

American Leadership Must Continue After War Says Snell

American leadership must not end with the signing of the peace documents, but must continue if the world is not only to make but to keep peace, Gov. Earl Snell declared Monday noon as he spoke before the Salem Chamber of Commerce luncheon forum and addressed KSLM's radio audience.

This country is obligated because "we want nothing," Snell said, pointing out that economically the United States is more interested in retaining peace than in any other aspect of international activity.

Leadership can be gained, he indicated, only if internal affairs are efficiently managed to do away with possibility of economic upheaval in the postwar United States.

Veterans' Program
Returning veterans, he declared, must find their proper niche. The system suggested by the governor and approved by the 35 interested organizations in Portland which will participate in a veterans' program was described by Snell.

Each of the 35 organizations will send a representative to a council from which seven will be selected as an executive group to serve in liaison capacity between veterans' and affiliated organizations and state and federal agencies prepared to aid returning servicemen.

Clearing House
The veterans' committee, created by the last session of the legislature and organized for more than a year, is to be the clearing house, Snell said, prepared to send servicemen to the agency, state, federal or private equipped to meet their specific problems.

Oregon's postwar readjustment and rehabilitation committee, he declared, has in its records programs of postwar work already in at least tentative form which call for expenditure of \$400,000,000, while \$60,000,000 has already been appropriated for postwar work in the state. To this Snell added the unemployment compensation fund
