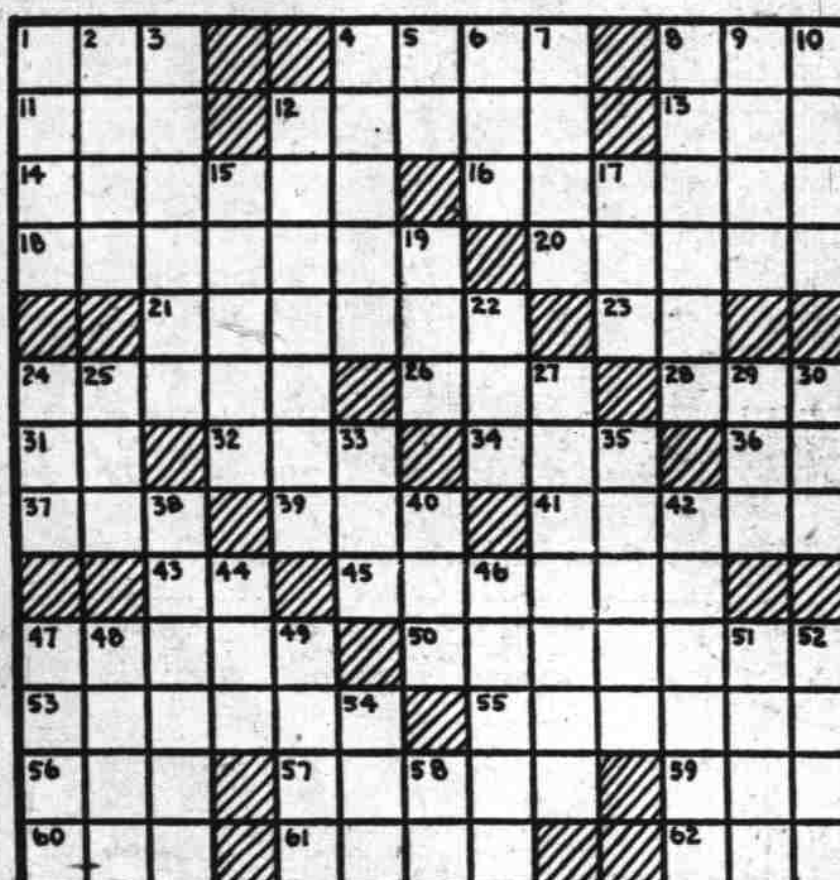

State Now Has \$44,271,273.81 In Treasury

Cash on hand in the state treasury here on September 30, 1944, aggregated \$44,271,273.81, with bond investments of \$32,701,580.92, State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott reported Thursday.

Unemployment compensation trust funds deposited with the United States treasury total \$56,810,291.38.

Of the cash in the state treasury \$4,598,225.09 was classified as unrecipitated.
