

Portland Gal Softies Win

Betty Evans Pitches 'Nother No-No Game

CLEVELAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Phoenix, Ariz., Girls Ramblers and the Columbus, O., Ferguson Auditors were assured of places in the semi-finals of the world amateur softball championships tonight, the Ramblers defeating the Cleveland Erin Brooms 2 to 1 and the Auditors triumphing 3 to 0 over Salt Lake City Utah, Market Inn.

The Stamford, Conn., Nutmegs went down to their first defeat 1 to 0 when the Portland, Ore., Lind and Pomeroy girls scored in the last of the seventh inning. It was the fourth straight victory for the Oregonians. Betty Evans tossed a no-hitter for Portland, striking out 17. Tuesday she had combined with Alyce Johnson for a no-hitter against Amaha, Neb., Portland hasn't permitted its opponents to score a single run.

'Unusual' Grid For St. Mary's

ST. MARY'S COLLEGE, Calif., Sept. 20 (AP)—Varsity football as usual, is the watchword at St. Mary's college this season. Perhaps it should be, football is "unusual."

The unusual part of it stems from the fact that one of the players is 16 years old. Seventeen year old gridiron candidates have not been uncommon this year or last, what with freshmen being taken into the varsity fold, but coach Jimmy Phelan, former University of Washington mentor, thinks he really scraped the bottom of the barrel when Leo Verceles suited up.

Verceles is a 16 year old Filipino, a graduate of Cathedral high school Los Angeles, he's 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighs 150 pounds. On the Galloping Gales roster, he is listed as a reserve quarterback. He'll probably see some action, too, because he is quick, elusive and game.

Phelan is fashioning probably the most extraordinary chapter of his career this year at St. Mary's, one of the few colleges which has attempted to maintain major football on an all civilian basis throughout the war. His current squad numbers 36. Of these, 25 are 17 years old.

Seven of the starting eleven are 17 years of age. The oldest is 22-year old Dennis O'Connor, quarterback, recently discharged by the army.

Hunting Campaign on Antelope Open Sunday; Tags Available

PORTLAND (Special)—Oregon's first big game season of this year opens for antelopes on September 24 and will extend through October 7. Plenty of antelope tags are still available for sale at the Portland office of the game commission, the fees being \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for nonresidents. In making application for a tag, a person should forward the correct fee and information as to the number and kind of hunting license held.

All of the antelope range is open to hunting with certain exceptions. The Drakes Flat area and the Millican-Fort Rock-Wagonfire area are closed. Descriptions and maps of these areas are included in the 1944 synopsis of hunting regulations. The Hart Mountain antelope refuge also remains closed to antelope hunting.

Upon request of naval authorities, the game commission has stopped all hunting until further notice in naval aerial gunnery area No. 2 in Lake and Harney counties. The approximate boundaries of this area are as follows: The north boundary lies just south of the Flook ranch and of the town of Blitzen; the east boundary follows along the foothills of the Steens mountains; the south boundary is the Oregon-Nevada state line; and the west boundary is just east of Geano lake and the Hart Mountain antelope refuge.

(Continued from page 10) would arise in the middle of the night to jot down a play. His former football and basketball pupils at Arkansas and Texas Christian were principal sources of Schmidt stories but many came from the big fellow's antics in front of the fans.

There was the time Schmidt's TCU team was on Baylor's 10-yard line and Schmidt asked the Baylor band to render "touch-down froggies," the victory chant of Texas Christian.

Then, there was that classic lecture he gave his team the Monday after it played Texas A and M and was caught flat-footed by a play Schmidt repeatedly had swarved against. But each player assured Schmidt he had carried out his assignment. Schmidt said gravely: "We'll protest. A and M had 12 men on the field."

Once he forbid a player named Red Oliver going into a game but the mischievous Oliver slipped in with a flock of substitutes. It was not until Oliver broke loose on a long touchdown run and his helmet fell off that Schmidt recognized him. The coach roared out: "Won't somebody stop him?"

Dr. Eugene Lambert, former basketball pupil of Schmidt at Arkansas, tells of colorful notations made by the coach in his scorebook during games. Opposite each player's name Schmidt wrote what he thought of his efforts. It

was quite caustic. "We fought to get to that book after a game," Dr. Lambert said. "It was very entertaining."

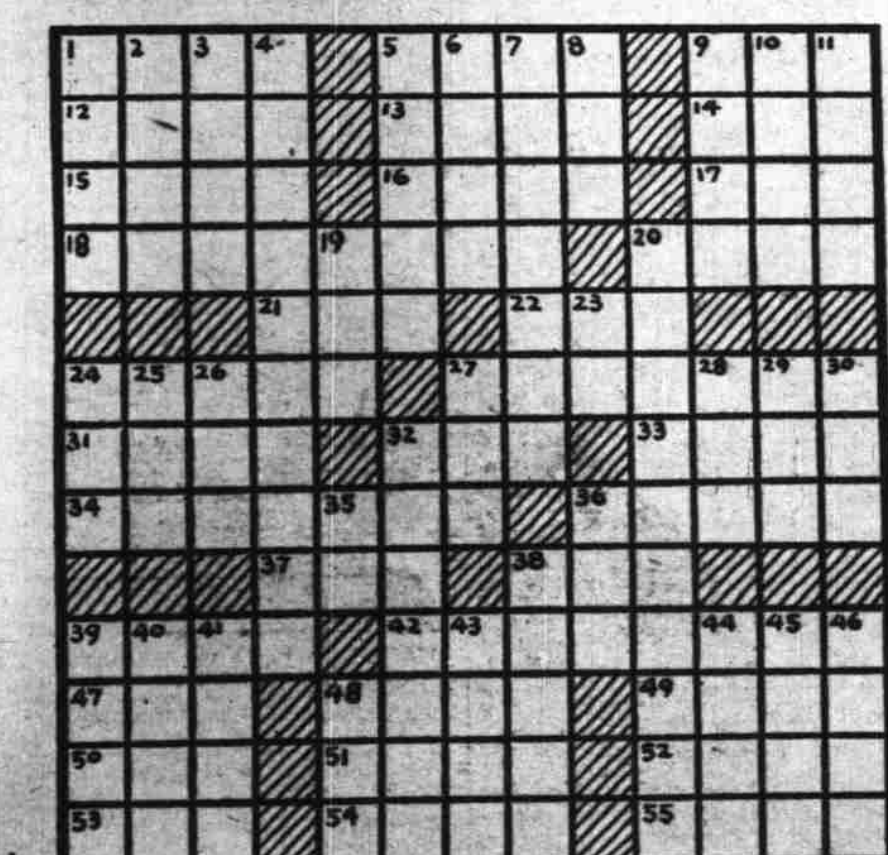
