Pat McCarran Win Assured

CARSON CITY, Nev., Sept. 6-(P)—Sen. Pat McCarran, hailed as an independent thinker and criticized as an isolationist, was assured Nevada's democratic senatorial nomination today as his opponent, Lt. Gov. Vail Pittman, trailing by 1178 votes, conceded defeat in one of this state's hottest campaigns.

With all but 22 of the 283 precincts reporting, the 68-year-old chairman of the senate judiciary committee had 10,937 votes to Pittman's 9759 as results of yesterday's election were tabulated.

Pittman, KLY publisher and brother of the late Sen. Key Pittman, extended his congratulations. It was estimated several days might be required to compile the final vote.

Cigarette Smoke Hurts Vision Of Night Pilots

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 6-(P)—Inhaling the smoke of even one cigarette, the zero medical association of the United States was told today, impairs the keen eyesight needed at night by military fliers.

The sight loss is due to carbon monoxide from the burning tip. This loss is nothing likely to be noticed in normal life, nor does it have any known bad effects on health.

But the impairment is important to night fighting aviators working at the threshold of vision, the point where they can just barely discern enemies or objectives.

Until the discovery reported today it had not been believed the carbon monoxide in a single smoke could affect vision. The report was made by Doctors R.

A. McFarland, M. P. Halperin and J. I. Niven of the division of research, graduate school of business administration, Harvard university.
