### Medford Bops Pelicans 21-0

MEDFORD - (Special) - With big Marv Doty counting all three touchdowns, one in the first quarter and two in the fourth, Medford's Black Tornado juggernaut rolled over the Klamath Falls Pelicans here tonight, 21-0. Doty scored on power plays behind the big Medford team using straight "T" formation kicks. Bob Watson place-kicked perfectly all conversions.

The Pelicans, who had scintillated with a ground attack of their own that first period, were found themselves outchugged, out-fought and outthrust in the third period and could do little against the big SHS forwards. Lambert consequently ran back an OC punt 14 yards to the Oregon City 41, a beautiful gallop, incidentally, and the Vicks started all over again from right there.

Staats made 14 at right end to set the tempo. Four plays later Weston crashed over right guard for six yards to the OC 7, but was injured on the play and had to be carried from the field. Guard Nile Castor, shifted to fullback in the emergency, came in to carry the ball to the 1-stripe from where Staats powered over left tackle for the second VIK score. The speedster also converted again with an end sweep.

Another Viking drive—and Fullback Bob Weber, also out the past two weeks, was in there now and looking great with his plugging—bogged down on the OC 10, and when it did it came near scaring the pants off the Vicks and some 2500 customers. Fullback Bill Gerkmann snapped off a Lambert pass on the 10 and headed for the Salem goal 90 yards away with nothing to stop him. But swift Staats gladdened the 2500 with a burst of speed which caught the fleeing Gerkmann on the Salem 47. Four plays later Staats intercepted an OC pass himself and opened the way for another Salem score from the OC 44. It was in the fourth frame now and Oregon City, desperate on her 27, tried a pass. But there was alert Staats again to spear it, and down the north sidelines he scooted with the third VIK 6-pointer, a 40-yard gallop in all. The conversion failed.

The Vicks, hot to win this one for sure and betting all the way from the time they woke up in the second period, romped 160 yards on the ground and added 59 through the air for a yards-gained net total of 224. Oregon City maneuvered for 94 and 18, lost 31 and wound up with a net 81. In first downs it was 11-4 for SHS.

Previously injured Tackle Mel Hilkerer also got into the battle near the end to make it practically unanimous. Only Quarterback Lowe of the hospital corps failed to dirty his uniform.
