

Marion County Teachers Will Hold Institute

Marion county teachers' institute will be held Friday, November 3, at the Salem senior high school. Announcement of the program and date was made Thursday by Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion county school superintendent.

The featured speaker for the program will be Dr. James Millar, dean of religious education at Idaho college, Caldwell, Idaho. His topic will be "America, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow." Dr. Millar is an outstanding speaker. Mrs. Booth said in explaining that the public would be welcome to attend in the evening to hear this talk.

Aside from Dr. Millar, the institute program will be almost entirely a home talent affair with outstanding Oregon educators on the general and departmental program.

Rex Putnam, state superintendent of schools, will head a group of eight Salem educators including Frank Bennett, city superintendent of schools; Joy Hills, principal of Leslie junior high school; Chester F. Luther, Leslie J. Sparks, Willamette university; George Birrell, chemistry teacher in Salem senior high school, and Bernice Yearly, Marion county health department.

Mrs. Buena Maris, dean of women at Oregon State college, is one of a group of departmental specialists. Others in this will include Helen Austin Pook and Emma Henkle, Oregon College of Education. Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary of the Oregon State Teachers association, is on the program, and Evelyn Boyl of the Webster Publishing company, Chicago, will complete the staff.

Spaulding Hits Method Of Aiding Injured Men

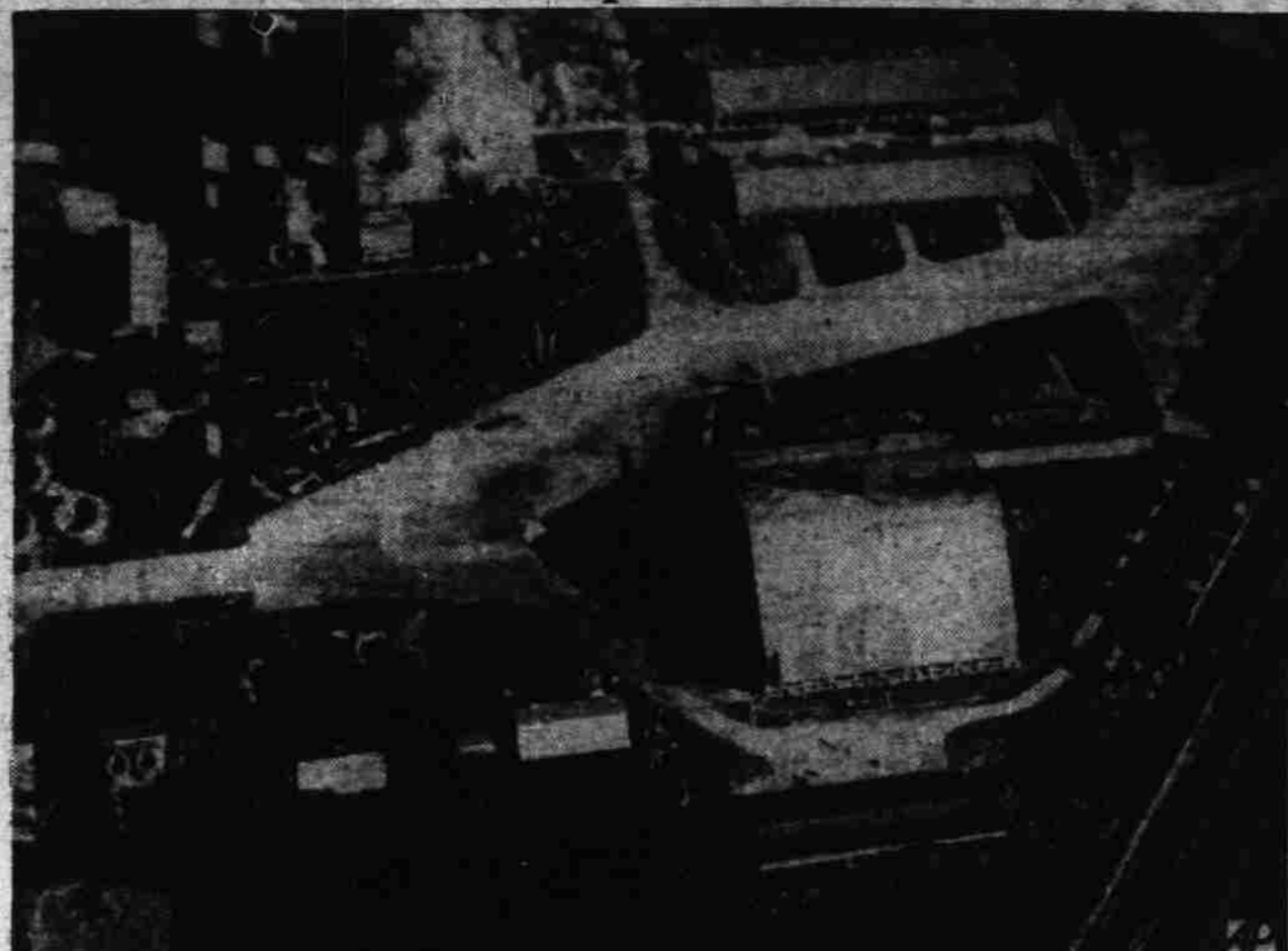

Dewey Endorses Warning That Nazis to Pay Fully for Crimes

ALBANY, N.Y., Oct. 19.-(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey endorsed tonight a state department warning to Nazi leaders that they would "pay the penalty for their heinous crimes" if they carried out reported plans to exterminate Poles, Jews and other non-German nationals held in concentration camps.

In a formal statement, issued a few hours before the republican presidential nominee was due to leave for a labor speech in Pittsburgh tomorrow night, Dewey said:

"Information comes to this country from unquestionably reliable sources that the Nazis, trapped and knowing that they are faced with inevitable defeat, are now resorting to the known gangster terror device of threatening to exterminate their very victims—Poles, Jews and other non-German nationals—now imprisoned by them in their horrible concentration camps in parts of Poland and other countries still occupied by the Nazis.

"The civilized world is now in a position in unmistakable terms to warn the Nazis—military commanders, members of the German government, their aides, abettors and supporters—that certain and inevitable justice awaits them for these brutal and wanton murders if their schemes should be carried out.

"I am happy to note that our state department has issued a warning that if these plans are carried out, those guilty of such murderous acts will be brought to justice and pay the penalty for their heinous crimes.

"American public opinion will fully support the statement issued by our department of state."

Germans Paint Allied Insignia on Vehicles

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, Oct. 19.-(AP)—Some German military vehicles in the front area are now bearing the white star insignia of allied vehicles in hope the allies' planes will be fooled into not bombing them, reconnaissance pilots reported today.

The fact they can do this without attracting attacks of their own planes is new evidence of the impotence of the Luftwaffe.

Lamb Feeders Get Two Helps From Washington

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.-(AP)—Government agencies today took cognizance of two complaints from western lamb feeders by extending the wool purchase program and promising a survey of the lamb price situation.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo) announced tonight as he left for the west, that the commodity credit corporation would accept under the 1944 purchase program all pulled wool from animals slaughtered in 1944, if the wool is tendered before Feb. 15, 1945.

Girl Injured in Car Plunging Over Bank

MARSHFIELD, Oct. 19.-(AP)—Wilma Leaton, 18, Eastside, was under observation in a North Bend hospital today for injuries she suffered when the car in which she was riding plunged over an 80-foot embankment 18 miles from here late Wednesday.

Thumbnail of War!

(By the Associated Press)

Western Europe—Americans win control of half of Aachen and Canadians to the north step up their drive in the Scheide estuary region of Holland. More than 1000 American heavy bombers hammer German industrial targets.

Russia—Germans report huge red army smashes several miles into East Prussia. Russians continue advances into Hungary and Czechoslovakia and fight Germans in Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

Italy—Americans and British capture several villages and positions in the Bologna area despite rain and mud.

Greece—Germans admit withdrawal from Thebes, 32 miles northeast of liberated Athens. Allies land additional troops and supplies in Greece.

Pacific—Gen. Douglas MacArthur confirms American invasion of the Philippines, saying major amphibious forces have landed on the east coast of Leyte island. He reports beachheads are being widened and supplies are pouring ashore to prepare for the battle against an estimated 225,000 Japanese in the archipelago. He says American troops are now in position to split Japanese forces in the Philippines in half.

China—Semi-official Chinese source reports the recapture by Chinese troops of Tsjung-king, 23 miles north of Kwei-lin.

Gov. Earl Snell Thursday called upon Oregon citizens to observe Sunday, Oct. 22 as "the day of Greek liberation," in commemoration of the return to Athens of the Greek government from exile.

"Return to freedom of this historic country is an outstanding event of the war," Governor Snell said.

Passengers Periled By Hired Tomato

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.-(AP)—Zooming by in a light-colored car, youths threw a tomato through the windshield of a Garden Home bus here last night, breaking the glasses of the woman driver, Margie Anderson. She stopped the vehicle safely.

Other motorists who unsuccessfully chased the car report the same youths have splattered their automobiles with tomatoes.

The former Oregon governor admitted this particular measure was "his pet" and had been promoted by him while in office. He explained that the only other way in which voting privileges may be restored to a person who has served time in prison is for the governor to issue a full pardon. Such action has the effect of "wiping out the record" which may not be desirable, the speaker said.

Youth Center Appeal Made to Lions Club

A native of Salem, he moved to Sisters 32 years ago and as a newspaper publisher advocated completion of the McKenzie trans-mountain highway.

He is survived by his widow and two sons, Kenneth of Fresno, Calif., and Donald of Sisters.

Mr. Reidy was born in Champagne, Ill., Dec. 30, 1878, and he came to Salem as a conductor on the Oregon Electric railroad in 1906. He was married to Arzella Davidson at St. Paul in 1905. Mrs. Reidy died in 1924.

Survivors are a daughter, Honora Reidy of Salem; two sons, Paul F. Reidy, Jr., US army in North Africa and James F. Reidy, with the US navy in the Atlantic; a sister, Mary Reidy, and two brothers, Charles W. and William J. Reidy all of Minneapolis.

Mr. Reidy was a Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus, a member of the Catholic Foresters, the Elks lodge and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.
