punt 26 yards to the Washington 39. Burnside rammed tackle to the 22 and Jim Hardy crossed up the Washington defense by a "bootleg" run around his left end to the 2. Hardy plunged over on the next play. Don Garner missed the placement for the extra point.

Washington, playing desperate football, tried to pass on fourth down and failed and the Trojans took over on the Husky 22. On the next play Hardy passed to George Callanan in the end zone for the third touchdown. Drebrow missed the placement and Southern California led at the half, 18-0.

Third—A brilliant 45-yard dash off right tackle by Gray tumbled the Trojans' fourth touchdown. In 12 plays, Southern California marched 77 yards, but after making it first down on the Husky 2, it required four shots for George Callanan to split left tackle across the goal.

Washington then went 37 yards in three plays for a touchdown. The payoff was a forward pass, Gilmore to Zech, who lateraled to Berlin, and the Washington center scored standing up. The try for placement was blocked but the Trojans fumbled after recovering and Jack Bigley recovered in the end for Washington and the extra point. Score California 24, Washington 7.

Fourth—Washington opened up with a passing attack that was sporadically successful but Trojan sub-quarterback George Murphy intercepted a Husky pass and returned to the visitors' 39. In seven plays, with Pat West and Burnside carrying the ball, Southern California scored, Burnside counting from the seven. West added the extra point.

When Washington fumbled the next kickoff, S.C. recovered on the 24. West and Murphy bucked the ball to the three and West scored.

Bill Nicholson of the Cubs with 33, Mel Ott of the Giants with 26 and Northey with 22 set the senior circuit home run pace while Nick Eiten of the Yanks, led the American with 22, the lowest total since Babe Ruth and Tillz Walton tied in 1918, with 11.

Twelve players in the American and nine in the National hit grand slam clouts, Vern Stephens of the Indians, Ken Keltner of the Browns, and Nicholson each connecting for two such homers.

Bobby Doerr and Bob Johnson of the Boston Red Sox and Dixie Walker of Brooklyn hit a single, double, triple and homer in a game for another type of batting cycle.

In the pitching department three no-hit, no-run games were hurled and Boston's Jim Tobin figured in all of them. Tobin blanked the Dodgers without a safety April 27, repeated the performance in a curtailed five-inning affair against the Phils June 22 and was on the losing end of a near perfect game spun by Clyde Shoun of the Reds May 15. Tobin spoiled it by getting Shoun's only walk.

Yank Army Private Charged With Murder

LONDON, Oct. 23 (AP)—An American army private was accused today of being the accomplice of a pretty 18-year-old blonde dancer in the slaying of George E. Heath, 35, widely-known operator of a special taxi service and called "the man with the cleft chin." The army announced that Pvt. Karl G. Hulton of Boston had been charged with murder. The girl, Elizabeth Marina Jones, was booked on a similar charge 10 days ago. Both were arrested by Scotland Yard detectives.

Payroll in Oregon Shows Fair Increase

The September, 1944, payroll in Oregon, as reported to the state Industrial accident commission here, aggregated \$50,263,527 as against \$47,878,416 for September, 1943, commission officials announced Monday. The August, 1944, payroll was \$49,138,683.

Flood Control Survey Urged

ASTORIA, Oct. 23 (AP)—Reconsideration of the type of dams proposed for flood control and irrigation on the Willamette river was urged today by the board of policy consultants for the Columbia basin fisheries maintenance program.

Flood control can be accomplished with low dams as well as with the proposed high ones, states a resolution passed by the board. Salmon runs would be saved without interference with other economic problems by this action, said the measure, sent to the US fish and wildlife service.

Formulation of policies to preserve the fish life of the Columbia river and its tributaries is the object of the consultants, appointed by Secretary Harold Ickes to represent Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Lightning Causes 53 Out of 64 Forest Fires

EUGENE, Oct. 23 (AP)—Roy A. Elliott, acting supervisor, said today that 53 of the 64 fires in the Willamette National forest this summer were caused by lightning, the rest by carelessness. Thanks to the Keep Oregon Green movement, closures and increased vigilance of visitors, only 10 acres of the two million acres under association protection, were damaged by fire, he reported.

Navy Lists 15 Dead in Fire

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23 (AP)—The navy listed 15 dead today with the death of an injured seaman and recovery of the body of the last man missing in the fire which swept two medium naval landing craft, wrecked 200 feet of dock and damaged 15 welding trucks and a navy crane at Terminal Island in Los Angeles harbor Saturday.

Ten of the dead were navy men and five are civilians. Bodies recovered today were those of William M. Casserly, 40, of Long Beach, Calif., and Jack Frederick Stettner of nearby Downey. The navy said names of its personnel lost in the fire will be withheld until relatives had been informed.

Mexican Nationals Average \$17 Per Day

LAKEVIEW, Oct. 23 (AP)—Wages they probably have never heard of are being paid to Mexican nationals now harvesting Lake county potatoes. Pickers are averaging about \$17 a day where the yield is good.
