Mrs. F. M. Phelps of Portland took office as president of the Oregon Conference, Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist church at the final session of the annual convention at the First Methodist church, Friday. Mrs. E. M. Tilton, Springfield, was installed vice president; Mrs. D. E. Oleman, Houlton, recording secretary; Mrs. J. H. Thomas, Portland, corresponding secretary; Mrs. F. N. Haroun, Portland, treasurer; Mrs. W. L. Lewis, missionary education; Mrs. R. A. Feenstra, Roseburg, missionary service; Mrs. Alice M. Chappell, Portland, Christian social relations and local church activities.

Mrs. Jessie Bunch of Corvallis, retiring president, who has served for four years as head of the WSCS, was given a life membership in the organization.

Bishop Bruce Baxter, speaking during the Friday afternoon session, discussed the five point program of the Methodist women in connection with the church's rehabilitation and rebuilding program.

Bishop Baxter Talks

Most talked of is that of reconstruction and rehabilitation especially in war ravaged countries. Bishop Baxter explained that \$25 million will be asked from the Methodist churches of the United States for this purpose. "Twenty-five million dollars would pay the United States' share in this war for three hours" the speaker said.

By way of a challenge to Americans to give liberally to church programs, Bishop Baxter said that in the past 15 years, American incomes have increased 80 per cent, federal taxes 600 per cent and federal expenditures are 700 per cent larger than before - yet gifts to churches and related philanthropies have decreased 30 per cent.

Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the Oregon Statesman, discussed the peace outlook in a talk during the afternoon session. Mr. Sprague told of the dangers of the coming peace, and of the weapons with which these dangers may be fought.

Miss Bettie Brittingham, national worker in the Methodist churches, spoke twice during the day. Challenging the church worker, she said, are the problems of rehabilitating returning service men and women; juvenile delinquency; planning an adequate program for world communion day; taking part in elections and the work among migrants. Sixty-five per cent of the voters in this election will be women, she said.

Rev. Ellis Marshburn, worker among the migrants for the council of churches, explained how the migrant problem is on the increase rather than decrease. "Migrants are a symptom of an ailing social order" he said. In stating the problem, he also said that only 23 per cent of the regular residents of Oregon are members of any church, Catholic, Protestant and Jewish. This is the next to the lowest percentage of any state of the union, he said.

The Manley home, a hostel for working girls and the Old People's home were discussed in reports given during the day.

District pledges were announced late in the afternoon. Mrs. Paul Kitzmiller of Dallas announced the pledge of \$7,000 for the Salem area. The Portland area pledged \$7,750, and the Cascade area \$3,825.
