

Thumbnail Of War!

Invasion Front—The US First army struck down the high road to Berlin, fighting within 39 miles of the German city of Aachen; the Third army battled into Metz; British, Canadians and Poles cut off the channel ports of Calais and Boulogne.

Pacific—American Liberator bombers smashed 15 Japanese planes in a strike at Celebes, west of New Guinea; American carrier planes struck the Palau islands; fighters and bombers swept Halmhara island.

In the Air—Robot battered London learned the flying bomb menace has ended.

Russian Front—Germans in the Balkans—estimated at 260,000—faced a dangerous and almost hopeless situation as a result of new Russian thrusts; Tito's Yugoslav partisans and Soviet forces joined east of Belgrade; Bulgaria found herself technically at war with both the allies and Germany.

Italian Front—American troops closed in on Pistoia and other Italian outposts of the Germans' Gothic line defenses northwest of Florence.

European War Flashback

Sept. 8, 1918—South of the Aisne river American troops beat off repeated German counterattacks, while British and French armies continued their pressure on the retreating Germans on the linked-up allied fronts, making gains toward St. Quentin and Laon.

Sept. 8, 1940—As the Germans made another raid on the London area, Reichsmarschal Goering announced he had taken personal command of the German air attacks on Britain.

- 1—Russian Front: 312 miles (from outside Pultusk).
- 2—Western Front: 362 miles (from Brera, Netherlands).
- 3—Southern France: 510 miles (from Arbois).
- 4—Italian Front: 595 miles (from Riccione Marina).

Dewey Pleads For Rebirth of Faith in Future

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7 (AP)—A "rebirth of faith in our future" was called for tonight by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, in the opening address of his campaign for the presidency.

"The new deal really believes that unemployment is bound to be with us permanently. It says so. They will change this 12-year-old tune between now and election. They have done it every time but they've always come back to it after election."

"The new deal really believes that we cannot have good social legislation and also good jobs for all. I believe with all my heart."

"There Must Be Jobs"

"There can be — there must be," he went on, "jobs and opportunity for all, without discrimination on account of race, creed, color or national origin. There must be jobs in industry, in agriculture, in mines, in stores, in offices, at a high level of wages and salaries. There must be opportunity and incentive for men and women to go into business for themselves."

Asserting that victory is in sight and that the next four years will be largely, if not wholly, peacetime years, Dewey declared, "We are proving that we can wage war" and that Germany and Japan shall be given the lesson of their lives—right in Berlin and Tokyo."

Defeatism Charged

But, he said: "Now, Washington is getting all set for another depression. They intend to keep the young men in the army. The new deal spokesmen are daily announcing that reconversion will be difficult, if not impossible."

"They say that relief rolls will be enormous. They drearily promise us that we will need to prepare for an army of unemployed bigger than the armies we have put in the field against the Germans and the Japanese. That's what's wrong with the new deal. That's why it's time for a change."

Churchill Gets Set for Talks With Roosevelt

LONDON, Friday, Sept. 8 (AP)—With victory over Germany generally regarded as a matter of weeks, Prime Minister Churchill probably now is holding talks with his ministers preparatory to a "win the peace" conference with President Roosevelt in Canada.

The conference of the two leaders may be expected to center on these two matters:

1. Untangling the wreckage left by the Nazis in Europe—including the policing of Germany, division of occupational spheres between the United States, Britain and Russia and deciding upon the machinery through which liberated countries can choose postwar governments.

2. Curbing the demobilization fever that is sure to rise in the United States and Britain upon the defeat of Germany and before Japan has been finally crushed—placing the final stamp upon military operations in the Pacific for the last time at Japan and consideration of the role the Soviet Union is to play.

With the presidential campaign underway in the United States and the consequent danger of the conference becoming embroiled in political issues, the feeling among many observers in London was that the meeting must be held outside the US—probably at Quebec.

The conference comes with military operations in their most satisfactory state of the entire war—and yet with multiple possibilities for disruptions in the diplomatic field.

GOP's Critical Of New Deal

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Several republican representatives criticized the new deal administration in house speeches today and one, Rep. Case of South Dakota, assailed what he termed "the theory that President Roosevelt is an indispensable man."

Case said the president had "the best inside information" about Japanese activities prior to Pearl Harbor and added "even with this knowledge he failed not only to keep us out of war... but brought war to us in a crushing, surprise attack."

Rep. Ritzley of Oklahoma declared the philosophy of Roosevelt and Jackson has been "ruined by the philosophy of Franklin D. Roosevelt, Hopkins, Harnett and the rest."

Thomas Raps Riots, Strikes

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 7 (AP)—Denouncing riots and strikes which he said are fomented by "racial prejudices," Norman Thomas, socialist candidate for president, tonight declared his party's platform seeks passage of a permanent fair employment practice law, a federal anti-lynching statute and repeal of all poll tax qualifications.

In a speech prepared for delivery before a socialist party rally, he said: "We shall have neither peace, nor freedom, nor fellowship until racial discrimination is conquered."

"The socialist party, platform and candidates are leading the way toward a genuine brotherhood of man regardless of age. This is today x x x a necessity for peace and freedom and plenty."

Forest Fires Hit Montana

MISSOULA, Mont., Sept. 7 (AP)—With control of a 600-acre fire near Sanders, Idaho, on the St. Joe forest, expected hourly, another blaze six miles south of the first sprang up this afternoon and was spreading rapidly through a partially cut-over area, Fire Control Chief C. S. Crocker of forest region No. 1 said tonight.

Crews were being sent from Spokane, with bulldozers and other heavy equipment to fight the fire.

The original Sanders blaze was manned by 550 fighters, including crews from the Kanikau, Coeur d'Alene, Clearwater and Nez Perce forests, soldiers from Geiger field, Spokane, and sailors from the Farragut, Idaho, base.

Strikers Vote Work Return

DETROIT, Sept. 7 (AP)—Striking maintenance men employed at the Briggs Manufacturing Co.'s Connor plant voted tonight to return to work on their regular shifts, ending a shutdown that made 11,000 aircraft production workers idle in addition to about 265 strikers.

Maintenance men whose strike has made an estimated 8000 idle at the Packard Motor Car Co. have scheduled a back-to-work meeting for tomorrow morning.

The regional war labor board and the international executive board of the United Automobile Workers (CIO) intervened in both disputes.

'Lone Ranger' Faces Trouble From Outside

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 7 (AP)—Eighty-year-old Al Jennings doesn't deny he was a pretty bad character in the wild, raw days of the old southwest but, he insisted in a suit filed today, he never was as bad as "The Lone Ranger" radio program allegedly depicted him last Aug. 7.

Jennings, the train robber who turned evangelist, writer and lecturer after he was pardoned by President Roosevelt in 1905 for his misdeeds, demanded \$100,000 in actual and exemplary damages from the Don Lee Broadcasting Co. and the Weber Baking Co., sponsor of the program.

Jennings, who recently has been a technical advisor for motion pictures, alleged the program attributed to him certain crimes which he didn't commit. Also, he asserted, he was portrayed as attempting to induce a young man to join his band of train robbers which, he asserted, he never did.

Jennings claimed the program has seriously damaged the reputation he has built up since he was freed from prison early in the century.

Oil Agreement Hearings Will Be Postponed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) announced today that the senate foreign relations committee had decided to postpone hearings on the recently negotiated Anglo-American oil agreement until after the November election.

In a statement, Connally asserted it would be difficult to conduct a public inquiry in the absence of a quorum of members.

President Roosevelt recently sent the agreement to the senate in the form of a treaty, requiring ratification by two thirds of the senate's members.

Connally said the committee voted the postponement at a meeting this week "in view of the probable recess of congress."

"The committee is anxious to have the views not only of the industry but of the public generally on this important matter," the Texan said. "It would be difficult to conduct hearings in the absence of a quorum of the senate."

Editor Backs News Trading

HILLSBORO, Ore., Sept. 7 (AP)—World-wide freedom of news exchange would be "one of the greatest safeguards of world peace," W. Verna McKinney of Hillsboro, Ore., president of the National Editorial association, said tonight.

McKinney's comments followed announcement from Washington, D.C., that congress had been asked to declare itself in favor of international "agreements" guaranteeing such freedom of news exchange.

"Our association is definitely in favor of such a guarantee, and we believe it would do much to prevent future wars," he said.

He said that the National Editorial association had asked Kent Cooper, executive director and general manager of the Associated Press, to speak on safeguards of news freedom at an advisory board meeting soon in Chicago.

Vets May Get Farm Loans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Servicemen who settle on farms when they return home will need "something to work with," Rep. Jed Johnson (D-Okla.) said today in introducing a bill to create a fund for agriculture loans to veterans or families of deceased veterans.

The bill would authorize the reconstruction finance corporation to lend the department of agriculture \$40,000,000 for the fund.

Legislation to authorize the war department to give the defense plant corporation (DFC) control over the old Roseburg, Ore., rifle range was introduced by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.). The measure specifies that DFC must in return provide land elsewhere in the area for use as a target range by the state guard.

Onion Plantings Hit All-Time High in State

PORTLAND, Sept. 7 (AP)—The 5000 acres of late summer onions planted this year in Oregon represent an all-time high, according to the bureau of agricultural economics.

Willkie Blasts Platforms of Both Parties

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (AP)—Wendell L. Willkie says that both the democratic and republican parties showed cowardice and "prepared soil for the sowing of World War III" by adopting evasive platforms at their Chicago conventions.

The 1940 republican presidential nominee, writing in the Sept. 16 issue of Collier's magazine, said both platforms presented an "irreconcilable paradox" by promising lasting peace without loss of sovereignty.

Declaring that such an implication only could confuse the people, Willkie said the nations must agree to limitation of individual choice of freedom in certain situations in the interest of international cooperation for peace.

Calling upon the rival candidates to supply their interpretations of the platforms, Willkie left open the question as to whom he would support in the November presidential elections.

"It must be said," he wrote, "that on the general question of foreign policy the democratic plank is in many ways better than the republican plank."

Lucille Ball Wants Divorce

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 7 (AP)—Two days ago Lucille Ball and her Cuban husband, Desi Arnaz, attended a party together and held hands and appeared very happy.

Yesterday, she revealed today, they called their marriage off.

Today the red-haired movie star filed suit for divorce, charging Desi, a private in the army, with extreme cruelty.

Lucille, who is 33, and Arnaz, who is 27, were married in Greenwich, Conn., nearly four years ago after meeting in front of a camera when they played in the same picture.
