Dehydrating Plant Uses Electric Heat

McMINNVILLE, Nov. 4 - (AP) - The Wright dehydrating plant has completed the installation of electrical heating equipment here, said to be the first of its kind in the United States.

The equipment will demand approximately 2,000,000 kilowatt hours of power annually, increasing the load on the McMinnville system by about 13 per cent.

Grain Prices Turn Lower

CHICAGO, Nov. 4 - (AP) - Profit taking developed near the close of today's trade in grain futures and prices turned fractionally lower after having held firm most of the session. Closing quotations were near the day's lows.

Pre-election dullness prevailed in all markets and the trade was so light that prices were easily influenced by relatively small orders.

Wheat was up as much as half a cent at the start but the advance brought out increased offerings and prices eased back.

At the close wheat was unchanged to 1/4 cent lower than yesterday's finish, December \$1.63 1/2. Corn was off 1/4 to 1/2 cent, December \$1.08 1/2. Oats were unchanged to 1/4 cent lower, December 63 1/2. Rye was unchanged to off 1/4 cent, December \$1.10 1/4. Barley was unchanged to 1/4 cent lower, December \$1.02 1/2.

Stocks Finish Steady Week

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 - (AP) - The stock market today finished a generally steady week with minor plus signs predominating.

Earnings and dividends, as much as anything else, contributed to selective bullishness during the six sessions but buying and selling urgency was lacking throughout and no 5-hour volume ever got within reaching distance of the million-share mark.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was up .1 of a point at 55.3 and on the week held a net gain of .5. Transfers for the final two hours amounted to 358,030 shares against 296,150 last Saturday.

In the advancing ranks today were Commonwealth Edison and Evans Products, at peaks for 1944; Chrysler, Santa Fe, Chicago & Northwestern common and preferred, Goodrich, Douglas Aircraft, American Can, American Telephone, Texas Co. and Kennecott. Losers included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, U. S. Rubber, J. I. Case and Southern Pacific.
