#### Use Yeast In Yeast Bread

By Maxine Buren Food writers must be brave. Lots of things happen to us, and we must face the music when a recipe gets in the paper wrong. Wednesday we published a recipe for our best friend's yeast bread, and then left out the yeast. That's something like the time we put in a recipe for candy that used a drop of glycer-

ine and got a "cup" of glycer-

ine out of it, and the time we

wrote up a formula for jellied bridge salad with no gelatine. Let's just hope that reader friends don't "rise" up against us in wrath at trying out a yeast recipe without yeast, and that this affair doesn't spoil a beautiful friendship between me and the one whose recipe it was.

Anyway, we repeat, here's a recipe for yeast bread, which turned out to take two lessons to learn instead of one, but will produce a good yeast bread in the most painless process pos-

LILA'S YEAST BREAD Cook a medium sized potato, and when done, mash through a fine sieve, add enough water to make a quart of liquid (incidentally to cool off mixture to lukewarm). Crumble up a cake of yeast into this, add I tablespoon sugar and flour (probably around 1 cup) whip with the egg beater and cover bowl. Let stand for around two hours or less, until frothy. Then add 1 tablespoon shortening (melted), salt and enough flour to make the right consistency, kneading the flour into dough. Put back into bowl, grease the top and let stand for about two hours in a warm place until doubled in bulk. Throw dough on board, work into four loaves and put into pans, let stand until doubled in bulk again, bake at 375 degrees for about an hour.

said today. Government assistance through federal rehabilitation grant has been received by 32 of the vets while 34 are enrolled under the "GI bill of rights."




