WITH A 12TH AAF B-26 BOMBER GROUP - Second Lt. Kenneth C. Howe from Salem, Ore., and his AAF B-26 Marauder group in the Mediterranean theater have been cited by Gen. Charles DeGaulle and the provisional French government for outstanding achievement during April, May and June when 12th air force Marauders flew important missions over Italy, many of them in direct support of the French forces.

As president of the French government and chief of the French army, General DeGaulle awarded the Crois de Guerre with palms to the group commander, Col. Eugene B. Fletcher of San Diego, Calif. Lieutenant Howe has served as a Marauder bombardier. He has been overseas for five months.
