

Gov. Dewey Jubilant Over GOP Landslide in Maine Primary

VALENTINE, Nebr., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey today hailed what he called the "greatest republican landslide" in Maine's history as auguring the election of a GOP congressional and national ticket this November.

Greeted here on his transcontinental campaign tour by a colorful outpouring of Sioux Indians, cowboys and ordinary citizens, the republican presidential nominee was obviously elated at the election of a republican state ticket in Maine by a majority, as he figured it, of 70 1/2 per cent. Show Confidence

"The people in Maine," he told a news conference at the nearby ranch of former Nebraska Gov. Sam R. McKelvie, "have demonstrated a rising confidence in the leadership of the republican party which I have found evidenced every place as I came across the United States.

"It's becoming clearer that the people have decided not only in their state but also in their national government, as evidenced by congressional figures, that the peace and prosperity of the United States and the world will be better served by the election of a new and competent administration."

GOP Congress

They have demonstrated also, he went on, "that they propose to elect a republican congress to work with the new administration."

"That," he said, "will bring a new and refreshing harmony between the executive and legislative branches of the government which has been so long needed and which will be so essential to the problems we will face next January."

Dewey, arriving here from Des Moines en route to Sheridan, Wyo., Billings, Mont., and the Pacific coast, smiled broadly at the red-shirted, mounted cowboys and Indians, dressed in full regalia, who were awaiting him at the little Valentine station.

John L. Lewis Criticizes FDR In UMW Talk

CINCINNATI, Sept. 12.—(AP)—John L. Lewis criticized the Roosevelt administration today in his opening speech to the United Mine workers convention, appealed to members indirectly to turn the president out of office, but gave no inkling whether he would ask them for an outright endorsement of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the GOP presidential candidate.

In fine oratorical fettle, the graying president of the miners declared the president had "publicly kicked every coal miner in the face" and said if Mr. Roosevelt is reelected "you'll get some more of it next April" when wage negotiations are reopened.

Lewis hammered on the theme the miners asked no special privilege but only equality of treatment.

"And yet," he said, "there are some who hold that the miner is a hewer of wood and a drawer of water and is not entitled to equality of treatment. I delight," he thundered, "in nothing more than to hurl that smug concept back into the faces of those who hold it, whether it be a coal operator, a politician, a Russian pantsmaker, or the president of the United States."

The "Russian pantsmaker" reference was his identification of Sidney Hillman, president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers and chairman of the CIO political action committee. He did not mention the names of Roosevelt, Hillman, and Ray Edmundson, leader of the self-rule movement in the UMW, but singled out these three for his most vigorous criticism.

Nippon Troops Driven From Ridge Position

SOUTHEAST ASIA COMMAND HEADQUARTERS, Kandy, Ceylon, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Japanese troops have been driven from strategic ridge positions in the Myu range southwest of Buthedaung in lower Burma after four days of hard fighting by a Gurkha regiment, headquarters announced today.

Counterattacks by the Japanese were beaten off by the Gurkhas who were aided by fighters and fighter bombers recently moved into the Arakan area.

As the ground war was stepped up in lower Burma, headquarters announced that rocket-firing RAF Beaufighters, after a 23-hour battle, had scattered a 15-ship Japanese convoy which was crossing the Andaman sea south of Rangoon apparently Burma-bound.

The Beaufighters made 21 separate attacks on the convoy, which was first sighted September 9, the announcement said, and achieved "the greatest single air and sea victory in this theatre."

None of the RAF planes was lost.

Highway Body At Burns on Road Junket

BURNS, Ore., Sept. 12.—(AP)—State highway commissioners, here on an inspection tour, said today they have instructed the state highway engineer to determine the cost of straightening the southern section of the Coast highway to accommodate 60-foot trucks.

The commission said the action was taken at the request of granges in that section, whose members use the road to ship sheep to California markets.

A decision to buy 80 acres of land to add to the Silver Creek state park in Marion county also was announced. The cost will be \$5000.

Options will be taken on property adjacent to the highway in Delake, Ocean Lake, Nelscott and Taft with a view to widening the right of way through those communities.

The Warm Springs cutoff highway was inspected.

War to Peace Plan Proposed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The National Planning association suggested today a "war to peace" plan whereby a corporation might defer payment of taxes, upon the cessation of hostilities in either hemisphere, so that it might use its ready cash to speed reconversion to a peacetime basis.

The plan would permit a corporation to postpone for a year payment of income and excess profits taxes on the current year's earnings, along with the unpaid portions of similar taxes on profits of the preceding year.

This deferment would be made pending determination whether the corporation is entitled to a refund on its previous tax payments. If it is not entitled to a refund, taxes on the two years would be subject to a six per cent annual interest penalty and be payable along with the current tax liability in the third year.

Sen. Moore Denounces Leland Olds' Record

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The record of Leland Olds, as chairman of the federal power commission was denounced in the senate today by Senator Moore (R-Okla.) who served notice he would demand a record vote on the question of confirming Olds' nomination to a second five-year term on the utility-regulating agency.

Churchill-FR Get Down to 'Real Business' of Quebec Meeting

QUEBEC, Sept. 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, in conference with the highest military experts of their nations, got down today to the "real business" of the Quebec war council—plotting the utter destruction of Japan's dwindling power.

For the second successive day all possible official stress was laid on the idea that the deliberations here are predominantly military and directed chiefly at crushing Japan.

But Mr. Roosevelt's map room in the governor-general's residence mirrored the march of allied armies everywhere and was not confined to the Pacific theater.

The president and prime minister talked privately during the morning. They posed for pictures and Churchill watched Mrs. Roosevelt put Fala, the White House scottie, through some typical dog tricks. Then they called in their army, navy and air commanders for an afternoon session with maps and papers behind the thick, stone walls of Quebec's old citadel. Afterward the chiefs of staff returned to their Chateau Frontenac headquarters to prepare specific recommendations for action.

The strategy of the central Pacific apparently was perfected long ago. Evidence that it is in operation may be seen in the increased tempo of softening-up aerial assaults on the Philippines.

"As I see it," he explained in a newspaper interview, "My job is to put some of the plans on which we have been working for months into practical application."

Logistics, he explained, have played a far greater part in the present war than in any other.

"In an all out war like this," he said, "There never can be enough of anything—so it is up to the logistics branch to locate what is available to the places where it will do the most good."

There is little he can say of his actual plans, Admiral Trexel explained, since "if additional facilities are needed they are contingent on future fleet operations—and these, of course, are restricted."

Wenchow, 225 miles south of Shanghai, fell to the enemy on Sept. 7, a Chinese communique said, adding that fighting still is in progress in the suburbs.

In the interior of China the Japanese continued to press southwestward towards the defensive center of Kweilin in Kwangsi province and westward towards Paoching in Hunan province.

Gandhi, Ali Jinnah Conclude Meeting

BOMBAY, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi and Mahomed Ali Jinnah, leader of India's Moslems, concluded their conversations today with announcement that they would discuss again tomorrow a formula for dividing India so that Moslems and Hindus could unite in a demand for self-government.

Celebes Get 202-Ton Load Of Explosives

GENERAL HEADQUARTERS, Southwest Pacific, Wednesday, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A record 202-ton load of explosives was rained down on Dutch Celebes airdromes Sunday, in the continuing widespread neutralization raids, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announced today.

Navy Catalina planes sank one ship and beached another enemy freighter in attacks off Celebes, which lies west of New Guinea and south of Mindanao, southern Philippines.

The heavy Celebes air raid brought to 580 tons of bombs the weight dropped on this strategic island in the last four straight days.

Three ships were sunk or damaged off Ceram in the Dutch East Indies.

MacArthur's communique revealed that an additional 504 Japanese troops were killed, 118 captured and 25 friendly nationals liberated on British New Guinea in the week ending Sept. 11.

Founder of Sweet Cherry Industry Dies

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Karl J. Stackland, founder of the Grande Ronde valley's sweet cherry industry, died here last night after being struck by an automobile at Hot Lake.

An industry worth hundreds of thousands of dollars to the county this year was started by Stackland in 1892 when he set out the first commercial cherry orchard.

Official Asks Nip Tolerance

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Robert B. Cozens, assistant director of the war relocation authority, says "we should not submit to the unAmerican philosophy that all persons of Japanese ancestry are guilty until proved innocent."

He told a businessmen's group last night that the West coast's evacuated Japanese-Americans will be returning to their homes some day, and many persons "talk glibly of mass deportation when the war is over."

"So far as I am concerned," he declared, "any person of any nationality who has been disloyal to his country by word or deed should be stricken from our lists of Americans; but all should have the due process of law provided them."

"The Japanese will have a right to return to their homes and their property under constitutional guarantees."

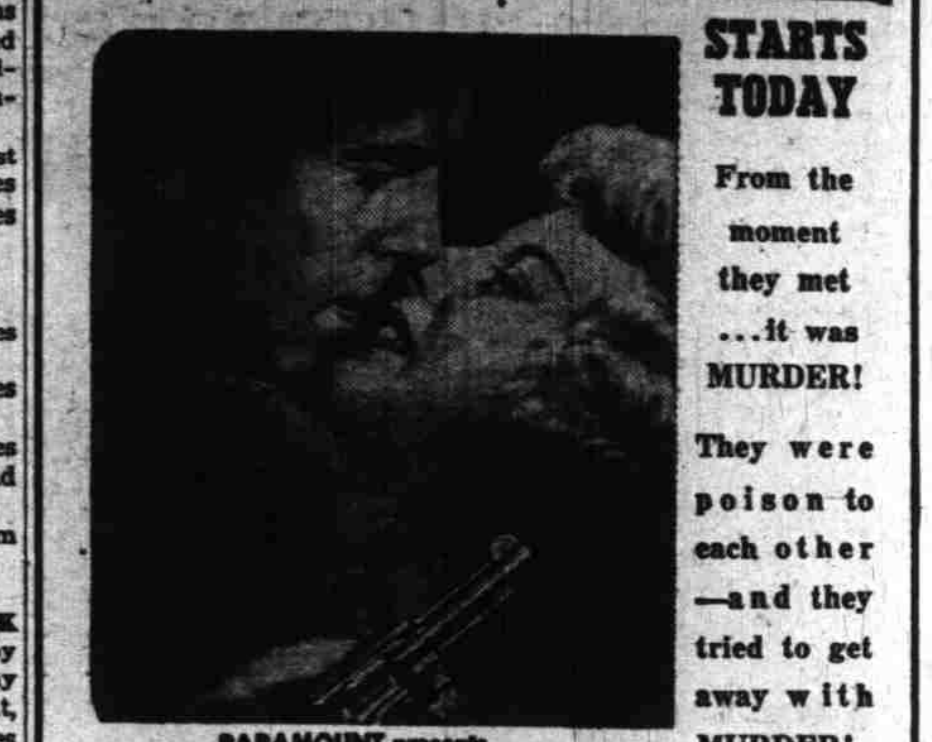
