Most Argentines Are Pro-Allied Reports Traveler

PORTLAND, Sept. 12—(AP)—In spite of the government's axis leanings, 80 per cent of the Argentine people are pro-Allied, Multnomah county agent S. B. Hall said today.

Hall had just returned from Buenos Aires, where he judged the Holstein division of the Argentine national livestock show. The dean of Oregon county agents and a nationally recognized Holstein-Friesian breeder, Hall was a guest of the Rural Society of Argentina.

"One family can operate a 200-acre South American farm," he remarked, telling of that country's largest Holstein breeder, who milks 18,000 cattle kept on 143 dairy farms.

"There will be unlimited opportunities for men trained in scientific agriculture in Argentina after the war," Hall said. "Livestock raising there is a big industry, and their agricultural economy is based on large acreages of land worked by a small amount of labor."

Forger Gets Sentence but Draws Parole

Paul Archie Andresen, 21, route 5, Salem, was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary and paroled to the parole board after pleading guilty to a charge of forgery of a check for \$37.82 passed to Busick's Court Street market. He is also to reimburse Busicks, according to conditions of the parole. Andresen was sentenced by Judge E. M. Page.

A draft registration card which Andresen is alleged to have presented as identification is being investigated. The draft registration card carried the name of Paul John Smith and police reports said that the card, when submitted to an infra-red light test, showed that there had been erasures in connection with the name and that part of the name had been substituted with another.

On the portion of the card where the draftee's signature was required for identification the name had been erased completely, stated the report on the infra-red light test.

The check passed at the Busick market was signed with the name of Smith.

Judge Page Tuesday also sentenced two sailors to two years in the penitentiary each for unlawful use of a motor vehicle. Gerald Anthony Wallace and George C. Brawley were reported as being absent without leave and naval officers at Bremerton told civil authorities here to proceed with the criminal charges against them.

The men were accused of taking a car belonging to Norman C. Garrison of Gates from the Stayton cannery on August 28.

The car was found at Astoria where it had been abandoned and showed signs of hard driving. They were arrested by state police at Roseburg and the police report showed that they admitted taking a second automobile from Amity which was abandoned near Junction City.

They entered pleas of guilty a few days ago but sentence was withheld pending word from the naval authorities.

Labor Influx Changes Puget Sound Area

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12—(AP)—Influx of war workers into the Puget Sound congested production area between 1940 and 1944, which brought the total population to nearly 1,000,000, brought about significant changes in the composition of the population, the census bureau reported today.

Also affected, the report said, were characteristics of the labor force, families and housing.

Influx of more than 250,000 migrants, plus the natural increase of births over deaths, partly offset by the loss of men to the armed forces, resulted in a population increase of about 170,000 or 20.9 per cent. Among the consequences were an increase in the ratio of workers to dependents and an increased percentage of negroes.

The labor supply increased 35 per cent, principally because of in-migration and employment of housewives and others normally not in the labor market. Increased utilization of existing housing and a large amount of new housing increased the number of occupied dwelling units by 55,830, practically the same rate as the population increase.

The Puget Sound congested production area embraces King, Kitsap, Pierce and Snohomish counties, Washington.

V-12 Program Retrenchment Is Announced

In line with the navy's previously-announced policy of reducing V-12 students generally by 25 per cent, at least two score trainees at Willamette probably will be shipped out at the beginning of the next semester to bring navy enrollment to approximately 200, it was disclosed Tuesday.

No new students are to be brought in, at least for this semester, but those taking pre-medical or basic training will remain. Those to leave will include students who have completed basic training and are specializing.

Mail From Men Held by Nazis Will Become More Uncertain

Mail from men held in Germany as prisoners of war will become more uncertain rather than less as the allied armies advance and transportation is restricted, Mrs. Claude B. Mickelwait, volunteer American Red Cross worker, told Salem Kiwanis club members and guests Tuesday.

Christmas packages for American men held as prisoners of war in Germany are now being sent by the American Red Cross in addition to other supplies, the speaker said.

A standard package of food is sent each man held prisoner every week, to supplement the food furnished by the holding government.

Garden Seeds Sent

A package of seeds, vegetable and flower, is now one of the six different packages sent to the men. This is to supplement food and support morale.

Mrs. Mickelwait spoke Tuesday afternoon to members of the families of men held as prisoners of war in any part of the world. Linn C. Smith introduced the speaker.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12—(AP)—Band Leader Tommy Dorsey and his actress wife, Pat Dane, together with Allen Smiley, movie director, were indicted today by the county grand jury on charges of assault by means of force likely to produce great bodily harm to Actor Jon Hall and Eddie Norris, during a fight in the Dorsey apartment last Aug. 5.

The indictment, containing two counts of felonious assault against the tall, handsome husband of Actress Frances Langford, and Norris, screen actor, and former husband of Ann Sheridan, was returned after an all-day session during which 11 witnesses were called.

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Rural Pupils May Attend Salem School

Ankeny school district will be permitted to transport its few pupils to Salem schools, probably McKinley, the school board voted Tuesday night. However, the right of parents, living outside the district to send their children to Salem schools may be revoked and tuition refunded at any time the facilities of the schools are needed for pupils within the Salem district itself.

These decisions were reached by Salem school board members at the final regular meeting before the opening of school September 18. All members were present. L. E. Barrick, chairman, presided.

Election of seven new teachers (included in the list published in The Sunday Statesman) to complete the staff was ratified by the board. The 22 new members of the staff reported for duty Tuesday afternoon and met with principals and supervisors Tuesday afternoon at the school administration building. Other meetings will be held in the respective buildings on successive days this week.

The general faculty meeting will be held Saturday morning as has been customary in the past.

Use of the school gymnasium and school cafeteria at the senior high school on April 14, 1945, by Chadwick chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star on its 50th anniversary, was approved by the school board.

Former Salem Resident Dies, Buried at Sea

Eugene Whitcomb Ryley, 55, former resident of Salem, died August 16 and was buried at sea, members of the family in Salem learned this week. Ryley was in government business in Honolulu and had been there for 27 years. He was a grandson of John B. Keizer for whom the community of Keizer was named.

He was born Dec. 6, 1889, in Elgin, Ill. He was a graduate of Willamette university law school and visited his mother and other relatives in Oregon every two or three years.

Survivors include the widow, Byrdie Ryley of Honolulu; his mother, Mrs. Bertha Keizer Ryley, 1620 Chemeketa street; two brothers, Adolph Ryley, Freeport, Texas; two sisters, Ruth E. Newman, Portland, Ariz., and Mrs. Bertha E. Barr, Salem.
