Special Canteen Work Slated

National representatives of the Red Cross disaster committee have brought interest of the local nutrition committee to focus upon the necessity for a permanent group of canteen workers. These canteen experts, who can be ready on short notice to open up mobile canteens in time of disaster.

This is not a wartime measure, it was pointed out, although the canteen workers might function during wartime and well as in case of disaster.

The nutrition committee, meeting on Tuesday afternoon, made plans to begin a series of nutrition classes in preparation of the more advanced canteen work. The nutrition classes will open January 17, one in the morning and one at night for business women. Upon completion, of the ten week course, the graduates may take the special canteen work.

These nutrition classes will be of great value to any married woman. Well qualified teachers in nutrition are being secured, who will give information on correct feeding of wartime families.

Other classes for women already graduates of the nutrition classes, and those who are home economics graduates, will be held soon.

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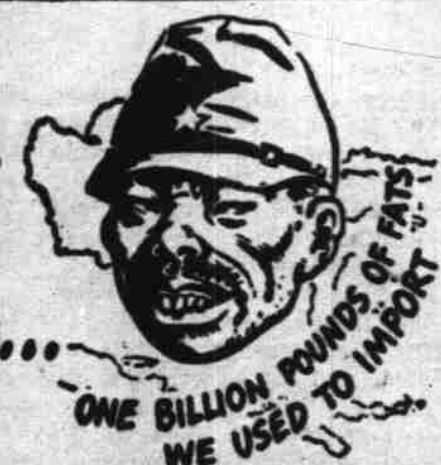
