### WLB Agrees in Nearly Half of Its Decisions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13—(AP)—The tripartite membership of the national war labor board has been unanimous in nearly half of its decisions, the board said today on the basis of its survey of a three month period ending September 15.

The survey also showed, the announcement said, that in the split decisions the public and the industry members outvoted the labor members slightly more often than the public-labor combination outvoted the industry side.

### California Completes Largest Fruit Pack

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13—(AP)—California has just completed the largest pack of fruit ever put in cans in one state. Preliminary estimates made by packers and announced by the war food administration set the total pack at 28,653,557 cases or 687,635,368 cans, No. 2 1/2 size.

The pack was almost half again larger than last year's 19,430,390—case output. Government buying left little in sight for civilians.

### Defeating Japs Still Big Task, Salem Marine Tells Realtors

United Nations conquest of Japan is not as near as is believed on the home front, Sgt. Jack Floyd Thompson, US marine corps, told members of the Salem Board of Realtors at their noon meeting Friday in Marion hotel. "The Japanese are a tenacious people," Sergeant Thompson said, "and may fight to the death when attempts are made to land on their 'sacred soil.'" Thompson was introduced by William Biven.

Sergeant Thompson was attached to the intelligence department of the second marines and was in position to see captive Japanese, civilian and military. He told about the capture of a major who, when questioned about what would happen when allied arms went ashore in Japan, answered: "You will find no one to rule, my people will fight to the death."

### Open Ground To Help Yanks

PORTLAND, Oct. 13—(AP)—Fighting in the Pacific will be definitely in the Americans' favor when it moves out of jungles and swamps into open territory, Col. William Jackson of the famed 41st division declared here today.

"The Jap is a pretty vicious little fellow underground, but he's not so good out in the open," the artillery executive said, back from 30 months in the southwest Pacific. "He'll do what he's told, but his mass formations and suicidal attacks just don't work out."

Colonel Jackson said America was "getting enough power out there now to do the job. He was full of praise for the American G.I. "If he's got a job he does it, and it doesn't make any difference how rough it is. He's as good a fighting man as there is," the colonel said.

### Hull, England Takes Beating From Germans

LONDON, Oct. 13—(AP)—The mercantile city of Hull has been hit by high explosive and incendiary bombs in 83 air raids since the war began, suffering 3000 casualties including 1200 deaths, the Hull emergency committee reported tonight. Only 5939 of 92,600 houses in the city of 315,000 population remained intact.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13—(AP)—Aimee Semple McPherson bequeathed \$10 to her mother, Mrs. Minnie (Ma) Kennedy, under her will dated March 27, 1944, and filed for probate today, Attorney Joe Fainer announced.

Fainer said the evangelist's personal property was valued at less than \$10,000, that her son, Rolf McPherson, was named executor without bond, and that one of the beneficiaries attempted to contest they would receive only \$5.

Arthur Dean Swift, 28, self-styled world's greatest hitch-hiker showed up in Salem Friday with proof from newspaper clippings indicating he had traveled 294,000 miles since he started "hoofing it" in 1933.

Swift claims kinship with Jonathan Swift, arch-satirist and author of "Gulliver's Travels." His testimonials in this direction smacked of authenticity since he was born in Leeds, England, birthplace of the famed author.

When he has completed 1,000,000 miles, Swift said, he will complete his literary work, The Paycopath, in four volumes. Two volumes have been written. In these volumes Swift said he would present a practical interpretation of the psychology of wanderlust.

### Al Smith Leaves Bulk Of Estate to Children

NEW YORK, Oct. 13—(AP)—The will of former Gov. Alfred E. Smith, 1928 democratic presidential nominee who died Oct. 4, left the bulk of his estate in equal shares to his five children.

The instrument was filed today and the accompanying petition placed a formal value of more than \$15,000 on the gross estate. It was dated Aug. 1, 1944, and bequeathed \$5000 to a sister, Mrs. Mary A. Glynn.
