Craven Majorette, Wirehair Terrier, Best Dog at Show

By popular acclaim as well as judge's decision, the little wirehair terrier, Craven Majorette won best dog at the Oregon Dog Fanciers' association show sponsored by the Salem Lions club Saturday and Sunday. Over 1100 paid admissions were sold, dog lovers coming from many parts of the state to view the final judging on Sunday night. The winning terrier is owned by Reginald Livsey, Milwaukie.

Competing in the finals, and chosen best of the various groups were:

- Best sporting dog, pointer, Ch. Northwest Notable, owned by Gilbert F. Maring, Portland.
Best hound, an Afghan hound, Mountview Olympic Mirah, owned by Mrs. Lillian Miller, Seattle.
Best working dog, Olympic Black Onyx, also owned by Mrs. Miller, Seattle.
Best terrier, the wirehair Craven Majorette, owned by Reginald Livsey, Milwaukie.
Best toy, a Pomeranian, Ch. Firland Yellow Jacket, owned by Mrs. Elva Cohen, Vancouver.
Best non-sporting dog, Boston terrier, Paver's Little Bit O'Hagerty, owned by Jewett A. Bush, Vernonia.

Best brace in show, collies owned by C. J. Wollertz, Portland.
A showy display of dogs was the group of German shepherds owned by the Dr. and Mrs. Julius Held, Portland. All dogs in the entire section were owned either by Dr. and Mrs. Held or sired by their champion dogs, the shepherd, Ch. Bracketta of Powellhurst, last week was awarded the National German Shepherd club's annual trophy and a war bond as most outstanding shepherd female of the year.

Another dog in the show recognized as deserving special mention was the prize winning Boston terrier, Paver's Little Bit O'Hagerty, which this fall was judged winner of all specialty Boston Terriers in the Chicago Specialty show.
Rees L. Davies of Anderson, Ind. was judge of all classes. J. H. Willett was chairman of the show for the Lions club. Frank C. Bell of Salem is president of the State Dog Fanciers' association.

Young, will serve as acting chief engineer pending appointment of a successor by the secretary of the interior.

Veterans May Build Homes If Necessary

Veterans of the army, navy, marine corps, or coast guard who have received an honorable discharge since Dec. 31, 1940, and who are unable to find other suitable living quarters, may make application for construction, alterations, or betterment of houses which they own, or the owner may request special priorities for similar work on houses occupied by these veterans, it is announced by A. L. Brewster, local service officer.

Applications to build or remodel homes under the new procedure should be filed on WPB Form 2896 with the nearest office of the federal housing administration (FHA). If the application is approved, the veteran or other applicant receives an allotment symbol covering the priority for the purchase of material and equipment allowed him.

Strand Speaks on Expansion Needs of Higher Education

The housing, equipment and expansion needs of the Oregon System of Higher Education and of Oregon State college in particular were the subject of a talk by Dr. A. L. Strand, Monday at the Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Strand who came to the college as president just two years ago from Montana State college, said that the housing needs of the University of Oregon and the three colleges of education were in little better condition to meet the influx of students which will follow the close of the war.

FWA, Students Help. The only buildings erected on the Oregon State college campus since 1926 have been with student fees, as the dormitories and health building or those built with PWA grants. Admitting that both the college and university have "kept up appearances," the former Montana State college president said it was time to stop bragging on themselves in competition for students and face facts.
