It was 48 hours in coming, but Kansas finally licked Nebraska. The Jayhawkers turned the trick with a 20-0 triumph at Lawrence, Kan.

Iowa State and Missouri, and Brown and Holy Cross each put on a thrilling offensive program, but finished their games all even. The Cyclones and the Tigers wound up in a 21-21 tie while Brown and Holy Cross finished at 24-24. Another last period field goal by Billy Jones from the seven-yard line—gave Tulane a 16-13 triumph over Auburn at New Orleans. Elsewhere in the south Tulsa swamped Mississippi, 47-0; Kentucky whipped VMI, 26-2; and Alabama and Tennessee battled to a scoreless deadlock.

In the east, Penn State upset Colgate, 6-0; Illinois trounced Pitt, 39-5, while Lafayette trampled Lehigh, 44-0, in the 1944 renewal of America's oldest grid-iron rivalry. Purdue overpowered Iowa, 26-7, while Indiana beat Northwestern, 14-7, in the Western conference. On the Pacific coast, St. Mary's Preflight dumped UCLA, 21-12, and the Fleet City Bluejackets, whipped California, 19-2. In the Rocky mountain area, Colorado university drubbed Colorado college, 28-0, while the Oklahoma Aggies outscored Denver, 33-21. Texas conquered Arkansas, 19-0, in the Southwest conference while Oklahoma smeared Kansas State, 68-0, and Texas Christian defeated the Texas Aggies, 13-7.

### Argentine Corn Due For Oregon Stock

PORTLAND, Oct. 21—(AP)—Some 10,000 tons of Argentine corn shipped by the commodity credit corporation, will arrive in Oregon and Washington this week for use by livestock, dairy and poultrymen, Leon S. Jackson, secretary of the Oregon Feed and Seed Dealers corporation, said today.  
Four thousand tons will be distributed to Oregon feed mixers, 6000 tons to Washington feed handlers. The shipment is less than a normal month's supply, but will be welcomed since little corn has been shipped to the Northwest from producing areas since last April.

### Four Counties Seek Rail to California

MYRTLE POINT, Oct. 21—(AP)—Four southwest Oregon counties were reported today to be behind a proposal that a railroad be built through the southwest part of the state to connect with a line to San Francisco. Representatives of the counties, Lane, Coos, Curry and Douglas, met on the proposal here this week.
