Salem Marine Color Guard On Guam Isle

GUAM, (delayed)—Old Glory flies over Guam officially for the first time since Dec. 10, 1941, when an overwhelming force of Japanese troops occupied this historic island.

The American colors were hoisted at a brief ceremony in which Sgt. Robert J. Williams, 23, of Salem, Ore., was a member of the color guard.

In the distance marine artillery batteries whistled and Leathernecks extended their gains from two beachheads.

FDR Sets First Campaign Talk For Sept. 23

President Roosevelt announced Sept. 23 as the date for his first political speech of his re-election campaign yesterday as three republican governors formally opened the campaigning for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

Firing the first big broadside for the republicans were Governors Earl Warren of California, Dwight H. Green of Illinois and Raymond E. Baldwin of Connecticut on a blue network broadcast.

They hit particularly at Sidney Hillman, head of the CIO political action committee and ardent backer of the Roosevelt-Truman ticket, and at big city democratic leaders.

Warren said the republican party does not intend to "buy" the election and would insist that Hillman "and his committee" be barred from doing so.

Green declared that all details in the renomination of President Roosevelt were "dictated by the new deal high command and carried into execution by the bosses of the big city new deal machines, Kelly and Hague and Flynn and Hannegan."

Baldwin said Dewey believed in honest government and declared "that is why the political bosses have staked all they've got to beat Tom Dewey."

The broadcast was the first of a series to be delivered by GOP governors in behalf of Dewey's White House bid.

President Roosevelt told a news conference his first campaign speech would be made in Washington the evening of Sept. 23 before a group which will be organized by Daniel Tobin, president of the AFL International Brotherhood of Teamsters. He launched his 1940 third term campaign with a speech to a Washington meeting of teamsters.

The White House was the scene also for another political announcement earlier in the day. After a call there, Gifford Pinchot, former republican governor of Pennsylvania, told reporters he was for a fourth term because the choice between the president and Dewey "is like choosing between a veteran leader of many battles and a raw recruit."

Pinchot voted for Mr. Roosevelt in 1940 but did not support him in his first two campaigns. Vice President Wallace was another White House visitor, his first meeting with the president since the democratic convention where Wallace lost in a renomination bid.
