

Jap Advances Shove British, Americans Out

CHUNGKING, Tuesday, Nov. 28 (AP)—All American and British nationals in Kweichow province and the unoccupied portions of Hunan province were ordered to leave as two Japanese forces surged today toward Kweichow, capital of Kweichow.

A Chinese communique said the Japanese westward drive from Liuchow had toppled Hochih and that the invaders were less than 140 miles southeast of Kweichow. Another enemy column was headed toward Kweichow from Pao-ching in Hunan province.

Missionaries, Red Cross workers and representatives of various civilian agencies were affected by the notification which gave them ample time to escape.

Generally it was felt in Chungking that the next few months would be the most critical since the war began in 1937.

Fall of Kweichow would place the invaders in position to strike toward Chungking, 200 miles to the northwest.

Malnutrition From Alcohol Causes Ills

PORTLAND, Nov. 27 (AP)—Many diseases attributed to alcoholism come, instead, from its accompaniment—malnutrition, Dr. Howard W. Haggard, director of Yale university's laboratory of applied physiology, asserted here today.

Speaking at the opening of a five-day conference on alcoholic studies, he exploded numerous fallacies by claiming that alcohol irritates neither heart nor brain, that small men get drunk quicker than large ones and that alcohol is a food, but a bad one.

Dr. Haggard said he considered alcohol as an anesthetic, rather than a stimulant or sedative. "When absorbed in the body it depresses and abolishes the brain functions, exactly as does ether."

The speaker, one of many scheduled to address the conference, declared that the effect of alcohol on the human body is so complex that solving the problem of alcoholism calls for the marshalling of all the sciences—physiology, psychology, medicine, psychiatry, law, economics, government and education.

The conference, first of its kind ever held on the Pacific coast, is sponsored by Gov. Earl Snell and the educational advisory committee to the Oregon liquor control commission.

Three Men Injured In Tugboat Blast

PORTLAND, Nov. 27 (AP)—An explosion in the river tugboat Ben Hur caused damage estimated by owners at \$7500 and injured three Portland tugboat workers today.

The injured men were John O'Connor, Pat Dunn, and Don Allen. Cause of the blast, which bystanders said occurred while the men were trying to start the motor, was under investigation. The tug was moored at the Port of Portland drydock.

District Attorneys and Sheriffs to Hold Meet

PORTLAND, Nov. 27 (AP)—The Oregon State District Attorney's association and the Oregon State Sheriffs' association will hold their annual conventions here Thursday and Friday.

The two groups will meet in joint session Friday to hear addresses by Gov. Earl Snell, US Senator-elect Wayne Morse and Secretary of State R. S. Farrell.

Oregon Octogenarian Dies at Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 27 (AP)—J. W. Mitchell, one of Oregon's oldest native citizens, died here yesterday at the age of 84. He was born in Silverton, and homesteaded near the present site of Grand Coulee dam.

House Wants Part in Peace

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The house bid against heavy odds today for a share in the writing of a future peace.

A judiciary subcommittee unanimously approved a constitutional amendment which, if adopted, would end for all time the senate's traditional and exclusive voice in ratifying treaties. But, to become effective, the senate has to agree to the change.

The resolution provides that future treaties be ratified by a simple majority vote by both branches of congress. The senate now has sole powers, by two-thirds vote, to ratify international agreements.

The committee action was only the first step on a legislative path filled with so many obstacles that many members say privately that the amendment doesn't have a chance this session.

Student Body Officers Will Meet at WU

Salem will be mecca for college student body officers throughout Oregon when the sixth annual conference of the Oregon Federation of Collegiate Leaders convenes at the state capitol building Friday and Saturday.

Rich Wicks, president of the host Willamette student body, is chairman in charge of arrangements for the two-day meet. George Dewey, president of the Oregon State student body and head of the organization, will preside at the conference sessions which will deal with the problems of college student government in wartime.

Judge Arthur D. Hay of the state supreme court will keynote the convention when he addresses delegates at a Saturday evening banquet. Other highlights of the weekend will be a review of the Willamette naval training unit Saturday afternoon and a Willamette-University of Oregon basketball game and post game dance concluding the weekend's activities that evening.

Colleges sending delegates totaling 47 are Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon College of Education, Eastern Oregon College of Education, Marylhurst college, Mt. Angel college, Multnomah college, Lewis and Clark college, Oregon State college, University of Oregon, Willamette University and St. Helens hall.

Hold Provision In War Powers Act Is Planned

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The house judiciary committee approved a one-year extension of the administration's sweeping war powers act today but pinned to it a provision for a court review of war agency rulings.

Today's bill, which will be reported to the house probably tomorrow, extends for one year the life of the act which otherwise would expire with the close of this year.

With its approval, however, the committee adopted an amendment providing for a court review of WPB and OPA suspension orders by which the use of priority materials can be withdrawn from individual manufacturers or dealers.

The present act provides no appeal from agency orders. Under the amendment individuals can go into court and get a stop order against a WPB suspension order anytime within 10 days after the order is issued.

Thumbnail of War!

(By the Associated Press)

Western Europe — American first army captures most of shattered Hurtgen east of Aachen as other units drive the nazis back to the west bank of the Roer river; third army smashes across the Saar frontier of Germany and at one point is only 13 miles from Saarbrücken; Mustang fighters destroy more than 100 German planes in war's biggest aerial dogfight.

Russia — Reds capture more than 50 towns inside Slovakia and launch a drive for the Danube river north of Budapest, evidently designed to outflank that Hungarian capital.

Italy — British throw three forces to within a few miles of Faenza, Po valley highway center.

Pacific — Saipan-based B-29s again bomb Tokyo while other Superforts strike at Bangkok, Thailand capital; American ground forces on Leyte halted by severe tropical storms.

China — Japanese surge to within less than 140 miles of Kweichow, capital of Kweichow province.

Investigators reported that most companies furnishing ice cream and dairy products in this area attempt to pasteurize their milk, but lack accurate temperature controls.

Smaller Cities Outsell Salem In Bond Drive

Reports from cities outside of Salem indicate good progress in the Sixth War Loan, Gene Vandenberg, chairman, reported. Vandenberg said reports indicate the smaller cities are outselling Salem.

Eighteen rural districts are now thoroughly organized for the campaign, Frank Doerfler, rural chairman, announced. The total quota for the rural districts in the last campaign was \$73,000 but sales reached \$100,000.

J. C. Penney employees purchased \$24,000 in bonds, it was reported Monday, or 400 per cent of the quota allotted. The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company reported it had reach 91 per cent of the quota set for it.

Robert Minton, industrial chairman, reported that total corporate purchases Monday had passed \$311,000.

Tablet to Mark Spot Of Historic Pine Tree

BAKER, Nov. 27 (AP)—The site of a pine tree which gave its name to this area in the early 1800's will be commemorated with a marker placed by the Church of St. Stevens here.

The tree, which stood on the old emigrant road at the Baldock slough crossing, was cut down in 1845. The area, first named Lone Tree valley, later became Baker valley.

FDR Smoking Less for His Health's Sake

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—President Roosevelt, like many another cigar smoker, is lighting up less these days.

But the cigar shortage isn't primarily to blame even though it's hit the White House too.

The chief executive told his news conference today that he's been cutting down since he had trouble with a bronchial ailment last spring. He's now smoking less than a pack a day instead of two packs.

Apparently, he has an ample supply to take care of his needs.

Other folks at the executive mansion, however, aren't so fortunate. Mrs. Roosevelt disclosed at an earlier news conference.

Careless of cigars aren't available there any more, either, she said, and people visiting there bring along their own—if they can get them.

Body of Missing Navy Man Found in Harbor

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Nov. 27 (AP)—The body of Navy Lt. William K. Traile, 36, who disappeared 10 days ago from his blood-stained cabin aboard a Liberty ship, was found in the harbor late today, police reported.

A coroner's aide ordered the body taken to Los Angeles for an autopsy to determine the cause of death.

U.S. Air Plan Gains Support

CHICAGO, Nov. 27 (AP)—Support of a postwar airline formula acceptable to the United States developed rapidly today as the international civil aviation conference tried to break an Anglo-American deadlock.

Expressions by 24 nations in the first day of debate on the "fifth

freedom" of air, a program submitted by the United States, showed 19 countries either in favor of the American plan or Canada's compromise offer, which this nation will accept.

This recapitulation from an authoritative source placed France in support of the United Kingdom proposal, with Australia and New Zealand uncertain but inclined in the same direction, and Belgium possibly leaning toward the British.
