 Book 4 — Blue stamps A7 through E5 valid indefinitely. Use of blue tokens discontinued October 1.  
**MEAT, BUTTER, FAT & CHEESE:**  
 Book 4 — Red stamps A8 through E5 valid indefinitely. Spare stamp E5 valid exclusively for 10 points lamb through October 31.  
**SUGAR:**  
 Book 4 sugar stamps 28, 31, 32 and 33 valid indefinitely. 2 pounds each.  
**SHOES: Loose Stamps Invalid:**  
 Book 3 — Airplane stamps Nos. 1 and 2 valid indefinitely. 3 valid November 1.  
**GASOLINE:**  
 "A" 15 expires December 31. Each coupon worth 4 gallons.  
**FUEL OIL:**  
 Old period four and five coupons valid throughout the current heating season. New period one coupon also valid now and good throughout heating year.  
**STOVES:**  
 Apply at local OPA board for purchase certificates.

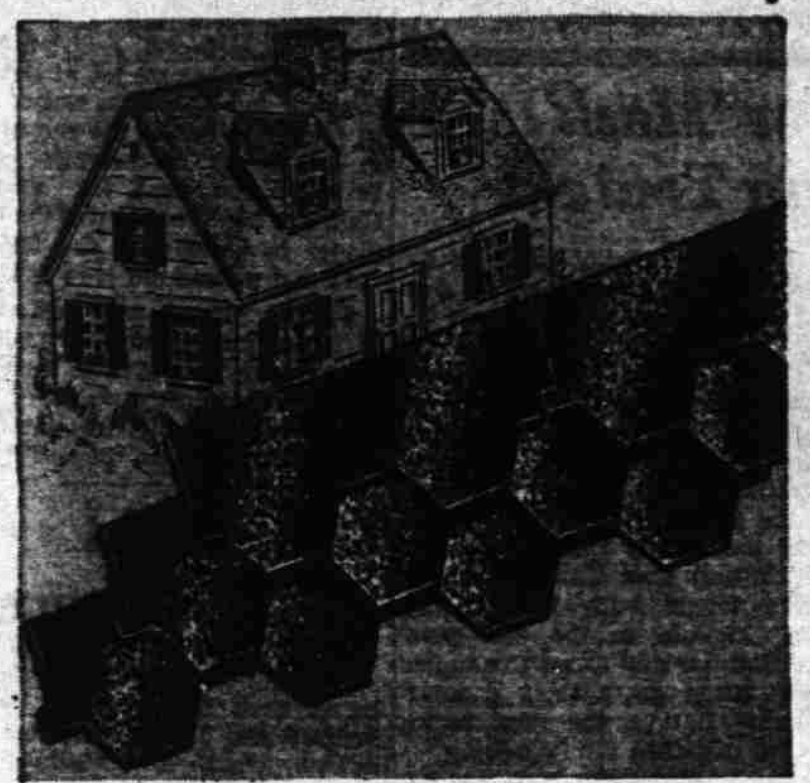

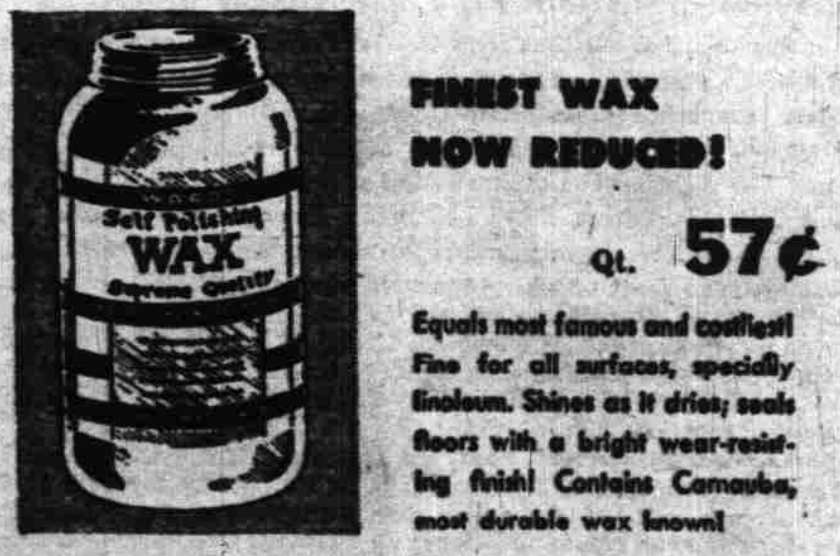

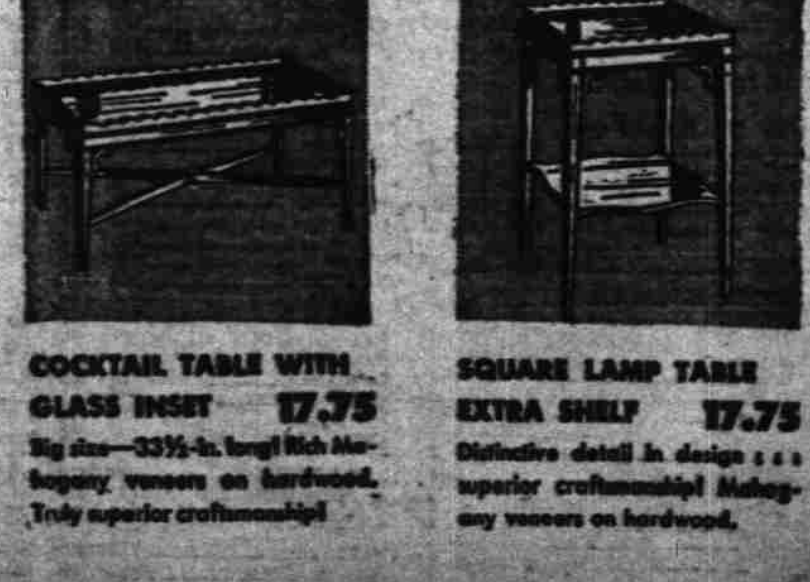
