# Permits for Drivers May Be Extended

A request for a new two-year extension of motor vehicle operator's licenses will be made of the legislature. Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr., told the Hollywood Lions club Wednesday, because of:

A shortage of experienced examiners; a lack of time on the part of the driving public to stand in line waiting for examinations when their efforts are needed in wartime and war-related industries; a definite "I-won't-do-it" attitude on the part of motorists, and because there is no great need for re-examination of many persons who operate automobiles.

One large class of drivers—those now over-age—would be left behind drivers' wheels if new examinations are not required, Farrell declared. He said those in this class are often unwilling to surrender their operators' licenses and yet often have proved to be hazards on the highways.

When the war is over, another general examination of motor vehicle operators may be anticipated, Farrell indicated, but in all probabilities other red tape, which has been cut in the offices which comprise his department, will remain in shreds, he said.

The public has not misused privileges because of relaxation of rules, Farrell maintained, pointing to the owners of farm trucks who were once required to file affidavits as to weights of their trucks

and certificates signed by state weighmasters. This group now merely files with the state department statements of owners as to weights of trucks. Members of it are still liable for a mis-statement but need not spend many hours securing evidence.

The very variety of the work undertaken by the state department has made it the logical place for relaxation of red tape to begin, Farrell maintained. Only because he and his predecessors "have inherited experienced and able department heads" has the state department with its multiplicity of almost unrelated duties run smoothly, the speaker declared.

# Neuner Gives Two Opinions

No part of the post war development special tax proposed by the Portland school district directors and approved by the voters there can be used until peace terms have been signed at the conclusion of the current world war, Attorney General George Neuner held here Wednesday.

The opinion was requested by Former District Attorney James R. Bain of Multnomah county.

Neuner further held that the expenditure of these funds is not restricted to the construction and repair of buildings but may be used for the purchase of furniture and other school equipment.

In another opinion Neuner held that two physicians must appear together in the examination of a person before he or she can be legally committed to the state home for the feeble minded.
