YANKEE POT ROAST
4 lbs. beef round (chuck or rump)
Seasoned flour
1/2 lb. salt pork
1 bay leaf
Sprig parsley
Few raisins
6 carrots
6 onions
6 potatoes
Dredge beef with flour. Cube salt pork; brown in heavy kettle. Brown beef on all sides. When brown, add enough boiling water to cover the bottom of the kettle. Add bay leaf, parsley and raisins. Cover; simmer slowly for 3 hours, keeping about 1 cup water under the meat. During the last hour of cooking add carrots and onions, add the potatoes during the last half hour. Serve on a platter with the vegetables arranged around the meat. If desired, make gravy. (Allow about 1/2 lb. per serving.)

SAUSAGE CASSEROLE
Cover the bottom of a large baking dish with sliced potatoes, several layers thick. Cover these with sliced onions, season with salt and pepper and sprinkle with flour. Add 1 can cream style corn, and arrange cakes made from one pound of sausage over the top. Add water to about half cover and bake until meat and potatoes are done. This dish is good warmed over, too, according to the Statesman reader who telephoned it to this department.

Hot Fight Due Over Welding Liberty Bell

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 — (AP)—Right in the midst of election battling plopped another hot issue for congress today — should the crack in the Liberty Bell be welded?
"Never," said Senator Reynolds (D-NC), "It should be left as it is in its sacred cloister."
"Why not?" asked Rep. Disney (D-Okla.). "It seems a good idea to me. We lead a radio life nowadays and to have its ringing heard over the air would keep the youngsters reminded of the fact there is an old Liberty Bell. If it has a voice it should be heard."
The suggestion that the bell be repaired came from W. J. Conley, consulting engineer for the Lincoln Electric company, Cleveland.

In a letter to Speaker Sam Rayburn, Conley said a study "indicates full tone can be restored to the Liberty Bell by arc welding."
Nothing official can be done about Conley's idea until congress reconvenes Nov. 14, but indications are that debate will ring louder than the old bell did when it cracked in 1833.

The bell has long been enshrined in an honored resting place in Independence Hall, Philadelphia.

Lining up with Reynolds, Senator Johnson (D-Colo.) said "The Liberty Bell is a symbol and there are some sacred things we ought not to tinker with."

Women, Youth Harvest Well

CORVALLIS, Oct. 20 — (AP)—Much of the credit for Oregon's successful harvest this year should go to women and children volunteers, J. R. Beck, Oregon State college extension official, said today.

Farmers were aided by \$9,000 of these helpers at the peak of the season, he reported. About 96 per cent of the state's food crops will be harvested altogether, barring unforeseen difficulties within the next few weeks, Beck predicted.

Among workers this year were hundreds of servicemen including marines from the Corvallis air base and Klamath Falls. Accounting for nearly a half million man-days of work, 5200 Mexicans did about 12 per cent of the state's hired farm labor, Beck said. More than 600 Japanese from

Astoria Tuna Catch Breaks All Records

ASTORIA, Oct. 20 — (AP)—All records in Astoria's six-year history of albacore tuna fishing were broken this season, fishermen said today as catches began falling off.

Enough fish are in cold storage to permit processing for the next two months, the industry reported.

Retail prices of fresh west coast albacore will advance from 1 to 3 cents a pound Monday in Oregon and Washington, the OPA has announced.
