

GOP Hopefuls Slate Series Of Speeches

Republican candidates for presidency and vice presidency will take to the air waves over Oregon this week and next, the radio schedule received Saturday at the party's headquarters here reveals.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, speaking from St. Louis, Mo., will be heard from 7 to 7:30 p.m. Monday over KGW and other Oregon NBC stations.

Tuesday, Gov. John W. Bricker will speak from San Diego over KEX and other Oregon Mutual stations from 8 to 8:30 p.m. Dewey will speak on the Herald-Tribune forum from the Waldorf Astoria in New York City on Wednesday from 6:30 to 7 p.m., Mrs. Ogden Reid, publisher, introducing him.

Bricker will be heard over KEX and the Oregon Blue network stations from 8 to 8:30 Wednesday night as he speaks from Los Angeles.

In Minneapolis on Tuesday, October 24, Dewey will speak at the Municipal auditorium, the address to be broadcast over KEX and Oregon Blue network stations from 7:30 to 8 p.m. Wednesday, October 25, he will speak from the Chicago stadium, to be heard from 7 to 7:30 over KOIN and Oregon CBS stations.

Bricker, speaking Friday, October 27, from Kansas City, Mo., will be heard over KGW, KMGD at Medford and Oregon NBC stations, from 7:30 to 8 p.m.; Dewey will be heard over NBC stations in Oregon on Tuesday, October 31, from 6 to 6:30 p.m. as he speaks at Buffalo, N.Y.

Dewey Challenged by \$25,000 Charity Tip

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 14-(AP)—James P. Clark, Philadelphia democratic chairman, said tonight he will give \$25,000 "to any charity Gov. Dewey designates if he will be honest with the American people."

"Specifically," Clark said in a statement released to the press, "I refer to his tactics of picking out a single sentence from the middle of a speech and twisting and distorting its meaning so that it appears to mean the exact opposite of what the speaker actually said and intended. . . ."

Seattle to Alaska Air Line Planned

SEATTLE, Oct. 14-(AP)—Two Douglas DC-3 21 passenger planes will be placed in service between Seattle and Alaska about November 21, Pan-American World Airways announced today.

Five of the big ships have been released to the company from military service. Two are being converted for passenger use here and will be ready November 15, Pan-American said. The company expects to be operating its Alaska run exclusively with Douglas DC-3's by the end of the year.

40 Feet High Waves Lash North Wales

PORTLAND, Oct. 14-(AP)—Ray Poppe, Portland, 1943 Oregon archery field champion, bagged a 210-pound buck deer with bow and arrow in the Canyon Creek archery reserve last week, he reported today.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14-(AP)—Harold Salvador, runner-up in the state golf tourney in 1935 and 1940, was signed as manager of the Columbia-Edgewater Golf club here today.

Nippon Troops Take Kweiping After Battle

CHUNGKING, Oct. 14-(AP)—Japanese troops, reinforced until they outnumbered the defenders four to one, have captured Kweiping in southern Kwangsi province after killing the Chinese garrison there to the last man, the Chinese high command announced tonight.

Violent street battles preceded the fall of the town, and enemy dead litter the area, a communique said. The Japanese launched the final attack Thursday. No estimate was given of the number of Chinese slain.

The fall of Kweiping opened a new phase of the Japanese drive against Kweilin, key defense center for southeast China and provincial capital of Kwangsi, 135 miles to the north.

The town, 25 miles northwest of Japanese-held Tanchuk, lies at the juncture of the Liu and West rivers 70 miles southeast of Luichow, important rail city which is itself 95 miles southwest of Kweilin.

Price Adjustment For Fir Extended

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14-(AP)—The office of price administration today extended to November 16 a temporary price adjustment which gives Douglas fir mills special prices on certain orders for boards and dimension lumber.

The adjustment provision, scheduled to expire next Monday, applies to orders taken by mills under allocation from the military's central procuring agency. The extension covers only army and navy cargo shipments for which the procuring agency has filed allocation numbers with OPA.

Prune Tree Shakers Big Aid in Harvest

CORVALLIS, Oct. 14-(AP)—Mechanical prune tree shakers, are partly responsible for the successful prune harvest in Polk and Yamhill counties, the farm labor office of the Oregon State college extension service said today. The shakers save the labor of from six to 12 men.

None Hurt as Navy Plane Crash-Lands

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 14-(AP)—A large navy transport on a ferrying flight from Alameda, Calif., to Seattle crash-landed 13 miles north of here Thursday, 13th naval district headquarters said today. There were no injuries to crew or passengers and the plane was not damaged.

An Open Letter to All Users of Federal Power through Salem Electric, Your Customer-Owned, Customer-Regulated Distribution System.

Dear Sirs:

As you probably know, P.G.E. has asked the city council to take our very existence to the vote of the people, because they fear us. They even have offered to buy us out in sympathy, if the voters refused us a franchise. This is the usual procedure used by power monopolies to confuse the subject of public power.

Salem Electric takes full responsibility for the greatly reduced rates in the Salem area. You, as an owner-user, know this better than anyone else. Just compare your present power bill with those before Salem Electric.

No council action, vote or law can keep you from having this advantage if you wish it continued. Public power cannot be stopped. Just look around you, Seattle, Tacoma, Monmouth, and right here in West Salem, where your Salem Electric serves 80 per cent of the KW load in the city, after only 4 years of operation.

P.G.E. states that the issue is whether or not Salem shall have a competitive power distribution system. The truth is, that the very fact that Salem now has a competitive power distribution system, in the form of your customer-owned Salem Electric, is responsible for the present low rates enjoyed in the Salem area.

A vote to stop Salem Electric now, would only delay the ultimate expansion of our low cost service to more customer-owners. We have no fight with the city council, or some of its councilmen who might desire to stop us citizens, nor do we have any fight with Portland General Electric Co.

Your manager and directors are proceeding on the assumption that you wish the benefits of your present low-cost Bonneville power supply continued. If you were to vote to sell out to monopoly, your rates would no doubt soon return to their former Portland level, as the present 20 per cent reduction is only a temporary rate, made by P.G.E. in the Salem area. Accordingly, your manager has written the city council, that for us to share the cost of an election, would only be costly and unnecessary.

We do believe, however, that we should spend a little money to tell the truth and keep the doors open to others who feel that they, too, would like some of their own public power direct from Bonneville. Whether thru a cooperative, municipal or peoples utility district, public power is cooperative, and is here to stay.
