Bond Activity Is Reported

SILVERTON, Oct. 6—Added activity was noticed in the Coolidge & McClaine bank at Silverton this week, following the general notice that government bonds were cashable upon demand, Glenn L. Briedwell, manager, said Thursday.

Mr. Briedwell said there might be more than one reason for this. Novelty of the ability to cash the bonds may bring some in, he believed. The greatest influx was probably caused by customers who learned last week that the bonds could be cashed immediately this week and held them over rather than turn them in and wait for redemption. There has always been, he explained, some bonds redeemed each week, and this week's activity probably included some of those who would normally have redeemed them last week.

Whether or not the fact that bonds could be cashed at once will stimulate buying in the drive which opens November 20, is yet to be seen, local bankers say.

Silverton plans for the forthcoming drive have not yet been announced. James Clough of the Portland General Electric company, and Mr. Briedwell were co-chairmen in the last drive which went considerably over the top in Silverton.

Congressman Mott to Speak in Silverton

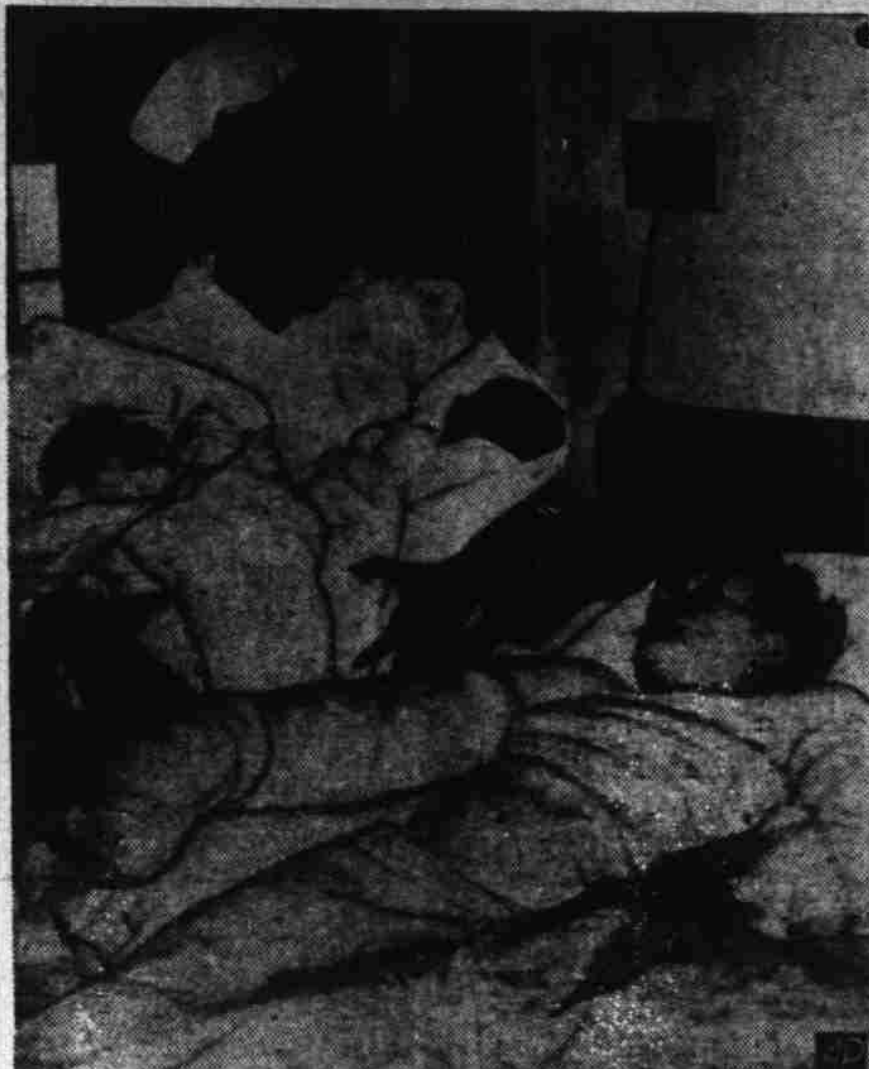
SILVERTON, Oct. 5—Congressman James Mott will be the speaker October 25 at the dinner meeting of the Silverton chamber of congress.
