He left Thursday for Washington, DC, to attend a national conference of unemployment compensation agencies.

Other members of the industrial accident commission are L. O. Arens, representing the public, and Paul Guersky, representing labor.

Snell Gets Support On Milk Regulation

State agricultural department officials will cooperate closely with Gov. Earl Snell in any program that will tighten up the state milk control laws so as to prevent future outbreaks of undulant fever and other infections resulting from milk consumption, they announced here Thursday.

E. L. Peterson, state agricultural director, said he probably would confer with Governor Snell within the next few days. Specific recommendations dealing with the milk situation will be included in Governor Snell's message to the 1945 legislature which meets here in January.

Neuner Says Klamath Candidates in Clear

Neither of the four candidates for mayor of Klamath Falls at the recent election there violated the corrupt practices law by expending funds in their campaigns in excess of that authorized by law, Attorney General George Neuner held here Thursday. Neuner said he based his opinion on records of receipts and disbursements of the four candidates. The opinion was asked by District Attorney L. Orth Sizemore of Klamath county.

Gouley Seeks To Succeed Fred Drager

Romeo Gouley, prominent Marion county hop grower, announced Thursday that he was making satisfactory progress in his campaign for chief clerk of the house of representatives at the 1945 legislative session.

Gouley seeks to succeed Fred Drager, veteran chief clerk, who is not a candidate for reelection. Drager is now located in Portland where he is engaged in war work.

Prior to leaving Salem, Drager was employed as a guard at the state penitentiary here.

Gouley, at the 1943 legislative session, served as secretary of the senate enrolled and engrossed bills committee.
