New Sawmill Is Underway

SILVERTON, Oct. 21 — Another sawmill, of a daily capacity of 25,000 feet, is under construction in the Abiqua district and will be ready for operations in about two weeks.

William D. Robbins and Harold Bartsch are the operators and plan to begin cutting five million feet of timber as soon as the mill is completed.

The other two mills are the Evans and the Minden mills. These are in addition to Silver-ton's one large mill owned by the Silver Falls Timber company.

Silver-ton's new planing mill, the Peterson mill, has begun operation with a crew of 15 men under the direction of George Stocking of Riddle.

This mill, built south of the Minden and Evans mills will be able to handle between 75 and 90 thousand feet in an eight-hour shift.

This gives everyone time to look over their statements and deduct allowable discount and mail in their check along with their statement and a receipt will be returned as soon as the office force can get to it. Remember that the Due Date is November 15th. You will find all necessary information on your statement. Read it.
