WU Students Open Bond Drive
Willamette university students opened their bond-buying-selling drive Monday to reach the \$15,000 goal set for the school in the nation's Sixth War Loan bond campaign.

Prizes will be awarded to individuals and to organizations accounting for the largest turn-in of cash from sale of bonds. Head of the drive is Conrad Pavlock, V-12 student. Under rules for the contest students will receive the same credit for bonds sold outside the school as those sold to students and faculty members. The school campaign will end December 15.

Glenn Meisner Will Supervise Tin Can Drive

Glenn Meisner was appointed today by Gardner Knapp, chairman of the Marion county salvage committee, to serve as general chairman for the tin can drive. The drive is scheduled by Marion county schools and salvage committees for November 27 to 30 inclusive.

Meisner will assist in coordinating the efforts of schools, salvage committees and voluntary bottlers, so that as many tin cans as possible may be collected and shipped to war during the drive.

Cooperation Urged
Letters are being sent to all block leaders in Salem and to all granges in the county, urging their cooperation in the coming campaign. The need was particularly stressed by the Marion county defense council for citizens in both rural and urban areas to deliver, whenever possible, their cans to the nearest grade school during the drive period.

"No tin cans should be taken to schools before November 27, however, since schools will not be able to handle them prior to that date," Knapp emphasized.

Schools to Collect
Arrangements have been made with Mrs. Agnes Booth, county school superintendent, and Frank B. Bennett, Salem city school superintendent, for school children to collect the cans throughout the county from Monday to Thursday, November 27 to 30. Pick-up from schools will be made by volunteer bottlers on Friday, Dec. 1.

Polk county's tin can drive will coincide with Marion county's. The same collection plan is being used there, according to Mrs. Erle Full-

gham, chairman of the women's division of the Polk county salvage committee.
