**BAKED VEAL CHOPS**  
 4 veal chops  
 1 tablespoon flour  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
 2 tablespoons butter or other shortening  
 2 sliced medium sized onions  
 1 cup sour cream  
 Season flour with salt and pepper. Wipe meat with a clean, damp cloth and dredge with seasoned flour. Sauté chops in fat until well browned on both sides. Place in a greased baking dish, add sliced onions and sour cream, cover and bake at 350 degrees for one hour, or until chops are tender.

 3 tablespoons butter  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
 2 tablespoons bread crumbs  
 2 tablespoons grated cheese  
 Boil noodles in salted water with garlic until noodles are tender. Drain and remove garlic. Add pepper and butter and place in greased baking dish. Mix bread crumbs and cheese and spread on top of noodles. Bake for five minutes at 350 degrees or until cheese is melted.
