SEATTLE, Sept. 6 .- (AP)-The future peace and prosperity of America depends on the re-election of President Roosevelt at the November election, which will be "one of the crucial points in our history," Sen. Claude Pepper (D-Fla) asserted tonight.

Pepper conferred with western Washington democratic leaders shortly after his arrival on his West coast speaking tour and then held a press conference before his address.

Coast to be Busy At the press conference, he expressed the opinion that with the emphasis in the war swinging to the Pacific the "burden of production for the war" will fall on the Pacific coast states, with war output being increased in the western area until the Japanese are

He predicted "extraordinary expansion" of western industry in the postwar era as a result of the impetus received in war produc-

"But," he added, "the development can take place only under administration friendly to the west.

Expanded Markets

"The Pacific coast will have expanded natural markets but to obtain a maximum of markets it will be necessary to revise the freight rate structure. We purpose seeing the west and south get a lower fright rate that will put them on a parity with the much lower rates enjoyed by the east." Republican candidate, Gov.

Thomas E. Dewey of New York, opposes such rate revision, Pepper added, "because he is afraid it will take industries out of New York state."




