Stocks Go Up, But Rails Lag

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—Industrial and utility groups achieved enough new gains today to extend the stock market's recent run of advancing sessions but yesterday's momentum was lacking.

Rails were backward as were aircraft and certain industrial specialties.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite rose 1 of a point to 54.1. Of the 797 issues traded 418 advanced, 186 declined and 193 were unchanged. Transactions totaled 696,080 shares against 714,890 Tuesday.

Higher closings included US Steel, Youngstown Sheet, Good-year, Consolidated Edison, Public Service of NJ, Anaconda, Kennecott, Phelps Dodge, Westinghouse, Johns-Manville and Radio Corp.

Would Reduce Authority of County Attorney

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—A bill to reduce the authority of the Marion county district attorney will be brought before the next state legislature two Portland attorneys said today.

W. S. U'Ren and Jay Bowerman made the statement after the suit to keep the "Little Townsend" old age pension bill off the November ballot was dismissed by the state supreme court. They represent the Sherman county district attorney, who filed the suit.

"The district for Marion county refused to authorize this suit," the attorneys said. "This personal power of one man or woman who happens to be district attorney in Salem should be promptly abolished."

The court ruled that Sherman county district attorney had no right to file suit in Marion county. U'Ren and Bowerman declared that the Marion county district attorney is the only person empowered to file such a suit, therefore, since it can be filed only in the Marion county circuit court.

Harvest Underway

PERRYDALE, Sept. 20.—Prune harvest is progressing rather slowly as in most cases families are having to pick their own crop or have only two helpers besides their own family. Some have a fair crop and some pickers make \$10 a day.

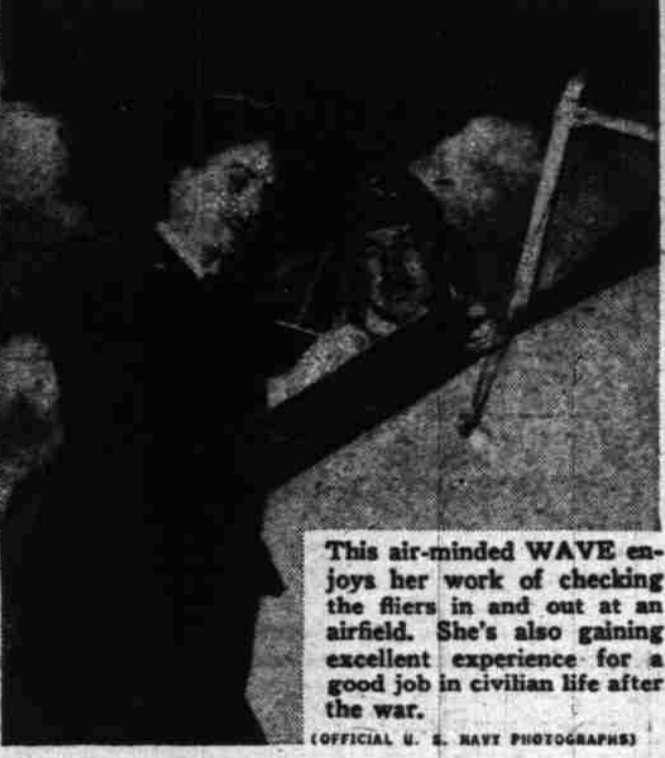


Responsible work! This WAVE Telegrapher is receiving dispatches direct from the battle front. It's one of many important jobs in the WAVES open to patriotic young American women.

Oats Sell Off Then Recover

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—Grain futures fluctuated erratically in a dull trade today with September oats breaking as much as three cents only to turn strong in the final minutes of the session to close unchanged to an eighth of a cent lower.

Wheat showed moderate strength early in the day but eased after the pressure of scattered offerings.

At the finish wheat was unchanged to 1/4 lower than yesterday's close, September \$1.30 1/2. Corn was 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher, December \$1.09 1/2. Oats were unchanged to 1 lower, September .84 1/2. Rye was 1/4 higher to 3/4 lower, September .95 1/2. Barley was 1/4 to 1 1/2 lower, September \$1.06 1/2.

During the early trade corn was independently strong and the December contract was up seven-eighths of a cent to a new high since trading in that grain was resumed last week. Late in the session the demand eased off.

Canneries Need 150 for Work On Night Shift

If 150 persons could be added to the payrolls of Marion and Polk county canneries, now totaling approximately 4800 names, needs for the current prune season would be met, US employment service representatives declared Wednesday.

Most urgent need is for 100 men to work short or long night shifts, it was said. Hours range from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. and four-hour shifts may be worked.

Hunt Brothers and Reid Murdoch canneries in Salem; Blue Lake and Oregon Fruit Products in West Salem; United Growers in Liberty; and the Birdseye plant in Woodburn have called for men.
