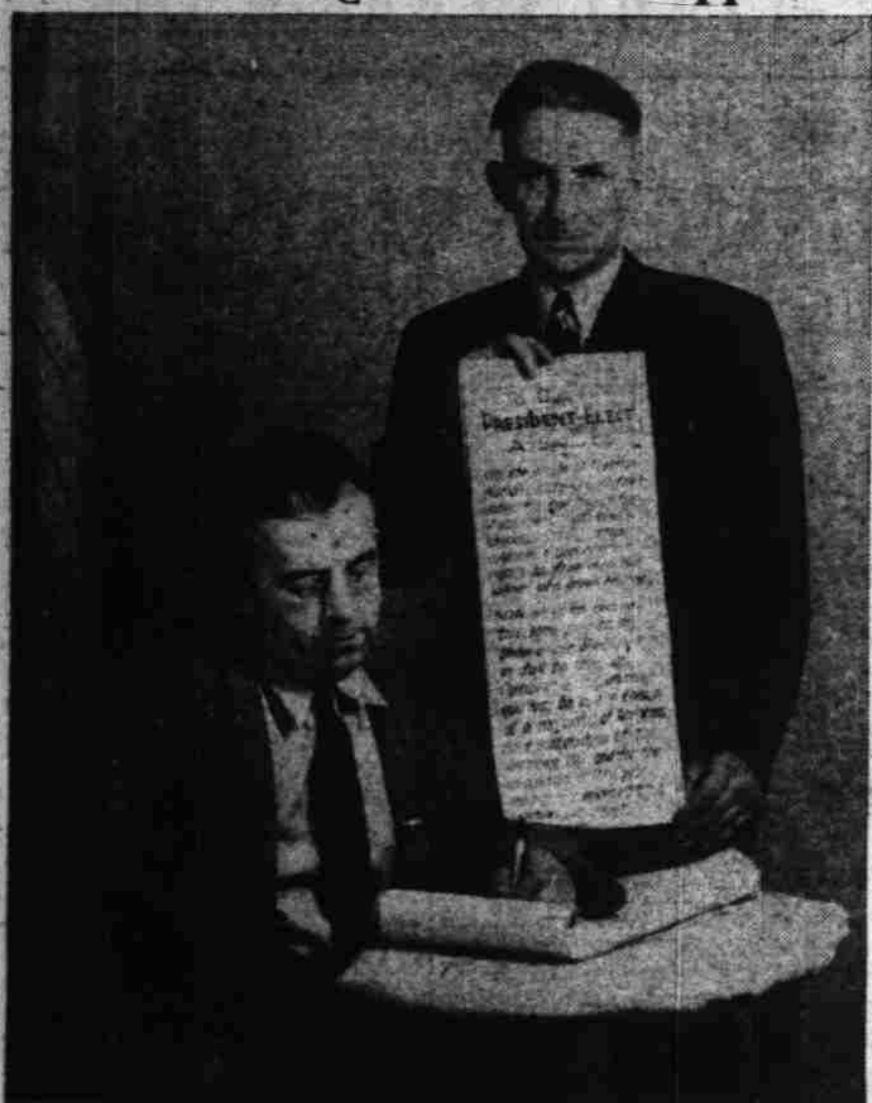

## \$42,145,724.72

## Now on Hand In State Vault

Cash on hand in the state treasury as of Oct. 31, 1944, aggregated \$42,145,724.72, including short-term investments. State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott announced here Friday. Unreceipted assets totaled \$5,220,966.22.

In addition to cash in the state treasury the state unemployment compensation commission has a trust fund of \$59,221,113.96 deposited with the United States treasury. Bond investments total \$32,631,137.14.

Items included in the cash account: General fund \$21,610,194.44; land board, \$784,313.87; industrial accident commission, \$3,216,262.56; board of higher education, \$1,656,544.92; board of control, \$31,484.02; highway commission, \$8,880,480.74; unemployment commission, \$149,602.79; veterans state aid commission, \$604,441.91; vocational funds, \$728,841.83; public assistance, \$334,699.60; liquor control commission, \$566,692.85; miscellaneous, \$33,435.32, and state school support fund, \$3,548,730.07.

## Philippine War Victims Will Get U.S. Help

Relief for Philippine civilian war victims will move in the wake of the military liberation of the islands with the U.S. army, the Philippine government and Philippine War Relief, member agency of the National War Fund, coordinating their programs for maximum results, it was stated to Charles A. Sprague, president of

Oregon War Chest, by Charles P. White, executive director of Philippine War Relief.

A clothing project now underway in the United States is expected to result in the production of 450,000 garments for early distribution by Philippine War Relief.

As in the case of liberation and occupation by the military in other areas, the immediate relief needs of the civilian population will be handled by army authorities. Supplementing these emergency relief measures, the Philippine government will initiate a

large relief program to place civilians on a self-sustaining basis. Philippine War Relief, supported in part by voluntary contributions to the Marion county War Chest, stands ready to aid as requested by the army and the Philippine government.

"Normally, the islands import practically all finished products," Mr. White explained. "In three years of occupation by the Japs, even the limited agricultural supplies have been confiscated, which, coupled with the Jap 'Mickey Mouse money' has created a state of inflation. The three

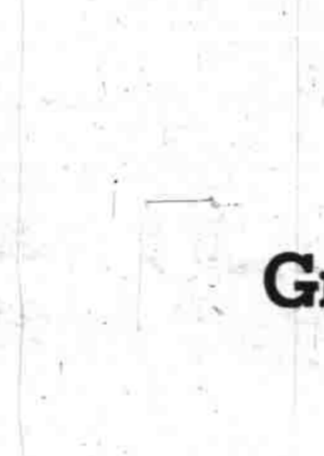

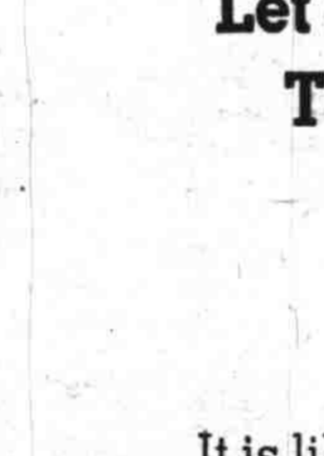

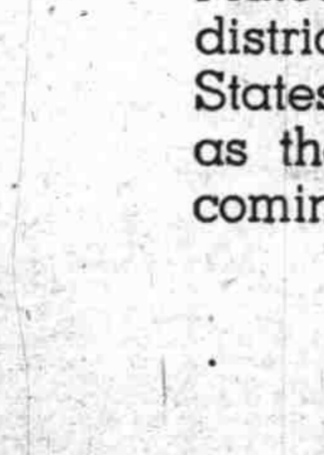
