

Most Districts Expect to Meet 6th Loan Quota

Reports from outside communities in the Sixth War Loan campaign were sounding more optimistic Wednesday, and Cities Chairman Gene Vandendyne was hopeful that most districts would meet their quotas before next Thursday — Pearl Harbor day. Two communities already were over the top and several others were well on their way toward their goal. Outside places are expected to furnish nearly 20 per cent of the county's sales.

Lalish Center was preparing to go over the top at a big rally Friday evening when a local talent program will be presented. Motion pictures of front line action will be exhibited and Capt. Ronald Husk will tell about his experiences during 22 months with Oregon's national guard units in the South Pacific.

From Silverton reports were given by Chairman Jim Clough that actual sales were well ahead of the fifth bond drive figures and the \$300,000 quota would be met. Woodburn already has subscribed more than half of its \$125,000 goal, Chairman Bishopric reported.

Salem's retail employees added to their laurels by going well over their quotas in two additional stores — Woolworth's and Miller's — and others were expected to be added to the list as the committee headed by Dr. E. E. Boring were able to arrange for more meetings. Captain Husk again will be available for the employees' meeting at the Fred Meyer stores at 8:45 this morning.

Nips Advance On Kweiyang

CHUNGKING, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Japanese vanguards have made startling advances inside Kweiyang province toward Kweiyang, its Burma road capital and junction point of a highway network linking Chungking, Kunming and other southwest China cities, a US 14th air force communique disclosed tonight.

The air force bulletin, relayed by the headquarters of Maj. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, announced that fighters strafed enemy cavalry troops on the Paochia-Tukiang road yesterday. This indicated the Japanese had either cut through or outflanked some of the Chinese units which had been expected to defend Kweiyang.

Biddle, Littell Fight Brought Before Public

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 — (AP) — The senate war investigating committee brought the seething quarrel between top justice department officials into the open today but deferred decision on a formal investigation.

After a closed committee session, Chairman Mead (D-NY) made public: 1. A letter from Attorney General Francis Biddle denying he asked for the resignation of Assistant Attorney General Norman M. Littell because of testimony Littell gave the senate committee. The committee's interest in the quarrel developed from this question, the members taking the position that the committee must protect its witnesses.

2. A 12,000 - word memorandum from Littell saying the differences arose because he would not go along with the attorney general in conduct "contrary to basic principles of good government." Among other things, Littell said Biddle intervened in a justice department case in behalf of "his friend, Tommy Corcoran." (Thomas G. Corcoran, former new deal brain trust now in private law practice.)

SILVERTON, Nov. 29 — (Special) — One hundred thirty Future Farmers of America and their guests gathered in the high school cafeteria here Wednesday night for the organization's annual banquet. Don Tykeson, Newberg, state president of the FFA, reported on the organization's activities; M. C. Buchanan of the state department of vocational education delivered a talk, and Harold Davis, Salem YMCA boys' work secretary, gave "A Sales Talk to the FFA Boy."

The invocation was by the Rev. S. L. Amlie; welcome by Charles Morley, and the introduction of guests by Alton Roth. The ROH club, directed by Mrs. Charles Davis, served the meal.

Actress Earns Income Tax Refund From U. S.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28 — (AP) — Uncle Sam today refunded \$5,074.72 to Madeleine Carroll, British-born film actress, on her 1937-38-39 income taxes.

The action climaxed two years' litigation that started when she sued for a refund of \$9,092.55. US District Judge Campbell E. Beaumont allowed her claim for deductions for the support of 51 French war orphans quartered in her home outside Paris in 1936-39 and for the support of her parents, John and Helen Carroll residing in England.

Thumbnail of War!

Western Europe — American troops storm across open ground east of Aachen to within 3½ miles of Duren and 23 of Cologne; other Yank armies establish themselves firmly on the Roer river and continue to advance in the Saar basin.

Russia — After breaking across the Danube river, the reds launch a new drive in south-east Hungary on a 93-mile front south of Budapest and capture 330 towns.

Italy — Mud halts all fighting except patrol clashes.

Pacific — American airmen destroy a 13-ship convoy bearing reinforcements for Nipponese on Leyte, with an estimated 4900 troops killed; B-29s based on Saipan again hammer Tokyo industrial targets; tropical rains continue to slow ground activity on Leyte.

China — Japanese columns advance inside Kewechow province toward Kweiyang, its capital.

No Food Point Changes Due

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 — (AP) — An apparent first-round victory for the war food administration in a new rationing policy controversy tonight increased the probability of no food ration values changes in December.

Refusing to yield to office of price administration requests that a number of commodities be returned to the ration list, WFA held the upper hand for the present in a dispute that so far has blocked preparation of point charts for the next month.

Both agencies agreed there is little chance revisions could be made in time for announcement tomorrow or Friday.

The disagreement—the second the agencies have had in four months over rationing fundamentals—has been submitted to Stabilization Director Fred M. Vinson for arbitration.

It developed when OPA, for the fourth consecutive month, urged that a number of point-free meat cuts, together with most major canned vegetables, be put back on the rationed list. WFA turned thumbs down.

Dorsey Jury Finally Seated

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29 — (AP) — It required three days to select a jury to try Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Dorsey and their friend Allen Smalley of charges of feloniously assaulting movie actor Jon Hall.

Tonight, with the jury finally seated, the indication was that it would take another three days to get through the testimony of the first witness, blonde Jane Churchill. Miss Churchill, a singer who attended the party Aug. 5 in band-leader Dorsey's apartment, where Hall claims he was severely beaten, is described by Dorsey's lawyers as "a very important defense witness."

George Tweed Told to Pay Wife Alimony

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Nov. 29 — (AP) — George Ray Tweed, 45, navy radioman rescued from Guam last July after eluding the Japanese there for 31 months, today was ordered by Superior Judge Jacob Weinberger to pay his wife, Mrs. Mary Tweed, 37, \$90 a month for support of herself and son, pending a hearing on Mrs. Tweed's cross-complaint for divorce.

In addition to the support money, Mrs. Tweed was granted \$200 for attorney fees and \$100 court costs. Neither Tweed nor his wife was in court.

An interlocutory divorce decree granted Aug. 8 to Tweed was set aside last Oct. 26 by Judge Weinberger, who upheld Mrs. Tweed's contention that she was unfamiliar with the nature of the divorce papers she signed, and that the property agreement entered into by the couple was "manifestly unfair to the wife and child."

Mrs. Tweed contended she should share in possibly \$250,000 Tweed may receive from film and book rights to his "Ghost of Guam" experiences. She argued that she should receive a share of the money as community property because the experiences from which Tweed may receive monetary profit happened during the time they still were married.

Cold Vaccines Have no Value

CHICAGO, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Vaccines popularly supposed to prevent or cure the common cold were condemned today as having no proved value in a report published in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

The joint report by the AMA councils on pharmacy and chemistry, and industrial health, included vaccines administered hypodermically, by swallowing capsules (oral vaccine), and by local spraying of the upper respiratory tract.

"Decisive evidence of the value of any vaccine is not forthcoming, and the weight of careful studies clearly indicates that none of the vaccines now available when administered by the routes advised have proved value," the report said.

Movie Premiere Brings \$106,000 in Bond Sales

The 794 seats sold and occupied for Wednesday night's Grand theatre Sixth War Loan premiere brought a total of \$106,000 in bond sales, Chairman Douglas Yeater announced at the close of the show. "It was a full house in the best sense of the term," he declared.

Churchill 70 Today

LONDON, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Prime Minister Churchill will observe his 70th birthday tomorrow without fuss or flourish in the fashion characteristic of his wartime leadership of the British people.

Chinese Push Toward Old Burma Road

MYITKYINA, Burma, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Chinese troops which bypassed Bhamo in their southward offensive in north Burma were driving down a branch highway toward the old Burma road today without meeting any organized Japanese resistance.

Air force reports said the Japanese were retreating from north Burma by day and night and that there were indications even of a Japanese withdrawal from the Mandalay area toward Bangkok, Thailand.

Although the aerial reconnaissance gave more substance to previous reports that the Japanese were getting ready to give up all Burma, the enemy is leaving suicide units at key points. These are delaying the allied advance.

(Progress of the Japanese campaign in southwest China threatening the Burma road in China itself may lessen considerably the military value of Burma to the Japanese. Burma is at the end of a long and exposed supply line which has cost the enemy an increasing loss of ships to allied submarines and planes in recent months.)

Details of the Chinese advance south of Bhamo are being withheld for military reasons, but the operations can be described as deep penetration by large bodies of infiltration troops.

Japanese troops below Bhamo, which is 180 miles northeast of Mandalay, are retreating out of the Loiwing - Namhkan - Manwich triangle southwestward along the Shweli river toward Mongmt, 80 miles northeast of Mandalay.

Col. Roosevelt To Take Third Wife Shortly

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., Nov. 29 — (AP) — Col. Elliott Roosevelt, 34-year-old son of the president, within a week will take his third wife, actress Faye Emerson, 27.

This announcement came today from a spokesman for the colonel and later from blonde Miss Emerson herself, but neither added any details concerning the wedding plans. Roosevelt has been visiting here for several days.

In Beaumont, Tex., Mrs. Jean Young, Faye's mother, said the marriage would take place this weekend, but that the exact time and place are being kept secret. Mrs. Young added that the president's son and the actress met in Hollywood.

After the wedding, Col. Roosevelt, one-time Texas radio executive, and his bride will visit Beaumont, Mrs. Young said.

Miss Emerson, in pictures since 1941, was married once previously to William Wallace Crawford, Jr., by whom she has a 5-year-old son, William Wallace Crawford III. They were divorced in 1942.

Roosevelt and his first wife, Elizabeth Donner Roosevelt, were divorced in 1933 at Minden, Nev. Five days later he married Ruth Goggins. She obtained a divorce last April 18 at Fort Worth, Tex., after testifying that he no longer cared for her and that he urged her to bring the suit. She has custody of their three children.

Commissioned a captain in the army air forces in 1943, Roosevelt was promoted to full colonel last April, and is now on leave after commanding the allied photographic service in Africa and Sicily.

ON the HOME FRONT

Once she wrote for German newspapers—now she reads them. Bella Fromm of the red-gold hair and big hazel eyes delves into the German publications which come to a government office of two in this country through diplomatic services abroad.

When I asked her about women in Germany, she told me this story, one gleaned recently, she said, from the Nazi press:

Tried for high treason, the mother of three small children was sentenced to only 4½ years imprisonment or hard labor because there were "extenuating" circumstances.

When air raids endangered the industrial area in which she lived she was told to put the children in a shelter home. She told the official paying the call that she really preferred keeping them with her. Their father, fighting on the Russian front, had not been heard from in five months and somehow she felt that if something were to happen to her she should like to have the children die with her.

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Which, of course, was high treason.

Airline Hero Saves Plane

CHARLOTTE, NC, Nov. 29 — (AP) — A dramatic escape from death right out of an old time serial thriller occurred here today when an army Flying Fortress crash landed on the Southern Railway tracks as a speeding passenger train rounded the bend.

Fast thinking by Peggy Parsney, an airlines employee, averted a collision. No one on train or plane was hurt or injured.

AFL Approves 60,000,000 Job Goal of FDR

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 29 — (AP) — The American Federation of Labor lined up today behind the president's goal of 60,000,000 postwar jobs, with the added objective of creating an annual income of 173 billions.

The AFL convention approved its postwar planning committee's detailed plan for participating in reconversion and reemployment programs in this country and in labor cooperation throughout the world to bolster peace and unity.

Going a step further, the convention okayed a campaign for a million dollars, beginning in January, to aid workers in liberated countries of Europe and Asia, and similarly distressed peoples of Central and South America.

The postwar proposals were placed before the convention after it had renewed the no-strike pledge for the war's duration, an act which was immediately reported by cable to Generals Eisenhower and MacArthur, to assure them that the AFL intended to keep the materials of war coming.

Leon Henderson Gets Assignment in Germany

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Leon Henderson, economist and former chief of OPA, is scheduled to leave for London next week with an assignment to handle economic affairs in the American controlled third of defeated Germany.

With Henderson will go James A. Perkins, an assistant to Lauchlin Currie, acting deputy administrator of the foreign economic administration.

Falls City Election Monday Names Graham

FALLS CITY, Nov. 29 — Floyd Graham was elected mayor at the election Monday. M. Glover, police judge; Mildred Davis, treasurer; Frank Marvick, marshal; and George Kitchen, councilman, all large. The six elected councilmen are Chester Benfield, Ross Bowman, M. O. Martin, W. O. Powers, E. L. Westbrook and Fay Wilson.

Soldier Cuts Man's Throat To Save Life

WITH THE US THIRD ARMY, Nov. 29 — (AP) — Two lectures heard a year ago during training, plus rare presence of mind and determination enabled Pvt. Duane N. Kinman of College Place, Wash., to save a fellow soldier's life by cutting the man's throat. The 19-year-old medical aid man found a rifleman with a shrapnel wound through the neck thrashing about on the ground, with his face turning blue from lack of oxygen.

Must Open It — Realizing the wound in some way halted breathing, Kinman knew the only way to save him was to open the windpipe below the wound and keep it open so air could get to the lungs.

With a jackknife, with no anesthetic, and with mortar shells bursting nearby, Kinman made a neat incision in the wounded man's neck, but a proper vertical incision, and inserted the soldier's fountain pen to keep the windpipe open.

Held Patient Down

Lt. Edward M. Eberling, a platoon leader from Lincoln, Neb., assisted Kinman by holding the patient down. After the breathing had been restored he helped the wounded man to a tank which took him to the aid station.

No improvement could be made at the aid station, and at a clearing station the only additional treatment needed was to insert the regular tracheotomy tube.

Kinman's main interest when he entered the army was mechanics, but now he thinks he might become a physician.

Chinese Embassy Calls Divorce Rumor False

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 — (AP) — The Chinese embassy today described as "entirely false" reports that Generalissimo and Madame Chiang Kai-shek have separated and that she will live in Miami. The report was published by the London Daily Mail. A statement issued by the Chinese news service quoted the spokesman of the Chinese embassy as denying the report. Madame Chiang is now in the United States receiving medical treatment.
