

### Campaign Expenditures for Recent Election Filed Here

November election campaign expenditures of \$5300 in behalf of Guy Cordon, republican, for United States senator, four-year term, were reported to the state department here Tuesday.

Largest of these was \$3000 by William Einzig of Portland. Other Cordon expenditures included Joseph P. Tarola, \$250; W. L. Thompson, \$500; Guy Hanes, \$100; G. S. Hinsdale, \$100; W. E. Boyd \$100, Harry E. Heathman \$200, E. W. Peck \$100, E. M. Bush \$400, Earl Harris \$100, Dean Ireland \$200 and S. A. Agnew \$250.

James P. Forsythe, treasurer of the Homer D. Angell for congress committee, third Oregon district, reported expenditures of \$5576.59. Other Angell contributions included Homer Angell \$677.13, John C. Failing for Mary F. Failing \$100, and John D. Williams \$50.

For Harris Ellsworth, republican, for representative in congress, fourth district, L. E. McClintock, Roseburg, expended contributions of \$4097.24.

Expenditures for James W. Mott, republican, for representative in congress, 1st district, were reported by William Ellis, chairman of the Mott for Congress committee, in the amount of \$2371.

Walter A. Woodward reported expenditures of \$700 in behalf of Wayne Morse and Guy Cordon, for United States senator, and Harris Ellsworth.

Other expenditures of \$100 or more reported here Tuesday: Marshall E. Cornett, Klamath Falls, republican, for state senator, 17th district, \$100. Ben F. Dorris, Eugene, contribution to the republican state central committee, \$100. Ernest C. Swigert, in behalf of the republican central committee, \$150.

### UAL Argues For Extension Of Services

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14 — (AP) United Air Lines began arguments yesterday before the civil aeronautics board examiners to support its application for permission to serve 24 more western cities while adding 145 miles to its existing routes.

The cities include: Oregon — Klamath Falls, Bend, North Bend, Marshfield, The Dalles, Astoria and Baker. Washington — Chehalis, Centralia, Olympia, Hoquiam, Aberdeen and Yakima.

Idaho — Lewiston, Clarkston, Gooding and Twin Falls. Of these the neighboring cities of North Bend - Marshfield - Chehalis - Centralia, Hoquiam - Aberdeen and Lewiston - Clarkston would be served by single airflights.

Only two opinions were handed down by the state supreme court here Tuesday. They were: Robert Marvin and Jack Shanks, appellants, vs. Furniture Makers local union No. 1090 of the Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers of America, and others. Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit for \$20,000 of strike fund which the union had in its possession when it switched from AFL to CIO. Opinion by Justice Kelly. Judge James W. Crawford affirmed in part and reversed in part. Lillian Ulrich and others vs. Lincoln Realty company and others, appellants. Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit involving mortgages on apartment houses. Opinion by Justice Harry Belt. Judge Robert Tucker, affirmed.

Taxpayers who make their payments by 5 p. m. today will receive the 3 per cent rebate allowed for payment in full. The office will close at 5 p. m., Harold Domagala, chief deputy in charge said. Long lines of taxpayers crowded the courthouse Monday and Tuesday and more than 5000 have met their payments. More than 2000 letters arrived in the mail Tuesday. A total of nearly 34,000 statements were sent out.

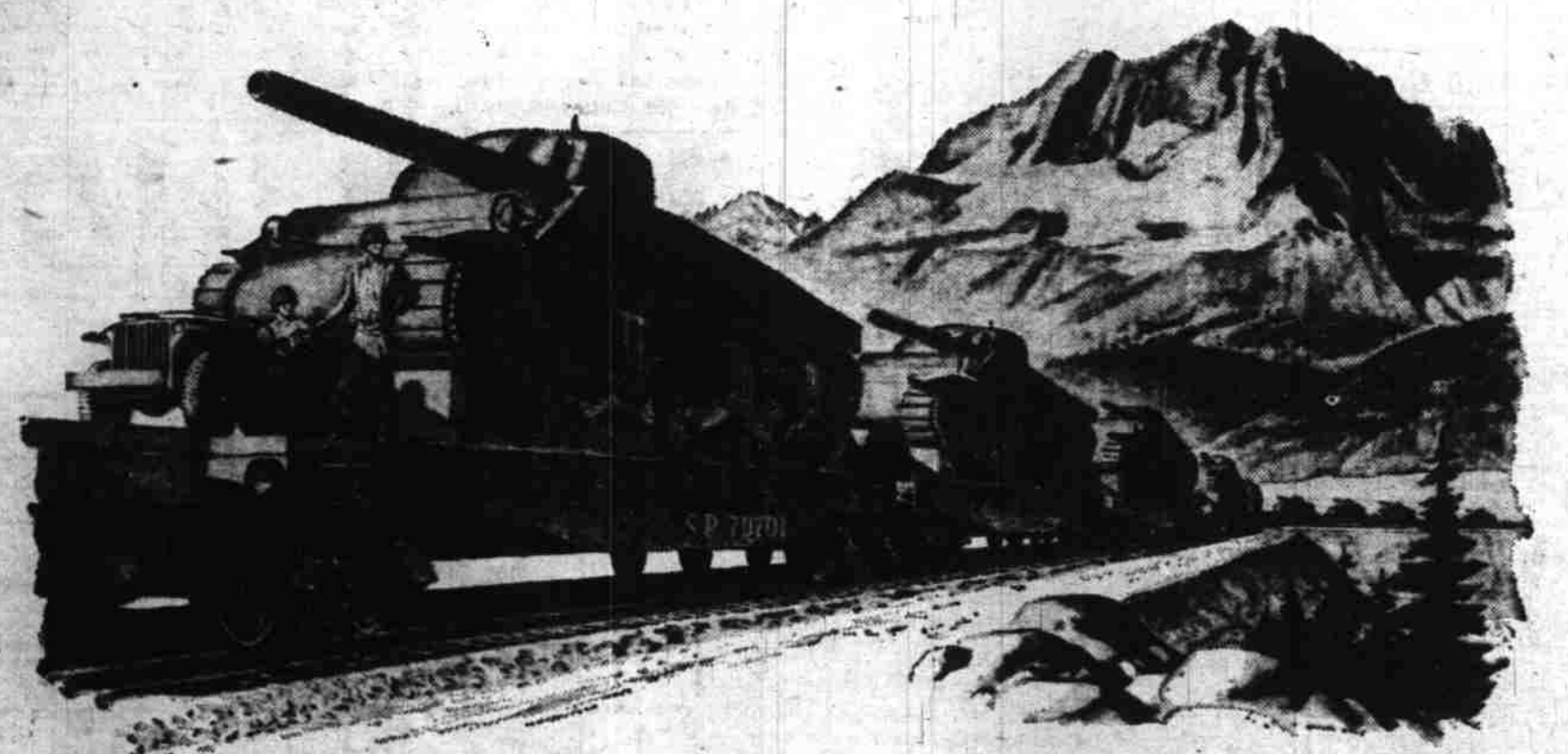
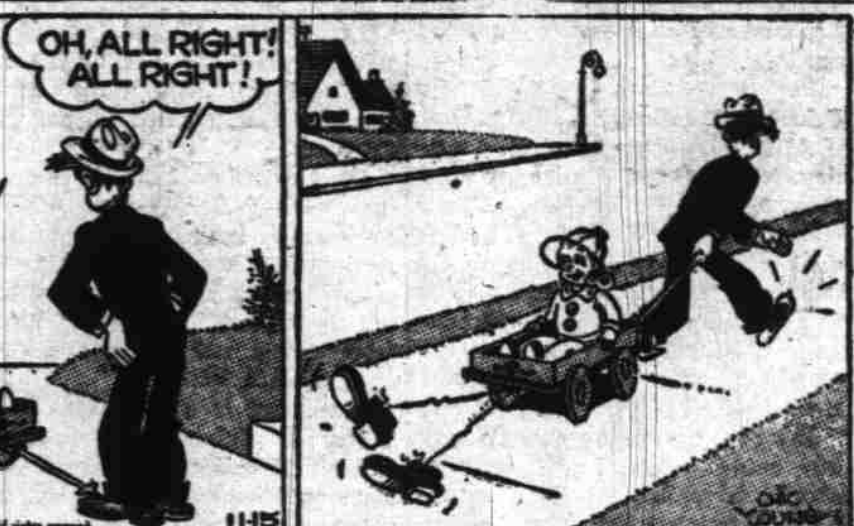
