Artesian Well Is Brought in

STAYTON — An artesian well, said to be the only one of this kind in this section of the country, was brought in on the Fred Hartman farm, a quarter mile west of Sublimity last Saturday.

A siphon test produced a steady flow of water through a half-inch pipe and there was pressure enough to carry the flow into the farmhouse for domestic purposes.

A log of the boring reveals that the first 20 feet was soil formation; the next 70, hard rock; 40 feet of sand rock and finished in white sand rock with the artesian flow at 140 feet. An interesting feature is that at the 130 foot point, a log was bored through.
