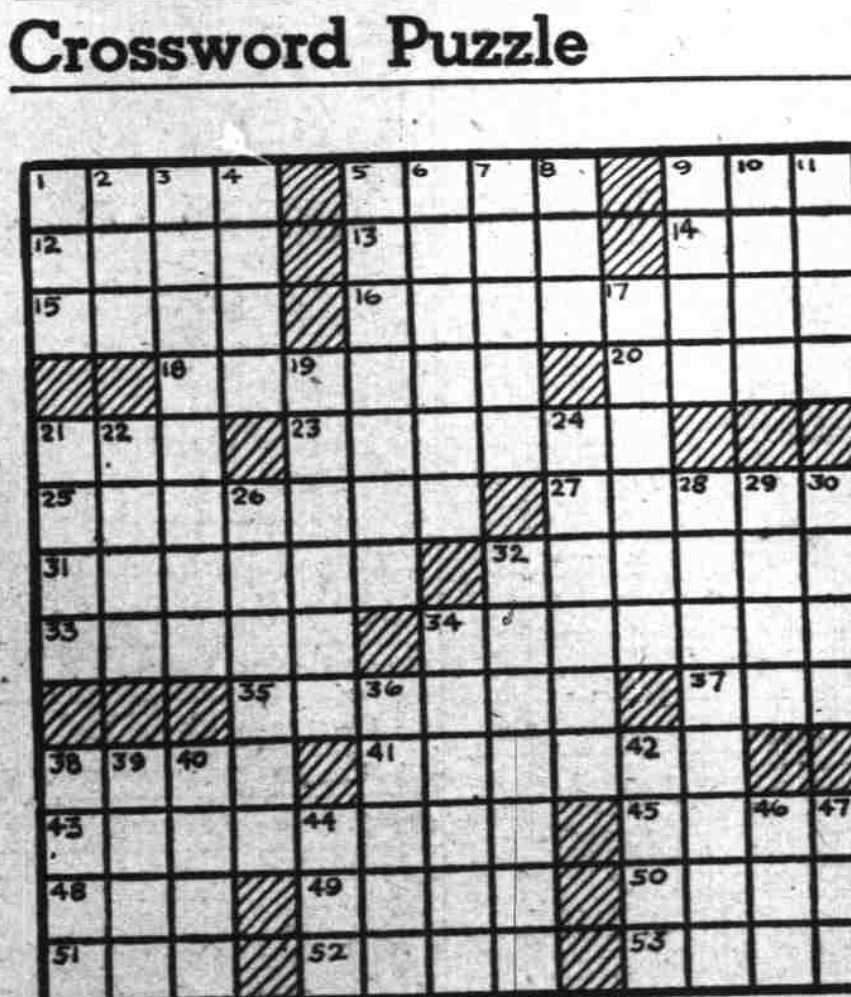
