FDR Criticizes Sen. Ferguson

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. — (AP) — President Roosevelt took Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich) to task today for saying he had word from "reliable sources" that Donald M. Nelson would succeed James F. Byrnes as war mobilization director upon Nelson's return from China.

Asked about the Ferguson statement, the president said that if the senator would tell him where he got his information he would give him an answer.

He added he had some rights to know where certain information comes from and chided those who try to hide identity of their informants by using such terms as high official sources. He said he sometimes wonders about the source and that he was going to try to find out where Ferguson got his information.

The president smiled and said he had spread a few rumors himself to watch how and by whom they are spread and appeared to enjoy it.

Saipan Yanks Invent New Laundry Method

KELSO, Wash., Aug. 29. — (AP) — A soldier on Saipan wrote his parents here of a new laundry method he helped work out.

Cpl. Don Gregory wrote, "We converted a Japanese cement mixer into a wash machine. It works okay, but if we had hot water it would be still better."

Effort Made To Encourage Soldier Vote

Army and navy officials are doing everything possible so that service men and women overseas may vote at the general election in Oregon next November. Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel, Jr., reported upon his return here Tuesday from Cincinnati, Ohio, where he attended the annual conference of the secretaries of state association.

Farrel said he and other secretaries of state spent an entire day in conference with postal officials of the army and navy discussing the soldiers' voting program. "I was advised by these officials," Farrel said, "that soldiers' ballots will receive second highest priority in the government overseas transportation category. Highest priority is for war ammunition and medical supplies."

Information received at the conference reiterated previous statements by federal officials that a maximum of 36 days will be required to deliver and return soldiers' ballots from any section of the world where Oregon servicemen and women are stationed. In Oregon many county clerks will start sending out these absentee ballots on the 44th day preceding the November election.

Principal difficulty in delivering the ballots, Farrel said, apparently will be in cases where the service men and women recently were shifted from one theatre of war to another or on furlough. There also will be cases, federal officials told Farrel, where service men have been killed or seriously wounded during the interim between the time of making application for ballots and their delivery overseas.

Army officials praised Oregon's soldier voting program, Farrel said. Supplementing the state procedure for soldier voting, Gov. Earl Snell has certified the federal ballot.

Woman Has Appendectomy In 'Iron Lung'

SEATTLE, Aug. 29. — (AP) — An apparently successful appendectomy was performed on a woman in an "iron lung" today at the King county hospital.

The operation on Mrs. Theda Anna Carl, 24-year-old mother of two boys, was described by hospital executives as rare in medical annals.

She was stricken with acute appendicitis this morning, attendants reported, in the iron lung that had encased her since infantile paralysis struck her August 4.

She was wheeled into the operating room in the "lung." Oxygen was administered while one section of the casing was lifted.

"We gave her only a light anesthetic," a staff physician said. "She came through the operation in excellent condition. She was a courageous and cheerful patient and we have great hope for her."

The operation is the second hazard to confront the truck driver's wife since she entered the hospital. Once previously a power failure stopped the mechanical breathing aid, but alert attendants quickly started working an emergency hand pump until power was restored.

Church Faces Bright Future

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Aug. 29. — (AP) — Despite world turmoil "We are faced with the greatest days of the Christian church," Dr. Kenneth S. Latourette of Yale university told 100 delegates to the third annual northwest conference of Congregational Christian churches today.

"Christianity is more deeply rooted among more different peoples than ever before," he said. "And Christians of the world are coming together as never before in Christian history."

Dr. Albert Rasmussen, director of research and survey of the Chicago Congregational union, challenged churches to assume their responsibility of helping migrant war workers adjust themselves in new communities. He said more than 30,000 Americans have changed homes in the last three years.

WPB Orders Further Cutbacks In US Aluminum Production

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. — (AP) — The war production board today ordered further cutbacks in aluminum production amounting to approximately 30,000,000 pounds of aluminum ingot per month. This will reduce total output of the light metal to slightly less than half of the peak 188,000,000 pounds a month reached early last winter.

Fewer than 1,000 workers will be affected by the reduction, WPB said, with 500 of these let out by the closing of the government-owned plant in Los Angeles.

WPB said that the acute labor shortage in the Los Angeles area was a factor in decision to shut down that plant.

Other plants affected are government-owned facilities in Spokane, Wash.; Troutdale, Ore.; Jones Mills, Ark., and the Aluminum company of America plants at Alcoa, Tenn.; Bardin, NC; Massena, NY, and Vancouver, Wash. It was explained that ALCOA's contract with the defense plant corporation calls for dividing reduction schedules between government-owned and ALCOA plants at the present level of production.

At the same time WPB officials reported that scheduled imports of aluminum from Canada have been curtailed sharply for the remainder of the year and delivery of 250,000 pounds of Canadian metal under contract has been postponed indefinitely.

WPB said that figures on reductions in the ALCOA plants are not yet available.

Road Fund of \$16,500,000 Set For Oregon

Approximately \$16,500,000 will be available annually for road construction operations in Oregon the three years following the close of the war, under a bill approved recently by the senate postwar roads committee, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock reported here Tuesday.

Baldock's estimate was based on an analysis of the senate bill a few hours after its receipt here.

Under the new senate bill Oregon would receive \$4,144,000 for the federal aid system, \$3,315,000 for the secondary road system and \$1,304,000 for the urban highways or \$8,763,000 for each of the three post-war years. In addition, there would be available in each of these years \$3,405,925 of forest highway funds.

The house bill fixed federal aid at \$3,320,000, secondary and feeder roads \$1,840,000, urban roads \$2,210,000 or a total of \$7,370,000. Forest funds under this bill would be in the same amount.

The matching basis is decreased an average of about 46 per cent of state funds to 40 per cent.

The federal funds allocated to the rural highways are on the same basis as the old, established formula, one-third population, one-third area and one-third mileage of post roads.

Municipal funds would be apportioned among the states in the ratio which the population in municipalities of 5000 or more in each state bears to the total population in municipalities of 5000 or more in all states as shown by the last federal census. The former bill apportioned all the funds on the basis of a formula giving weight of 50 per cent to population, 25 per cent to area and 25 per cent to post road mileage, and limited the use of urban money to municipalities of 10,000 population or more.

Senator Guy Cordon played an important part in the approval of the senate bill, Baldock declared.

Lewiston Reports Food Poisoning

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 29. — (AP) — Twenty persons are in a Lewiston hospital and an undetermined number ill at their homes from the effect of what is believed to be food poisoning. The victims ate lunch at a drug store fountain today where all employees also became ill. Dr. A. J. White, Nez Perce county physician, said the victims suffered violent nausea.

E. G. Hoffman, north central district health unit bacteriologist, is making tests to determine the nature of the poison. The lunch, served to approximately 100, consisted of weiners and potato salad.

Deadlines Set For Briefs in Pension Case

Attorneys for the prosecution in the case designed to keep the "little Townsend plan" constitutional amendment off the November ballot have until tonight to file a brief in the suit.

Circuit judges of Marion county have given Attorney General George Neuner, representing the secretary of state, and other attorneys interested in upholding the legal right of the amendment to a place on the ballot until Thursday night to file their brief.

The suit, brought in the name of T. Lester Johnson, Sherman county district attorney, was argued on demurrer before Judge E. M. Page and George Duncan here Monday. Johnson contends that the amendment is invalid under the state constitution because it contains six proposed constitutional amendments instead of one.

An opinion in the proceeding is expected early next week.

Jaycees View Tarawa Film

Sgt. H. M. Doney of the Salem marine recruiting office showed "With the Marines at Tarawa," a technicolor film of one of the bloodiest battles of the Pacific campaign, at the Junior Chamber of Commerce luncheon meeting Tuesday noon at the Golden Pheasant.

Filed by marine combat photographers on the scene of action, the picture gives a complete and accurate account of the battle from the preliminary shelling and bombing of the atoll by naval ships and planes to the rounding up of the last Jap snipers by the marines.

Wendell Swing, president of the Jaycees, announced plans for a Jaycee dance for members and their wives September 5 at the West Salem Legion hall. Jack Hann and Irwin Harris are co-chairmen for the dance.

Rifle Range Planned For Marine Barracks

Paramushiro Gets Pounding By Liberators

AN ALEUTIAN ISLAND BASE, Aug. 26. — (Delayed) — (AP) — Liberators' bomber pilots of the 11th army air force reported seeing 25 to 50 buildings burning after their raid against the Kashiwabara army depot on Paramushiro in the Kuriles today, one of the most active days of the North Pacific air war against the island chain guarding the northern route to Japan.

Lts. Corbin Terry, Temple, Tex., Ellis F. Millard, Bradenton, Fla., and John A. Nixon, jr., Omaha, Neb., reported they could see the damaging results from their planes.

After this early morning strike, other army Liberators and Ventura's of fleet air wing four struck at Kurile installations and shipping in daylight in a triple threat offensive.

Docks, supply dumps and barges at Onnekotan island, just south of Paramushiro, were smashed and left burning by Liberators. The navy Venturas made a follow-up raid on the same targets, strafing shipping at low level.

All planes returned from the three missions.

Portland Club Hears Smith

PORTLAND, Aug. 29. — (AP) — Dr. G. Herbert Smith, president of Willamette university, told the Portland Kiwanis club today that America must have broadly educated men to meet the great problems that will come in the war's wake.

Dr. Smith, member of a newly formed national advisory committee on colleges in wartime, said there was some doubt among the members, including himself, that the wartime plight of colleges justifies their asking federal aid.

"We face the problem," he said, "of whether we as educators can afford to have the federal government fooling with education."

Steel Products Mill Beset With Pickets

PORTLAND, Aug. 29. — (AP) — Judge Walter L. Toozie today ordered AFL officials to show why an injunction should not be issued to prevent picketing of the Peters Co.'s steel products mill.

The company filed suit to prevent AFL picketing of the plant. Officials of the central labor council, building trades council and metal trades council were asked to appear in circuit court Sept. 7.

Manhunt Ends For Herder

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 29. — (AP) — A two-day manhunt ended near Antelope last night after the surrender of a sheep herder accused of fatally shooting his 13-year-old stepdaughter, the sheriff's office said today.

Charles Wilson, 45, crawled from a haystack and surrendered to two farmers. His stepdaughter, Genevieve Fulkerson, was shot as she slept beside her mother, who was slightly injured by the bullet.

District Attorney M. W. Wilkinson quoted Mrs. Wilson as saying her husband returned to their Antelope home intoxicated Saturday night, fired a pistol after a quarrel, then fled.

A sheriff's posse tracked Wilson 12 miles, then lost the trail in rugged sagebrush country. Sheriff Harold Dexton brought him to The Dalles jail.

Opera Leader Dies Suddenly

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29. — (AP) — Angelo Canarutto, 35, musical director for the new opera company of New York and former assistant conductor of the Metropolitan Opera association, died suddenly from a heart attack late today while motoring near here.

Officials of the new opera company announced that Frank Roth, first trumpeter, would conduct the two remaining performances of "The Merry Widow" here. Both Canarutto and Roth joined the company in Seattle recently.

Canarutto had conducted the Chicago Civic opera, Cincinnati summer opera, San Carlo opera and Los Angeles opera companies. The widow and a brother survive.
