PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Championship winners announced today in the state 4-H club handicraft show being held here this week included:

Clothing: Lucille Jaquet, Silverton, cotton school dress and play suit; Bonnie Klein, Aumsville, knitting.

Cooking: Bonnie Klein, Aumsville, nut bread; Marilyn Baltzer, Salem, victory muffins.

Canning: Lucille Jaquet, Silverton, two jars of fruit (two varieties).

Farm crops: Reed Vollstedt, Albany, cereals and small seeds.

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The grand champion of the Pacific International Livestock show for Washington and Oregon 4-H clubbers is a medium-weight Hereford steer owned by Jack Wilson of North Powder, Oregon.

That was the decision of judges today, who awarded the title of reserve grand champion to a heavy class Shorthorn steer exhibited by Keith Brown of Carlton, Oregon.

A Berkshire barrow owned by Reed Vollstedt of Albany, Oregon won the hog division's grand championship. William Ries of Toppenish, Wash., showed the reserve grand champion, a Chester White.

Clickitat county, Wash., club members won first place in the county herd contest. Five animals, owned by at least three youths, were exhibited. Union county, Oregon, was runner-up.

The show will close Friday with a public auction of all livestock exhibited.

Peril of Hard Times in U.S. Ahead, Bowles

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Price Administrator Chester Bowles said tonight that this country "has all the makings of an inflation and eventual collapse on a far greater scale" than occurred after the last war.

"The whole tempo of our economy is stepped up to a far higher and potentially more dangerous level," he said in a speech prepared for delivery before the Washington board of trade.

"The answer lies in a wholly new concept of America. It is a concept in which everyone has a part to play. It cannot be done alone by any one group. We will need the close cooperation of our farmers, workers, businessmen and government."

He said farmers must prosper if they are to provide huge markets for manufactured goods, and "our workers must be assured of high wage levels and high relative purchasing power to buy the products of mass production."

"Business must prosper," he continued. "Our national economy can not be run without profits. This means that we must encourage competitive free enterprise in every possible way. It means there must be a sufficiently high level of total capital investment to keep our whole economy in balance and provide full employment."

Filbert Pickers Still Needed, Hillsboro Area

HILLSBORO, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The United States employment service and the farm labor office said today that workers are still critically needed to harvest the Washington county filbert crop.

Cannery workers are also needed to handle the incoming fall crops of cauliflower, broccoli, squash and lima beans.

Branch Census Bureau Scheduled for Salem

A branch bureau of the census, for the purpose of conducting an agricultural survey for 1945, will be established in Salem for a six months period extending through next April, Mayor I. M. Doughton was advised Thursday.

The bureau is setting up 45 state offices and approximately 240 district offices to take the census.

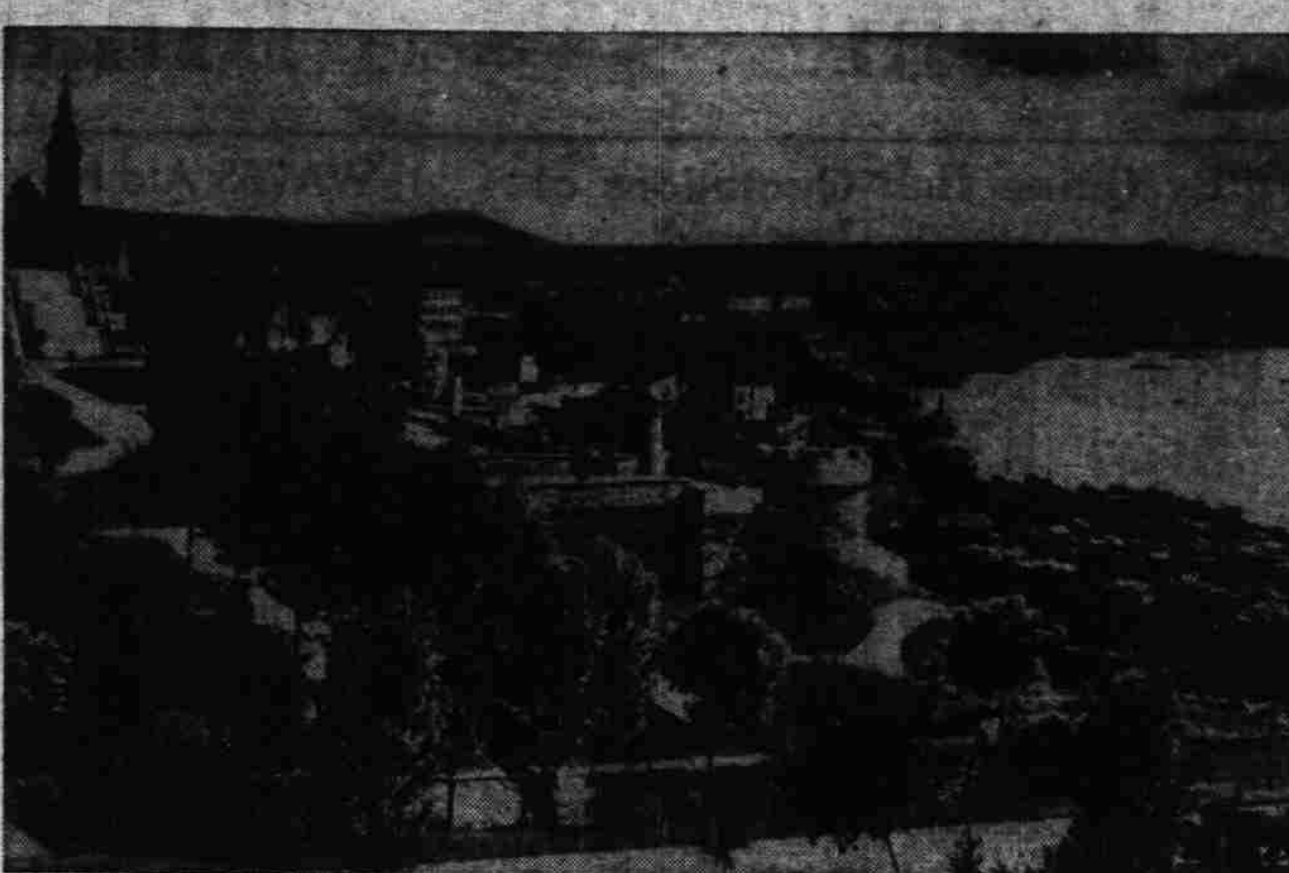
West Workers Chances Best

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Pacific coast workers are more optimistic about postwar employment than are midwesterners, Everett R. Smith, director of research for MacFadden publications, told executives here today.

This is because the west is a "younger area," he said. America's standard of living will rise if the nation's accumulated capital funds and plant capacity built for war are properly utilized, Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, vice president of the Brookings Institution said. The rise will come about through higher incomes or lower prices, he explained.
