4H Radio Show Is Announced

Highlights of the annual 4-H club livestock auction, climax of the yearly Pacific International livestock show at Portland, will be broadcast on a 30-minute program over radio station KEK Friday night, October 13, beginning at 9 o'clock, James Bishop, county club agent, has announced.

Opening ceremonies of the colorful auction, a number of sales in each class of livestock and a closing summary including some of the purchasers will be included in the program. The auction begins at 10 o'clock Friday morning and the highlights will be recorded on a transcription throughout the auction by KEK for the evening broadcast.

L. J. Allen, assistant state 4-H club leader, has announced that 518 head of market livestock owned by club members from 21 Oregon counties and a few Washington counties will be sold. This includes 138 beef cattle, 136 lambs and 244 hogs. All of the animals shown at the stockshow are fat stock ready for market and will be sold to the highest bidder.

Valley Obituaries

ALBANY — In the death of Daniel Harvey Bodine, which occurred at his home on East Fourth street Monday, Albany and Linn county loses another of their pioneer citizens. Although Mr. Bodine had been in poor health for several years, he had been able to be up and on the streets until recently.

Daniel Bodine was born December 21, 1865, on the farm which was a part of the Stephen H. Haley donation land claim, 160 acres of which his father, Daniel H. Bodine, sr., purchased upon his arrival in Linn county in 1854. Soon after the latter's arrival, he married Margaret Foster and together they made their home on the farm until the death of Mr. Bodine in 1909. The mother continued to live on the home farm the remainder of her life. She died in 1899.

Daniel H. Bodine attended the schools of the community and Oregon State college. After finishing college he returned to the home farm, taking over its operation. He served as president of the old Albany State bank from 1912 until 1918. He served three terms as sheriff of Linn county and was then elected city recorder of Albany, serving from 1920 until 1924. During this period he made his home in Albany, returning again to the farm when his term of office expired.

On June 25, 1913, Mr. Bodine married Lola Reid Jordan in Portland, who survives. Also two daughters, Mrs. Genevieve Bangs and Geraldine Bodine, both of Albany. Other survivors are the following nieces: Mrs. Chester Hite, Mrs. Addie Rickard and Mrs. Lee Burkhardt, all of Albany; Mrs. Antone Hole of Marshfield and Mrs. Margaret Safley of Eugene. Funeral services were held Thursday with burial in Riverside cemetery.

SHELBURN — Charles O. McClain died at the family home Oct. 7. Death came while he slept.

He was the second son of James A. and Margaret L. McClain and was born near Buena Vista, June 23, 1875. He was married to Lena R. Miller in Corvallis on Dec. 17, 1912.

Survivors are the widow and an only daughter, Mrs. Alvin Meritt; and three brothers, Thomas D. Miller, Salem; Willard S. Miller, Woodburn; Chester Miller, Portland; two sisters, Mrs. Jane Kau of Albany, Mrs. R. L. Herren of Portland.

Mr. McClain was a bookkeeper most of his life, but failing eyesight caused him to turn to farming 24 years ago and had lived on his Shelburn farm since that time.

He was a faithful member and trustee of the Shelburn church. Funeral services were held in Seio, conducted by Rev. Loucks J. Vernon, and burial in the family plot in the Miller cemetery.
