Government Seizes 10 Coal Mines

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 31—(AP)—The government, by direction of the president, seized 10 coal mines in western Pennsylvania today in an effort to halt a work stoppage that has thrown nearly 8000 miners into idleness.

The dispute leading to the walk-outs centered on a demand by supervisory workers—numbering less than 300—at the mines for company recognition of the clerical, technical and supervisory employees union, newly organized.

John McAlpine, president of the supervisory workers unit, declined

comment, saying he has not yet received official word from the White House or the interior department.

Members of McAlpine's union are charged with making mine safety inspections.

John F. Busarello, president of UMW district five, said at Pittsburgh: "Our miners (production workers) are not on strike. They cannot enter the mines without safety inspections by the supervisory employes. The miners will resume work when the mines are inspected by the supervisors under provisions of the state law."

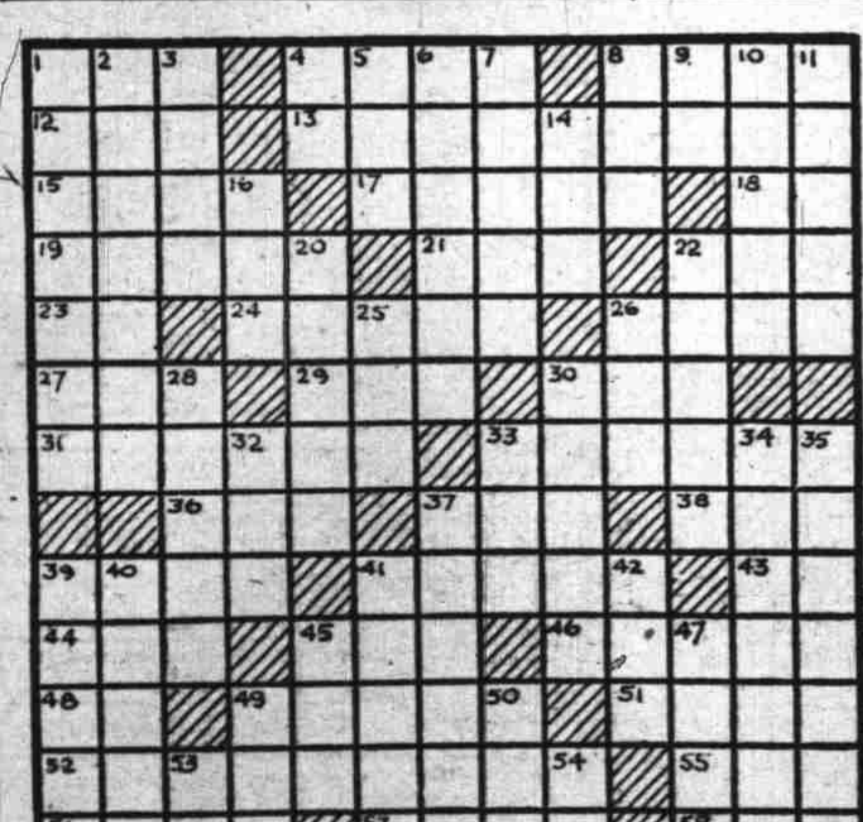
